




## **CORRECTIONS INDUSTRIES**

## REENTRY COLLABORATION

- Process begins 6 months (180 days) from the expected release date
- Coordination between APD staff, Reentry staff and Probation and Parole Officers with the goals of:
  - Providing inmates more information steps for release / reentry packets with resources in the community
  - Working on smoother transitions to the community with the continued involvement of multiple divisions within NMCD

## REENTRY STEPS



#### **Reentry Committee: 180 days to release**

- Team Includes: Inmate, Classification Officer, Reentry Coordinator, Behavioral Health staff, Medical staff, Education staff, Security and Transitional Coordinator (TC) PPO
- Discuss specific needs
- Recommendations for parole residences
- Recommendations for furthering education, employment and treatment services

## PAROLE PLAN & PROGRAM APPLICATIONS



Following the reentry committee meeting the inmate works with their Classification Officer and TC on a parole plan address

#### Options:

- Paroling to private address with family or friends
- Paroling to transitional / inpatient program
  - 57 current providers around NM
  - Each program has different requirements and structures (substance addiction / mental health / veteran / etc.)

## PAROLE BOARD HEARING



- The Board reviews the parole address
- The Board sets the conditions of parole supervision including but not limited to curfew, treatment/counseling, restrictions in contact with victims, electronic monitoring, etc.
- The inmate has the right to ask questions and address issues with the Parole Board
- The Victim of the crime also has a right to speak to the Board during this hearing and address any concerns

## RELEASE



 Vital records, 30 days of prescriptions and personal property are provided to the inmate

 Transport – Private party, public transportation or prison transport to the city of the parole address

 Probation/Parole Intake – Client reports to the PPD office in their city for intake and assignment of Probation and Parole Officer. In office they can receive any additional resource needed.

## RECIDIVISM DEEP DIVE

- NMCD wanted to gain a better understanding of why individuals were returning to custody
  - New Charges / Pending Charges
  - Absconding
  - Technical Violations

 What are the drivers of recidivism and are there patterns so we know how to address them

## DEEP DIVE

- We started with a review of 3 years
  - FY 2018 (releases 07/01/2014 06/30/2015)
  - FY 2019 (releases 07/01/2015 06/30/2016)
  - FY 2020 (releases 07/01/2016 06/30/2017)
- Staff reviewed each return to prison to determine arrest reason

 Staff then reviewed violation reports to determine what were the main violations that resulted in a return to custody

## PRELIMINARY FINDINGS OF DEEP DIVE

- For all 3 years we had overreported total returns by including some inmates multiple time due to multiple releases and/or duplicate returns
- For 2 of the 3 years reviewed we had underreported arrests for new and pending charges and those inmates had been included in the technical violation numbers
- For 2 of the 3 years reviewed we had overreported Technical Violations as those inmates should have been reported under new and pending charges
- Upon review of FY 2018, FY 2019 and FY 2020 more than half of technical violation returns were found to be from Absconding

## FINDINGS CONTINUED

- Most Common Technical Violations:
  - Continued controlled substance use along with failure to attend programming / treatment and counseling / Drug Courts and inpatient recovery programs
  - Violation of Special Conditions and/or zero tolerance orders of the Court or Parole Board
  - GPS Violations (removal of device)
  - Sex Offender violations including contact with minors, pornography, being in an unauthorized area like a school, park, etc.

## MOVING FORWARD

- Currently working on the next two fiscal years:
  - FY 2021 (releases from 07/01/2017 06/30/2018)
  - FY 2022 (releases from 07/01/2018 06/30/2019)

• Plan for completion by the end of calendar year 2022

• This data will begin to reflect recidivism numbers under the current Administration which began late 2018 and early 2019.
