


New Mexico had the nation's secondhighest violent crime rate and its highest property crime rate in 2018.



New Mexico did see a 10 percent increase in violent crime, which includes murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault, with a dramatic **24.2 percent decrease** in robbery.

Progress was realized in property crimes in 2018, which includes burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft.

- 12.6 percent decrease in crimes involving force or threat of force to obtain money, property or other benefit.
- Burglary was down **10.1 percent**
- Larceny theft saw a 13.3 percent decrease
- Motor vehicle theft dropped 13.2 percent

Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act – amendments to comply with the Federal Adam Walsh Act; this legislation has been introduced from 2009-2017. The Act compliance package has gone through the legislation process since its federal passage in 2007. The remainder of the compliance issues that NM has is solely with adding the remaining sex offenses in the New Mexico State Statutes. There are seven (7) sex crimes left to be added.

- 1. 30-9 Patronizing prostitutes (where the victim is a minor)
- 2. 30-9-4 Promoting prostitution (where the victim is a minor)
- 3. 30-9-4.1 Accepting earnings of a prostitute (where the victim is a minor)
- 4. 30-9-12 Criminal sexual contact (misdemeanor)
- 5. 30-9-20 Voyeurism (where the victim is a minor)
- 6. 30-52-1(A)(2) Human trafficking
- 7. 30-28-2 Conspiracy to commit all sex offenses in the predicate list of sex offenses requiring registration

EXPUNGEMENT OF ARREST RECORDS AND PUBLIC RECORDS RELATED

10.2.200.1 ISSUING AGENCY: Department of Public Safety

10.2.200.2 SCOPE: All persons who seek to expunge arrest and public records in accordance with the Criminal Records Expungement Act. [10.2.200.2 NMAC - N, 1-1-20]

10.2.200.3 STATUTORY AUTHORITY: Section of the Criminal Records Expungement Act requires the Department to develop rules and procedures to implement the Criminal Record Expungement Act.

10.2.200.4 DURATION: Permanent [10.2.200.4 NMAC - N, 1-1-20]

[10.2.200.3 NMAC - N, I-1-20]

10.2.200.5 EFFECTIVE DATE: January 1, 2020.

10.2.200.6 OBJECTIVE: The objective of the rule is to provide a procedure whereby persons who seek to expunge arrest records and public records related thereto, may request a DPS RAP sheet, and be informed of the need to obtain the Petitioner's United States Department of Justice Federal Bureau of Investigations FBI RAP sheet. [10.2.200.6 NMAC - N, 1-1-20]

10.2.200.7 DEFINITIONS:

For purposes of this rule, the following terms have the following meaning:

- A. Arrest records are records of identification of a person under arrest or under investigation for a crime taken or gathered by an official, including information gathered from the national crime information center or another criminal record database, photographs, fingerprints and booking sheets. Arrest records do not include:1) citations for driving while intoxicated maintained by the New Mexico Department of Taxation and Revenue; 2) computer-aided dispatch information; or 3) log books relating to breath alcohol testing equipment.
 - Department is the Department of Public Safety.
- C. DPS RAP sheet is the record of a Petitioner's arrests and prosecutions throughout the State of New Mexico, which is maintained by the Department.
- D. Expungement is the removal from access to the general public of a notation of an arrest, complaint, indictment, information, plea of guilty, conviction, acquittal, dismissal or discharge record, including a record posted on a publicly accessible court, corrections, or law enforcement internet website.
- E. FBI RAP sheet is the record of a person's fingerprint-based arrests maintained by the United States Department of Justice Federal Bureau of Investigation. The FBI RAP sheet includes the name of the agency that submitted the fingerprints to the FBI, the date of the arrest, the arrest charge, and the disposition of the arrest, if known. The FBI Rap sheet is also known as a person's Identity History Summary.
- F. Public records are documents relating to a person's arrest, indictment, proceeding, finding or plea of guilty, conviction, acquittal, dismissal or discharge, including information posted on a court or law enforcement website, except those records excluded from the definition of public records in Section xx-xxxx C., NMSA 1978.
- G. Petition is the Petition to Expunge Arrest Records and Public Records that officially begins the expungement of records process in state district court. The information to be included in the Petition is set forth in the Criminal Record Expungement Act, Section xx=xxxx, NMSA, 1978 and New Mexico Rule of Civil Procedure 1-xxx. The suggested forms for the Petition To Expunge Arrest Records and Public Records Pursuant to NMSA 1978, Section xx=xxxx (Reclease with no conviction), the Petition To Expunge Arrest Records and Public Records Pursuant to NMSA 1978, Section xx=xxxx (Conviction), the Petition To Expunge Arrest Records, and Public Records

- 1. DPS Office of Legal Affairs has participated in multiple meetings with Administrative Office of the Courts personnel to cooperatively plan implementation of New Mexico's new expungement law.
- 2. DPS is creating a new rule to assist individuals seeking to expunge their criminal records.
- 3. The Notice of Rulemaking hearing will be published in the New Mexico Register, the Albuquerque Journal and the NM Sunshine Portal by **November 1, 2019**.
- 4. A public hearing to allow in-person comments about the proposed DPS expungement rule will be held at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy Auditorium in Santa Fe on **December 4**, **2019**, with written comments accepted prior to and until the conclusion of the hearing.
- 5. The new rule is expected to become effective **January 1, 2020.**

Live Scan Project / Timeline

- \$300,000 funding made available via House Bill 2
- 14 Live Scan machines purchased
 - Five units will be delivered week of October 28, 2019; Live by November 8.
 - Then five units delivered week of November 18, 2019; Live by December 6.
 - Final four units delivered week of December 9, 2019; live by December 20.
- Training will take place with each location as they are installed.
- Sites with manual fingerprint card submissions prioritized.
- Total cost per new Live Scan was \$18,266 / machine.


- 1. Develop a Consolidated Offender Query (COQ) data web service.

During the summer of 2015, the Department of Public Safety initiated a statewide inventory of Sexual Assault Evidence Kits (SAEK). New Mexico law enforcement agencies reported they had 5,409 kits in their inventory, of which 3,948 are from Bernalillo County Sheriff's Office and Albuquerque Police Department. **December 2018 – DPS agreed to assist APD process some of their SAEK backlog.**

New Mexico law enforcement agencies reported they had 1,133 rape kits for DPS. The backlog was completed in June 2018. Since hiring a SAKI coordinator in May 2017, an additional 365 kits have been identified across the state. DPS has received 1,498. The final 71 kits are in the testing process.
