MyPower's programs have reached more than 4,500 girls, making it the largest youth development program in Lea County.




WHY ARE THE CITIZENS OF LEA COUNTY CONCERNED?



- MyPower began with a diverse group of community leaders who first started researching and discussing the issue in 2009.
- Research showed that Lea County had the highest teen pregnancy rates in the State. The State of New Mexico was #1.
- Extreme concern for the 15-17 year old teen pregnancy rates. 13-14 year old teen birth rates were not included, but not uncommon.
- Research to find solutions showed mentoring programs, the implementation of evidenced-based sex education, and easy access to teen friendly reproductive care makes a difference in lowering teen STD and teen pregnancy rates.

MYPOWER'S PROGRAMS:









MyPower Mentoring Circles

A FUN 12-week after school program for 5th grade girls with a focus on making good choices, goal setting, succeeding academically and avoiding teen pregnancy. More than 90+% participation in our 8 elementary schools. The curriculum provides straight talk, anatomy lessons and breaking cycles.

MyPower Middle School Edition

Dynamic program held on campus during advisory period 7 times a year. Quantum Learning Network's 8 Keys of Excellence provide the core of the program.

MyPower Quantum Leadership Camps

Quantum Learning Network Leadership Camps focus on life skills and academic skills. Girls learn what kind of learners they are, and how to make the most of school and life. Academic emphasis on skills such as memorization, note taking and math. These camps are FREE to all 6th – 9th grade girls in Lea County. Empowerment and ownership are key components in the curriculum.

- The plan is rooted in sound evidence and successful teen pregnancy prevention.
- Community voices were essential in the development of Lea County's plan.
- A 16-member team from the original 30 committee members is working to oversee the Roadmap progress.
- Lea County is proud to work together to make a difference for our kids.

LEA COUNTY'S PLAN

- With MyPower's leadership, a diverse group of 30 Lea County's citizens was formed to put together a community plan.
- This committee included men and women from the faith, school, medical, and business community who came together to review, research and develop a plan to work to reduce teen pregnancy in our county.
- National experts helped facilitate and write our plan:

Dr. Escamilla has developed several national programs focused on the Latino community.

Dr. Susan Tortolero is the Director of the Center for Health Promotion and Prevention Research with the University of Texas School of Public Health.

Sharon Edwards is a founder of the National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy and the Texas Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy, and is one of the founders of the Teen Outreach Program (TOP). She is a leader in the African American community.

The Working Partner, a Texas-based consulting firm, helped facilitate and guide the process.

THE ROADMAP HAS 5 KEY STRATEGIES FOR LEA COUNTY:



- I. Make evidenced-based, comprehensive sex education accessible to all young women and men in Lea County.
- 2. Identify and promote multiple places (including the establishment of school-based clinics) where teens can go to access information and resources about sexual health and contraceptive care.
- 3. Encourage and assist adults to have safe and open conversations with youth about sexual health and healthy relationships.
- 4. Develop programs that expand teens' educational and career goals.
- 5. Create a countywide coalition that will manage this comprehensive plan and track progress in achieving the goal. (Done!) The coalition started monthly meetings in October 2016.

THE GOAL OF THE ROADMAP COMMITTEE:

Reduce the Lea County 15-17 year old teen birth rate by 30 percent, to a rate of 29 births per 1,000 by 2018-2019.







TRACKING PROGRESS

GOALS:

- Every school district in Lea County will have evidenced-based, comprehensive sex education curricula in place that meets New Mexico health education standards.
- Local health providers will report more teens accessing contraceptive care at their clinics; and, among these teens, more will report using reliable and effective methods of birth control.
- Provide information to teens and parents about building healthy relationships.
- > Provide more mentoring programs and unique opportunities for teens to explore career and college possibilities.



HOW YOU CAN HELP OUR EFFORTS IN LEA COUNTY:

- I. Provide the Department of Health offices in Hobbs and Lovington with adequate funding to hire a full time provider who focuses on reproductive health. Over the last several years, the offices have gone from having a full-time provider to only two days a month in Hobbs and one day a month in Lovington.
- 2. Reinstate funding for comprehensive school-based clinics.
