

The Indian Affairs Department ("IAD") fulfills a central role in facilitating communication and collaboration between the Governor's Office, the other thirty-two (32) Cabinet agencies and the twenty-two (22) Indian tribes, nations and pueblos on programs and issues affecting Native Americans in New Mexico. Working closely with tribal leaders, members of the Executive and key stakeholders, IAD created a Strategic Plan to work effectively to improve Native American health, promote meaningful state-tribal collaboration and coordination, increase and leverage funding for tribal infrastructure capacity and strengthen tribal economic development efforts. Most notably IAD developed and secured enactment of legislation for Severance Bonds for Tribal Infrastructure.

Pursuant to the Laws of 2010, HB162, Severance Bonds for Tribal Infrastructure, the Tribal Infrastructure Fund will receive recurring funding in the amount equal to 5% of the Severance Tax Bonding Capacity in a given year. By January 15, 2012 the State Board of Finance will estimate the tax amount of bonding capacity and allocate 5% of this capacity to tribal infrastructure projects. Tribal infrastructure projects are defined as a qualified project under the Tribal Infrastructure Act.

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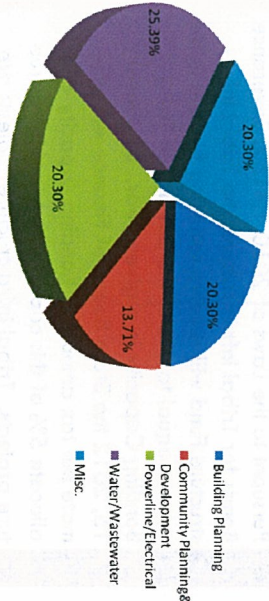
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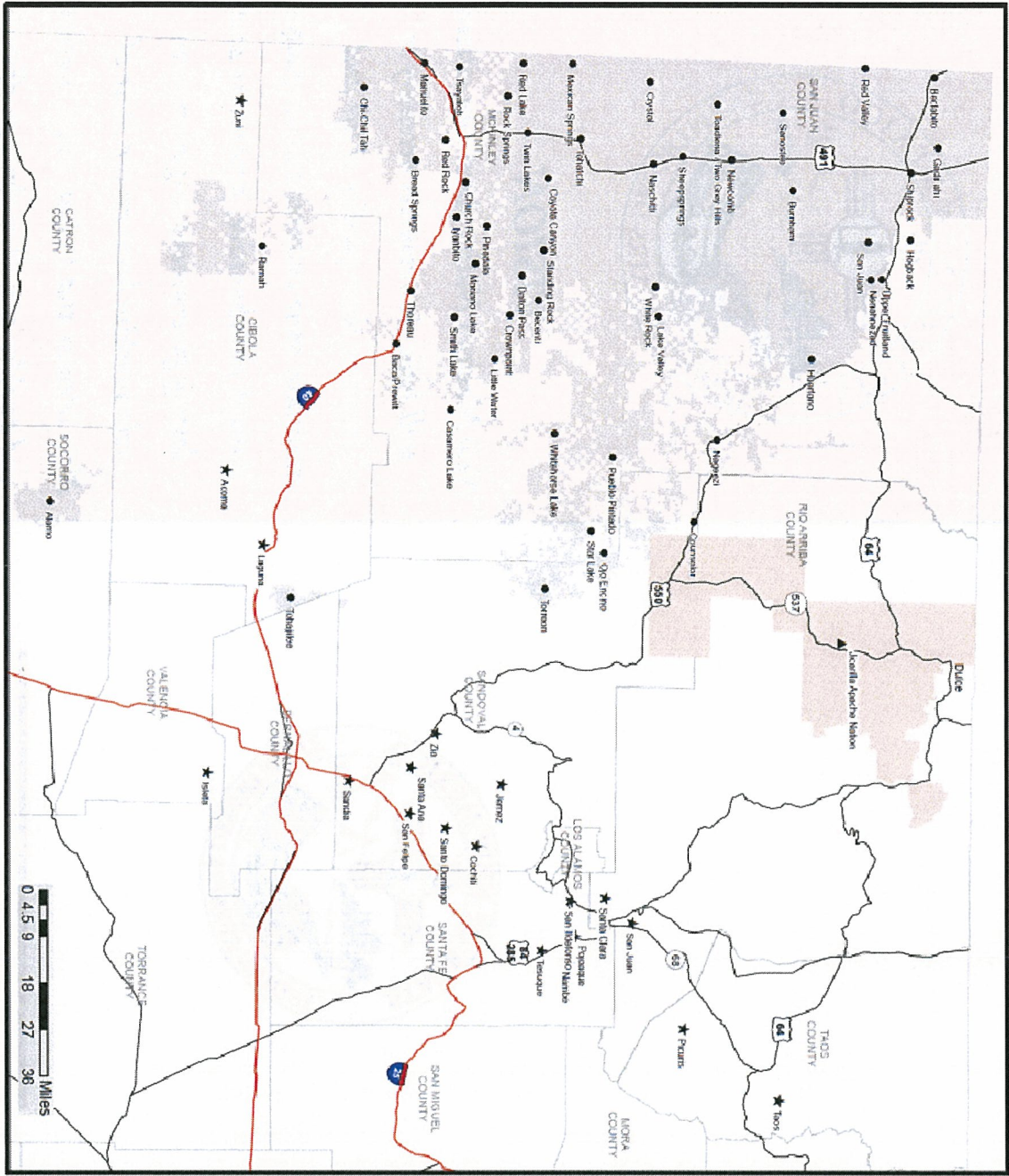
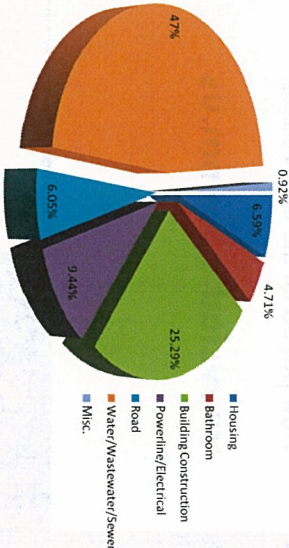
