




NM Urban-Rural County Classification





Percentage of NM Adults Living in Households with Annual Income of Less Than \$20,000 by Age Group, 2014




Percentage of NM Adults Age 65+ With Less Than High School Education by Region, 2014






Percentage of NM Adults Age 65+ Without Health Care Coverage by Region, 2014




Percentage of NM Adults Without Health Care Coverage by Age Group, 2014




Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+ by Annual Household Income, 2014




General Health Status Reported As Fair or Poor Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+ by Education, 2014




Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+ by Race/Ethnicity, 2014






6+ of Past 30 Days Mental Health was Not Good Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+ by Gender, 2014












Percentage of NM Adults Who Were Heavy Drinkers by Age Group, 2014

Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+ by Gender, 2014




Among Males, 3+ Drinks Per Day. Among Females, 2+ Drinks Per Day.

Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+ by Annual Household Income, 2013




Percentage of NM Adults Who Were Heavy Drinkers Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+ by Education, 2013






Percentage of NM Adults Who Were Heavy Drinkers Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+ by Region, 2013




Percentage of NM Adults Who Were Heavy Drinkers Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+ by Urban/Rural, 2013



Current Smoking Among New Mexico Adults by Age Group, 2014




Obesity – BMI ≥ 30 Among New Mexico Adults by Age Group, 2014







Percentage of NM Adults Who Do Not Engage in Any Leisure-time Physical Activity by Age Group, 2014




Percentage of NM Adults Who Engaged in Binge Drinking at Least Once in the Past 30 Days by Age Group, 2014





Life Expectancy from Age 65 by Sex




Life Expectancy from Age 65 by Race/Ethnicity New Mexico, 2013




Life Expectancy from Age 65 by Health Region New Mexico, 2014




Life Expectancy from Age 65 by Rural/Urban Categories New Mexico, 2014






Suicide Death Rates Ages 65+ by Race/Ethnicity New Mexico, 2012-2014




Suicide Death Rates Ages 65+ by Sex New Mexico, 2012-2014




Suicide Death Rates Ages 65+ by Health Regions New Mexico, 2012-2014

Percent of Suicide Deaths Ages 65+ by Method New Mexico, 2010-2014




Older Adult Drug Overdose Death Rates by Year, NM, 1999-2014




Older Adult Drug Overdose Death Rates by Sex, NM, 2012-2014




Older Adult Drug Overdose Death Rates by Race/Ethnicity, NM 2012-

Older Adult Drug Overdose Death Rates by Rural/Urban Category, NM, 2012-2014




Older Adult Fall Death Risk

- Doubles every 5 years after age 65
- Is about 1.3 times higher among men than among women
- Is 4 times as high among people with high doses of opioids (>=200 MME) in the last month
- Is 1.6 times higher among people with lower doses of opioids in the last month
- Is 3 times as high among people with high doses of benzodiazepines (>20 VME) in the most recent month
- Is 1.5 times higher among people with lower doses of benzodiazepines in the last month


Older Adult Fall Deaths

- For both opioids and sedative-hypnotics:
 - Current use is a key risk factor, chronic use over 6 months is somewhat protective
 - Higher doses carry higher risks
 - Sedation and dizziness a likely mechanism
 - People appear to become accustomed to these drugs, but it takes more than a month or two
- The number of pharmacies matters, but not the number of prescribers

Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Among Medicare Beneficiaries, 2009-2013




Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+, 2010-2014






Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+, by Race/Ethnicity, 2014






Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Among New Mexico Adults Age 65+, 2010-2013






Alzheimer's Death Rates Ages 65+ by Race/Ethnicity New Mexico, 2012-2014




Alzheimer's Disease Death Rates Ages 65+ by Sex New Mexico, 2012-2014

Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Early Onset (<65 Years), 2014

Vital Records

19 individuals died from an underlying cause of ADRD who were younger than 65 years (1.3% of ADRD deaths).

Mean Age: 58.9 years

Range: 44-64 years (~50% White and 30% Hispanic)

ED Admissions

303 ED Admissions for ADRD in patients younger than 65 years (6.6% of all

► ADRD ED admissions).

Mean Age: 56.5 years

Range: 14-64 years (~60% White and 30% Hispanic)

Hospitalizations

478 Hospitalizations for ADRD patients younger than 65 years (5.8% of all ADRD Hospitalizations).

Mean Age: 57.3 years

Range: 12-64 years (~50% White, 30% Hispanic, and 10% AIAN)

Conclusions

- Life expectancy for New Mexico older adults is better than that for US older adults
- Geographic, particularly unfavorable to rural areas, and racial/ethnic disparities persist in New Mexico
 - However the disparities do not appear to be as great as those for all ages health indicators
- The health status of older adults in New Mexico should be tracked on a regular basis
