Census Matters: Census-Guided Funding in New Mexico

The Bottom Line

New Mexico received:

\$17,709,409,976

in census-guided federal
spending in Fiscal Year 2023.

This funding flowed from 371 census-guided federal assistance programs that, nationwide, allocate \$2.24 trillion in FY 2023. These programs rely on state and local data from the decennial census (or data, like the American Community Survey, derived from the census)

to direct federal funding to specific areas of the country.

An incorrect count in the census can cost a state millions — even billions — in federal funds over the decade between counts.

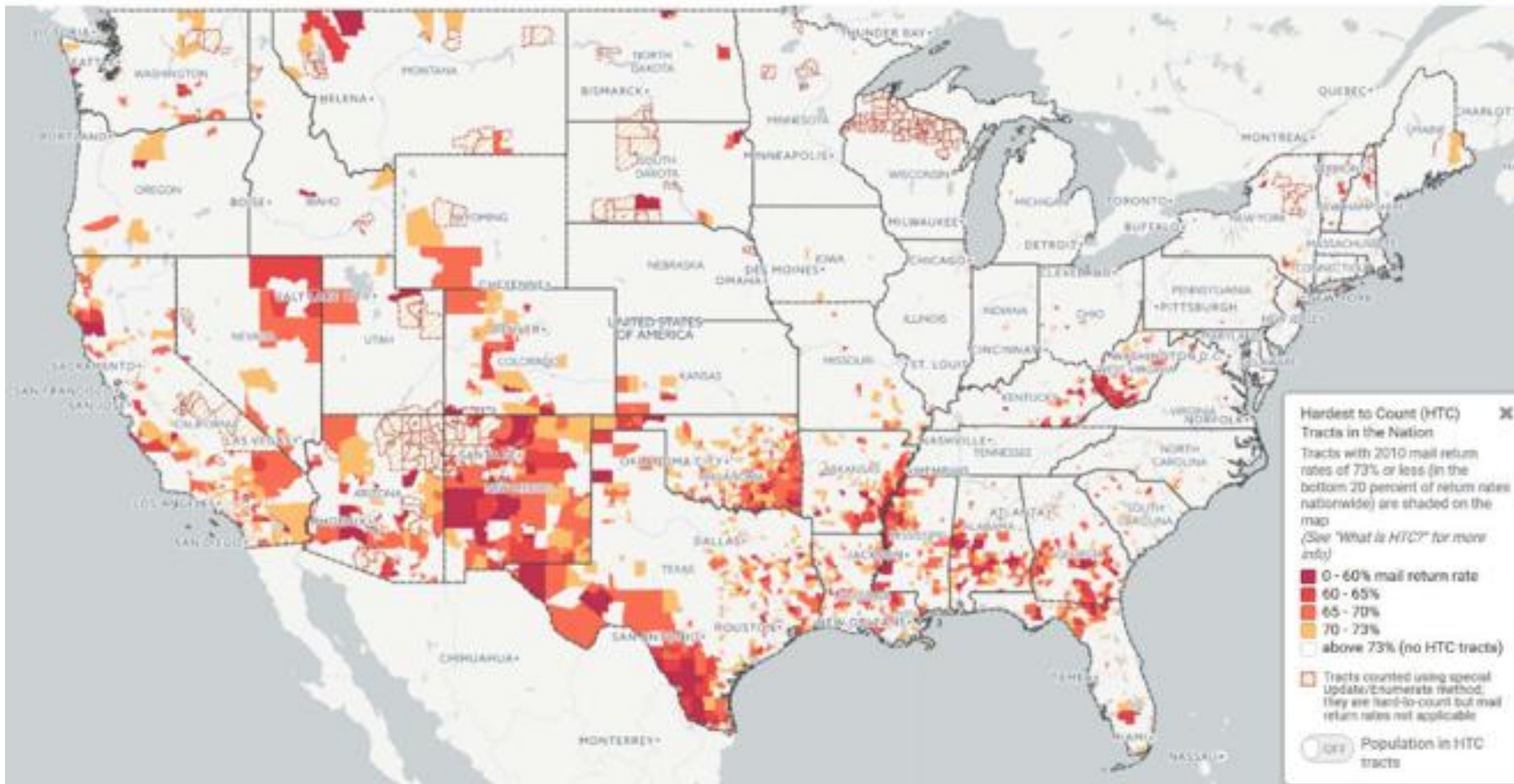

- “While the Census itself is the responsibility of the federal government, local and state governments have a vested interest in supporting these efforts to ensure their communities are fairly and accurately counted.”*
- “New Mexico is the hardest-to-count state in the contiguous United States, with over 42% of the state population living in designated hard-to-count areas.”*
- ❖ **New Mexico invested \$11.8 million in the 2020 Census**
 - **Local Update of Census Addresses (LUCA) program**
 - New Mexico invested \$300,000 in LUCA for the 2020 Census (New Mexico also invested \$300,000 for LUCA in 2010)
 - **Complete Count Committees**
 - New Mexico invested \$11,500,000 for the 2020 Census

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Local Update of Census Addresses

- The [Local Update of Census Addresses \(LUCA\)](#) program is the Census Bureau's once-a-decade opportunity for tribal, state, and local governments to review and **improve the Census Bureau's residential address list** before the decennial count.
- If an address isn't on the Census Bureau's list, no questionnaire is delivered, no enumerator follows up, and that household is unlikely to get counted.
- New Mexico invested \$300,000 in LUCA for both the 2010 and 2020 Censuses.
- In 2018, New Mexico submitted over 100,000 address additions or corrections.

LUCA Case Study – New Mexico Tribal Lands

- ❑ In 2025, a LUCA working group that included Census Bureau staff closely examined communities where LUCA submissions were believed to have made a significant impact on the 2020 count.
- ❑ New Mexico submitted tribal area case studies for consideration.
- ❑ Tribal Areas have a long history of undercount for reasons that include
 - Non-standard addressing
 - Field work limitations
 - Language and cultural barriers
 - Distrust of federal government

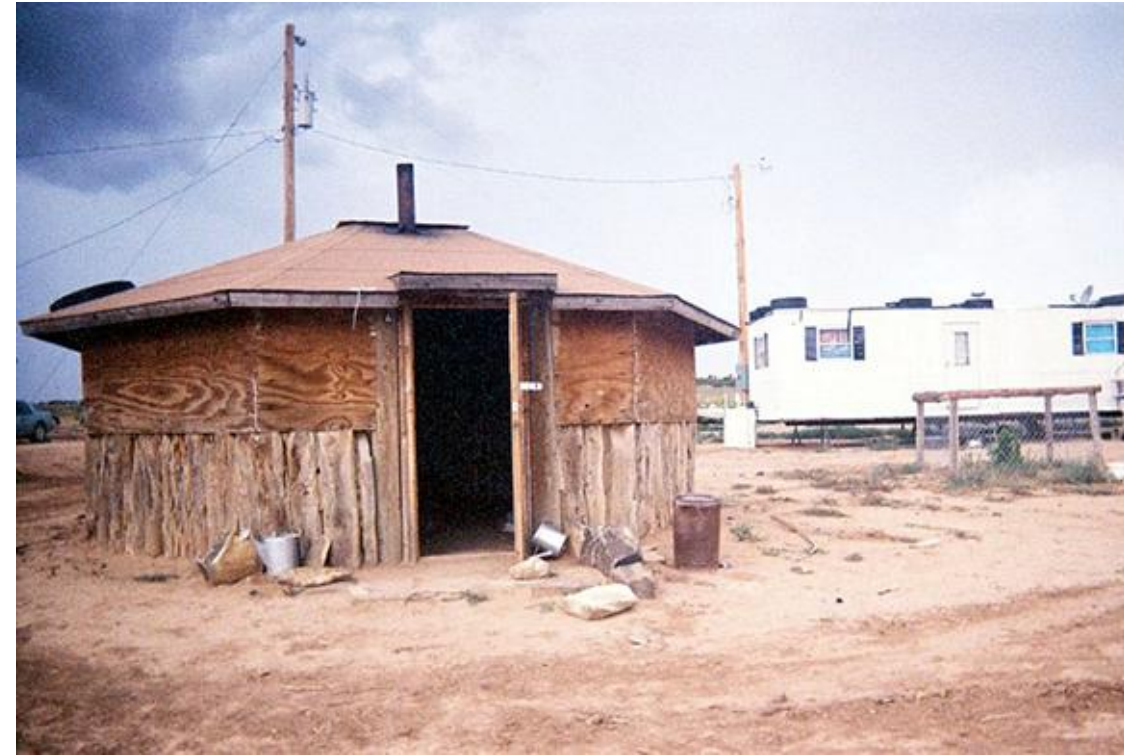

LUCA in New Mexico Tribal Areas

In one tribal community, **more than one in ten housing units counted in the 2020 Census were the result of the state's LUCA submission.**

Recipe for LUCA Success based on this case study:

Funding from the state and local foundations
+ **Local knowledge** from Tribal and local governments
+ **Technical Expertise** from the State
= **Impactful LUCA submissions**

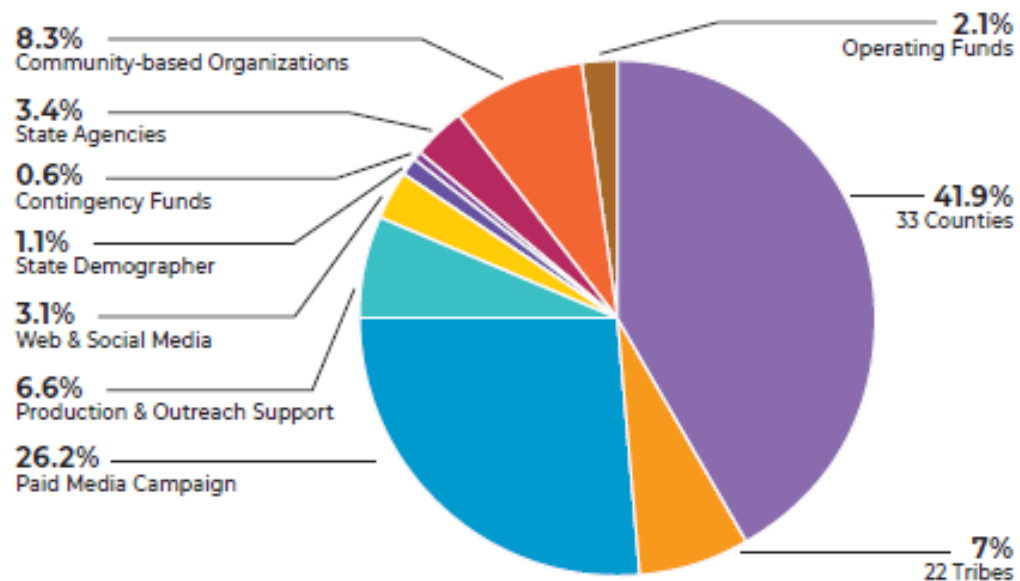
- April 2019, Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham issued Executive Order 2019-007
 - Established Statewide Complete Count Commission to promote and advertise the 2020 Census
 - Focus resources on hard-to-count areas and populations
 - Ensure the highest participation rate possible
 - Support and coordinate with Local Complete Count Committees (LCCCs)
- Composed of Cabinet Secretaries, Local Government, Tribal Community, Business Community, Non-Profit, Philanthropy, and Legislators
- \$11.5 Million state investment (see chart)
- 33/33 Counties entered grant agreement

Nearly 98.76% of all appropriated funds were fully allocated.¹⁵

2020 Census Results

The accuracy of a census at the state level is measured in two key ways:

- Comparison with Population Estimates
- Post-Enumeration Survey

Difference of 11,203 or +0.5%



2020 Post-Enumeration Survey Net Error by State

- New Mexico had the lowest absolute net error of any state!
- This was due in part to high but off-setting rates of omissions and duplications

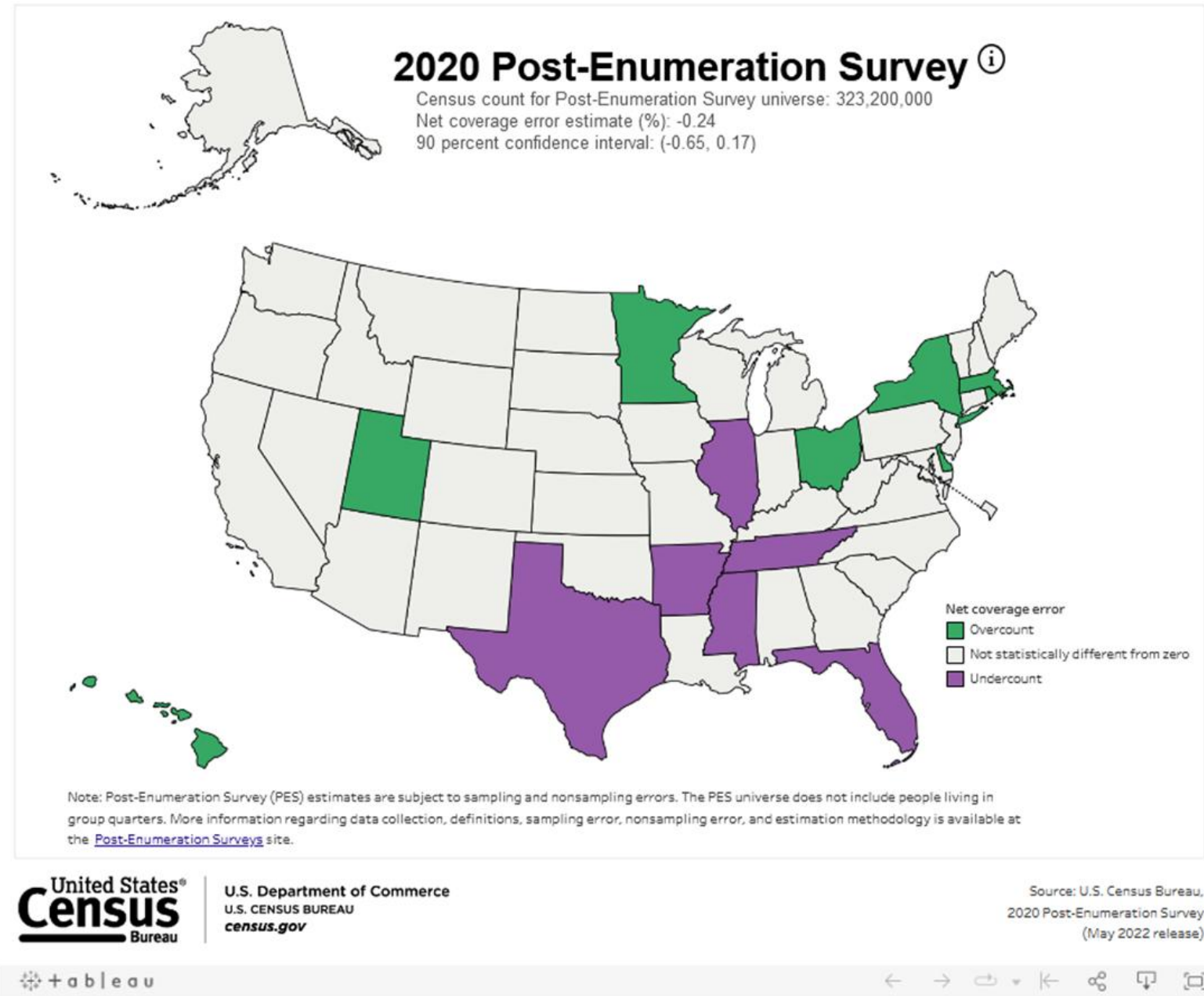

2020 Post-Enumeration Survey Net Error by State

"In regards to an accurate count of the number of residents in a given state, NM had the most accurate count in the nation. However, nationwide, the demographic makeup of US residents undercounted Hispanics, American Indians, and Blacks. While we don't know what if any demographic-based undercount happened in NM, we can presume that there was some undercounting of certain demographics and some overcounting of others."

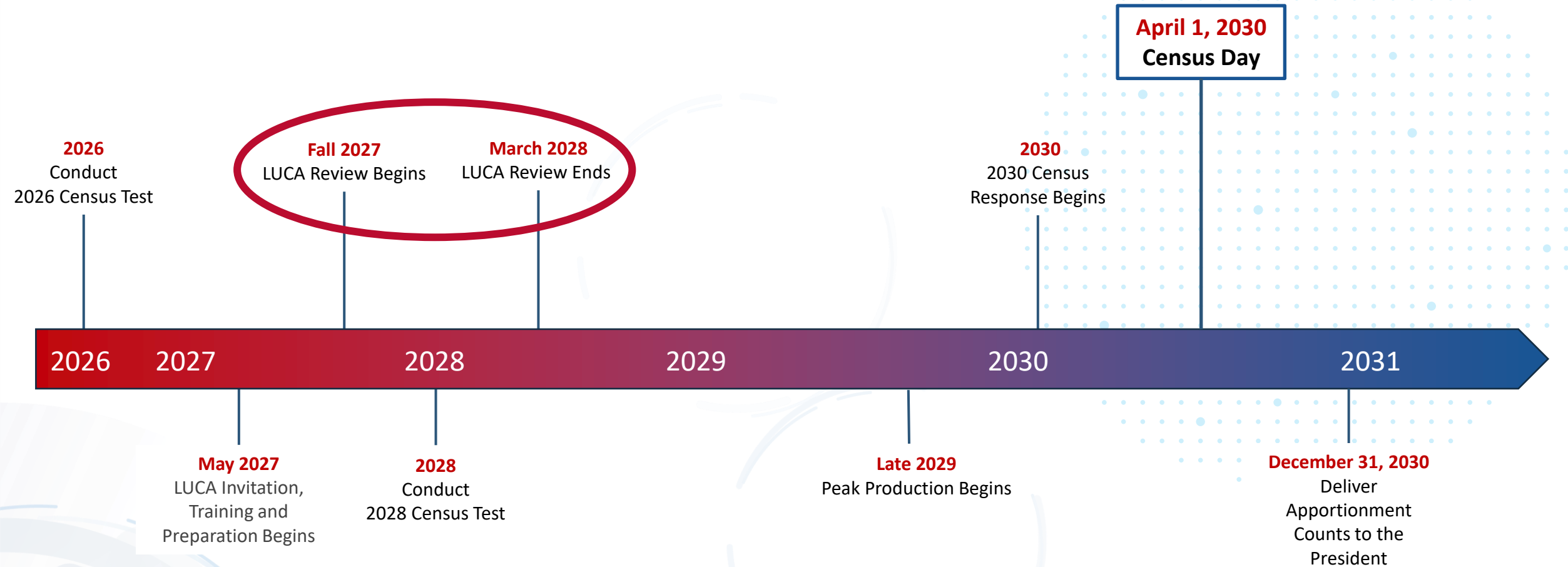

Recommendations Report for 2030 Census

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KEY RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. Start early.
2. Invest in accurate addresses.
3. Address internet access and computer literacy issues.
4. Create a core campaign and resource infrastructure.
5. Use community-centered outreach strategies to educate residents.
6. Encourage cross-sector and multi-county partnerships.
7. Cultivate positive relationships with Bureau staff at all levels.

NM 2020 Complete Count Commission Recommendation #1 Start Early

- “Provide early support and financial investments.”
 - Local Update of Census Addresses (Funding would be for FY28)
 - Complete Count Commission (Funding would be for FY29 and FY30)
- “Build coalitions and partnerships in preparation for Census outreach.”
- “Develop a state-tribal partnership and plan.”

NM 2020 Complete Count Commission Recommendation #2. Invest in Accurate Addresses

- “Fund the Local Update of Census Address Program (LUCA)”
 - LUCA ensures that the census bureau has a complete, accurate and up-to-date list of all residential addresses in New Mexico
 - \$300,000 was appropriated for LUCA in 2008 and 2018
- “The next Governor should appoint a qualified, LUCA liaison to work on behalf of the state in early 2027.”
