

Results

Culturally responsive pedagogical frameworks

Staff provision of social services in languages other than English


Social service needs of students and families

Limited numbers of social and behavioral health providers statewide

Barriers to accessing and providing culturally appropriate social services

Wide range of behavioral health service usage and Medicaid billing patterns

Results: Percentage of Students Receiving Culturally Responsive Services



Results: Services in Languages other than English

- Half of all districts and charters reported employing or contracting with behavioral health providers who provide services in languages other than English
- Over 90% provide services in Spanish, less than 10% provide services in Navajo or tribal languages

Languages Services Provided	Priority Districts & Schools	All Other Districts & Schools
Provide Services in Other Language	67.7%	47.4%
Spanish	85.7%	100%
Dine	19.0%	0%
Other	23.8%	8.3%

Recommendations

- Partner with community, tribal leaders, and higher education settings
- Tailor resources to match school size
- Prioritize student needs
- Fund districts and charter schools to meet immediate needs
- Demystify and destigmatize behavioral health
- Emphasize the importance of culturally appropriate care

Next Steps

- Collaborate with tribal and BIE schools, starting with tribal approvals and data sharing agreements
- Inventory of Social Services: expand responses from districts and charter schools
- Add student use data from SBHCs, special education services and IEPs, and service provision information from Regional Education Cooperatives
- Social service resources and provider information confirmed
- Medicaid claims data additional analysis; policy/practice implications regarding Medicaid billing
- Non-western/traditional social services review
- Synthesis with other available data
- Focused Reports on specific populations and needs (i.e., tribal specific)
