

Overview of Graduate Medical Education (GME) Expansion in New Mexico

HB480 - GME Expansion Grant Program Act



- Allowed for the creation of the GME Expansion Committee and the strategic plan for GME development
- Implements development grants for existing and developing residency programs including:
 - CHRISTUS St. Vincent Regional Medical Center Santa Fe, NM
 - Memorial Medical Center Las Cruces, NM
 - Doña Ana County Psychiatry Program Las Cruces, NM
 - Burrell College of Osteopathic Medicine Hobbs, NM
 - El Centro Family Health Española, NM

New Mexico Primary Care Training Consortium



- Awarded \$300,000 by legislature, with additional federal match funds, over the last 5 years
- As a result, we've been able to offer Technical Assistance Contracts that support programs with:
 - Coordinating program development
 - Medical student recruitment
 - Providing didactic and faculty training and development
 - Policy input and state planning support

GME Financing

- Allows for Medicaid payments to eligible providers
- Expanded by NM Human Services Department (HSD) to include all general acute care hospitals and some support for Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) and Rural Health Centers (RHCs)
- Enhanced GME payments prioritize growth for primary care and pyschiatry training programs










El Centro Family Medicine Residency Program A Community Collaborative



Impact of El Centro Family Medicine Residency Program

- 12 residents serving the community when program reaches maturity in 2026
- 4 residents admitted per year beginning Fall 2024
- Cross sectional community buy-in and responsibility
- First primary care residency program in New Mexico with NMPCTC Sponsoring Institution
- Unique training opportunities for residents, including:
- Training for a practice in a rural New Mexico community
- Training for primary outpatient care at a Federally Qualified Health Center
- Training for adult inpatient medicine at a regional hospital
- Training for surgical, newborn and obstetric care at a rural hospital
- Training for pediatric care at an urban hospital
