

Albuquerque Heading Home uses an evidence-based model. Its collective impact has been independently researched to show that it is 31.6% less expensive to house an individual, or family, with supportive services provided, than it is for those same people to live on the streets.

Our work has received national recognition. For example, the Anaheim City and Orange County, California, each sent staff to observe our collaboration for two days. They then returned to California where they implemented similar programmatic service models.

Such a solution can be implemented state-wide in New Mexico.
