Task Force considers all genders, rather than focusing exclusively on women. The need to be comprehensive in our focus became clear as the task force began conversations with the wider community.


The quote below reflects suggestions made by the community to broaden the work of the task force.

MMIWR National Reports




AI/AN peoples experience violence at more than **TWICE** the national average.



Native American women in New Mexico have the highest rate of homicide among ALL racial and ethnic groups.










New Mexico Missing Persons Data (NamUs)



State Response

Outcomes of House Bill 278 (2019)

- The MMIWR Task Force worked hard to meet the requirements of House Bill 278 to:
 - "determine the scope of the problem, identify barriers, create partnerships to improve reporting of and investigation of missing and murdered Indigenous women and relatives."
- A final report & additional resources were developed by the task force and were published in December 2020. The final report was the foundation for current and future task force work.










Data Findings Based on Task Force Work

- Farmington reported 73 missing persons between 2014-2019 (70 cases were resolved). Of this total, 48.5% were Native American and 66% were missing Native American females.
- In Gallup, out of 675 missing persons in Gallup, 53% were women, and Native Americans comprise 76% of ALL missing persons. Gallup police department data indicates that from 2014-2019 87% of all homicide cases were Native Americans.
- Between 2014-2019, Albuquerque reported 660 Native American missing persons, 287 of those cases are women Representing 43% of all Native American missing persons.



Data Findings

Missing Persons by Race in Two NM Counties* (Years 2014-2019)



*San Juan and McKinley Counties

- Among missing persons in these two counties, female missing persons were younger than male missing persons.
- In addition, Native American missing persons were younger than all other racial and ethnic groups.
- Data from the two counties show that half of all missing Native American women are younger than 27 years of age.



Additional Findings

- Law enforcement needs training & support to increase datagathering capacity across law enforcement agencies.
- Additional law enforcement agreements such as cross-commission and one-way commissions are needed.
- Rural areas of the state and border towns need culturally relevant support services including access to shelters and safe housing.
- Tribal justice systems need access to state training and technical support.
- Strengthen community responses through education and trainings.



2021 Legislative Session Outcomes

- IAD introduced legislation to establish a permanent MMIWR Task Force in January 2021.
- The Indian Affairs Department received an appropriation for MMIWR work during the 2021 Legislative Session of \$57,000.



Executive Order 2021-013 Task Force Directives

"The Task Force, through the subcommittees, shall **develop a MMIWR State Response Plan** that will advise the Executive Branch on initiatives, programs, and policy changes that will support implementation of Task Force report recommendations.

The Task Force shall **evaluate policies and explore legislation** that can be presented to the appropriate interim legislative committees and introduced during the 2022 Legislative Session to improve the state's efforts surrounding prevention and response to MMIWR incidents..."



Task Force Goals and Objectives

- Develop a State Response Plan for how 2021 MMIWR Final Report recommendations should be implemented.
 - ✓ Legislation
 - ✓ Department Policies/Collaboration/MOUs
 - √ Staffing/Budget
- 2. Develop a long-term plan for MMIWR work in state government.
- Continue collecting data from law enforcement agencies for 2020 missing persons data, homicide data, accidental deaths.



Task Force Collaborations

- University of Nebraska Omaha would like to submit a joint application to the National Institute of Justice grant to collect data on MMIWR incidents in NM and create a framework for future data collection in the state.
- Strengthening Partnerships with City of Albuquerque, Albuquerque Police Department, and Second Judicial District Attorney's Office, New Mexico Attorney General's Office.



Task Force Recommendations

- Establish a permanent MMIWR office/position to track MMIWR incidents in the state, assist families, educate communities on MMIWR with a focus on prevention; Authorize the office to establish a state-led cold case task force to review cold cases involving Indigenous relatives.
- NM Missing Persons Day Establish an annual missing persons day that provides an opportunity for individuals and families to provide new or updated information on missing individuals/relatives.
- This event will bring together multiple partners to assist families and communities during this one-day event to update existing missing person reports, file a report, or submit critical records necessary to match unidentified remains.
