

This list does not include recommendations for which there is agreement, either to retain or eliminate. The LFC recommendations are **STAFF** recommendations, not committee recommendations.

LFC Differences With Subcommittee:

AGRICULTURE

1. acequia commission – subcommittee did not look at; LFC says Carruthers report recommended elimination.

3. state fair – this is not really disagreement; note is incorrectly stated; subcommittee would have it administratively attached to commerce dept.

6. rangeland protection advisory committee – subcommittee did not make recommendation since it is not an executive committee; LFC recommends elimination.

COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY

8 and 10 – apprenticeship committee/council – labor and industrial bureau said they both could be eliminated or moved to labor and industrial comsn; subcommittee moved to comsn, but GRTF could decide to have dept do the functions.

11. border authority – There is not disagreement between subcommittee and LFC; both recommend it be put into commerce dept

13. construction industries – LFC recommends elimination altogether; subcommittee recommended it be advisory

18. manufactured housing committee – LFC recommends elimination altogether; subcommittee recommended it be advisory.

21. occupational health and safety review comsn – subcommittee did not make recommendation; LFC recommends giving function to EIB – **dept concurs with that recommendation**

22. skills council – LFC recommends assigning to the workforce development board – question is whether that would be allowed by federal law. **Needs answer from dept.**

CULTURAL AFFAIRS

32. cultural properties review committee – subcommittee recommended it be technical advisory and not review every project; LFC recommends further analysis, noting objectivity of commission is critical. **Dept opposes the subcommittee recommendation and prefers the committee retain its policymaking status. Dept worries about politicization of cultural properties review if given to dept.**

39. state library commission – subcommittee recommended retaining; LFC recommends elimination

HIGHER EDUCATION

44. state comsn on post-secondary education – item should not be colored; there is no disagreement.

PUBLIC EDUCATION

53-55. Hispanic, Indian education councils and math & science councils – subcommittee recommended retaining; LFC recommends elimination.

56. PEC – should not be colored; LFC agrees with GRTF for elimination.

58. PSIA – GRTF still considering or leaving decision to LESC and LHHS; LFC recommends consolidating with risk management division.

ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES

62. emergency response comsn – LFC recommends elimination but subcommittee believes there is a federal mandate through the federal Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act of 1986.

63. EIB – subcommittee recommended removing rulemaking; LFC and dept worry that would mean less access to the process by the public; concentration of decisionmaking could mean a narrowing of interest. Dept worries that opening the question of membership will mean many new entities will seek representation on the board, which could grow to be even larger and more difficult to serve.

65. game commission – **Note: GRTF has recommended comsn be eliminated and dept made a division of EMNRD**

66. hazardous materials safety board – subcommittee left as is; LFC recommends elimination. Perhaps the new DPS could perform function, but the board is an interagency board made up of training officers of responsible state agencies. Job is to establish accident response curricula and review training needs of agencies.

71. natural lands protection committee – subcommittee left as is; LFC recommends elimination.

74. radiation technical advisory council – created as part of the Radiation Protection Act; subcommittee left as is because the council is composed of scientifically trained persons. LFC recommends repeal of the Medical Imaging and Radiation Therapy Health and Safety Act, which will not necessarily eliminate the council, only some members. May need further analysis.

79. tree planting advisory committee – subcommittee recommended elimination; LFC and EMNRD recommend keeping; provides local interaction and input.

81. water quality control comsn – subcommittee recommended advisory status and membership change; LFC noted that eliminating rulemaking will mean less access to the process by the public.

EMNRD notes the commission is too big and suggests some members be eliminated to a total of 9 members (down from 14), suggesting: NMED, EMNRD, NMDA, DGF, bureau of geology and public members representing tribal, environment, industry and municipal interests.

GENERAL GOVERNMENT

93. governor's residence advisory comsn – subcommittee made no recommendation; LFC recommends elimination.

97. information technology rate committee – subcommittee recommended elimination; LFC recommends no change. **DOIT** notes it does not cost the state and meets 2X year to review rate changes.

98. state investment council – LFC recommends GRTF consider SIC-proposed changes for the council. (not presented to task force)

100. land grant council – subcommittee recommended no funding for the council, but to keep it because it would be the contact point with federal agencies for land grant funding; LFC recommends elimination.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

116. behavioral health planning council – LFC recommends reduction in membership. Number is not specified in law, currently over 40.

118. brain injury advisory council – there may not be a conflict: subcommittee recommended moving functions to ALTSD and LFC recommended elimination – effect is same?

119 - 122 – basically, the recommendation would end up as: eliminate the CYFD advisory committee (dept and LFC rec); eliminate the children's cabinet and continue the children's trust fund board of trustees as well as the child development board – GRTF should consider that the two boards have nothing in common. **CYFD recommends eliminating child development board; duties being performed by early learning advisory committee. Dept also recommends eliminating children, youth and families advisory committee; it does not recommend changes to the trust fund board.**

127. advisory council on disability – subcommittee moved function to ALTSD; LFC recommends elimination since the council does not meet.

128. governor's commission on disability – subcommittee moved functions to ALTSD; LFC recommends eliminating – there appears to be no recommendation conflict. **CYFD recommends no change in comsn, but could administratively attach to ALTSD**

129. DWI grant council – LFC does not concur with subcommittee recommendation. **LGD recommends no change.**

130-132. emergency medical services committees – LFC recommends consolidating all three.

136. health policy commission – GRTF originally considered moving functions to DOH; also considering Health Policy and Finance Act. LFC concurs with Carruthers report to eliminate and move functions back to DOH if other bill is not endorsed.

139. human rights commission – think the recommendations are not in conflict; GRTF considering moving WSD, and its attached agencies, to commerce dept.

140. individual development account council – subcommittee left as is; LFC recommends eliminating – there is no funding for these accounts.

142. interagency committee on long-term care – subcommittee made no recommendation; LFC recommends elimination – it notes it has not met in 4 years.

144. medical direction committee – LFC recommends elimination.

145. medical investigators board – this a spreadsheet error – board does not belong to DOH and cannot be eliminated.

148. next generation council – subcommittee made no recommendation; LFC recommends elimination.

149. pain management advisory council – LFC recommends elimination; DOH reports it does not meet anymore.

152. telehealth commission – LFC recommends elimination – reports it has effectively transferred to UNMH.

153. trauma advisory committee – LFC recommends elimination; covered by trauma system fund authority.

157. commission on status of women – LFC says item needs more analysis. **Commission rejects.**

159. youth alliance – subcommittee made no recommendation; LFC says eliminate.

INSTRUMENTALITIES – SEPARATE AND APART FROM STATE

160. exposition center authority – LFC recommends elimination. Only issue with that is to determine if there were bonds issued. LFC and LCS staff don't believe the authority was constituted, but needs further analysis.

162. historic landscape trust – LFC recommends elimination.

163. hospital equipment loan council – LFC recommends elimination; question is whether there are bonds outstanding; needs further analysis

167. renewable energy transmission authority – subcommittee left as is; LFC recommends elimination. State may need comsn for bonding and oversight of renewable energy efforts.

MILITARY AFFAIRS

169. awards boards – subcommittee left as is because it is ad hoc; LFC recommended elimination for same reason.

(FYI: **MAD supports merging armory board and council**)

170. military base planning commission – subcommittee had not made a definite recommendation; LFC recommends no change. **Commission opposes.**

171. veterans museum – subcommittee recommended delaying opening of new museum for two years; LFC believes appropriation will dictate timing. There may be constitutional issues with that position.

172. veterans services advisory board – subcommittee recommended elimination; LFC did not.

PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

173-210. Subcommittee did not consider these because they are self-sustaining; LFC made two recommendations: (1) animal sheltering merge with veterinary board; (2) naprapathic practice board with acupuncture board (Note that these boards have nothing in common re healing modalities).

PUBLIC SAFETY AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE

214. corrections industries comsn – subcommittee and LFC recommended moving to DOC; DOC recommends elimination.

215. corrections population control commission – subcommittee and LFC asked for further analysis; DOC notes the commission is defunct and secretary of corrections has assumed function.

216. crime stoppers advisory council – subcommittee recommended moving function to DPS; LFC recommended elimination.

222. firefighters survivors supplemental death benefits review committee – subcommittee left as is; LFC recommends elimination. Question arises as to who will make benefits determination?

223. human trafficking task force – subcommittee left as is because has completion date of July 1, 2016; LFC recommends eliminating now.

225. intrastate mutual aid committee – subcommittee considered eliminating; LFC agreed.

228. law enforcement academy board – subcommittee left as is; LFC recommends elimination. Question is whether accreditation requires a governing board.

SPORTS

235. athletic commission – subcommittee recommended elimination; LFC sunset subcommittee has recommended its continuation.

Recommendations Opposed by Agencies (not otherwise noted)

57. higher education advisory board – HED says elimination of board would be detrimental. HED relies on board members' expertise. The dept does not pay the members per diem and mileage.

75. technology in education council – PED does not believe DOIT has the necessary expertise to take over this function, which is to advise on integrating technology into curriculum.

80. fire planning task force – EMNRD does not support. The task force serves unique role in forestry division's mission to promote health forests and fire safety. Task force will adopt the statewide communities at risk assessment plan and approves the community wildland protection plans.

96. information technology comsn – subcommittee recommends eliminating and replacing with stakeholder group; DOIT prefers to shift duties to existing work teams.

158. women's health office of council – subcommittee recommends moving function to DOH; LFC concurs. Office opposes.

220. domestic violence leadership comsn – subcommittee and LFC recommend elimination (created by executive order originally); Agency (not specified) recommends no change.

235. sex offender management board – subcommittee and LFC recommended moving to sentencing commission; DOC and sentencing comsn recommend board remain.
