

Who We Are

- The Defense-State Liaison Office, or DSLO, was established by Office of the Undersecretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness in 2004.
- DSLO is charged to address designated Personnel and Readiness Key Issues with state policymakers to change laws and policies to improve military family wellbeing.
- We have helped to enact nearly 800 bills covering a wide range of state issues:
 - Family law, education, occupational licensure and employment support, consumer protection, voting, health policy, National Guard support and state judicial systems

2022 Key Issues - Licensure Portability

- ✓ Enhanced Spouse Licensure Portability 2021: NM HB 120 (Alcon)
 - States can streamline state licensing processes for relocating military spouses by providing them with a license within 30 days with minimal initial paperwork.

☐Military Spouse Occupational Licensure Access

- States validate that existing licensure policies are being enacted by boards and information is on board websites and applications for military spouses.
- □Occupational Licensure Compacts − 2019 NM SB 1 Kernan (Nurses);
 Attempted in 2021: NM SB 119 (Psychology), NM HB 60 (Physical Therapy) and NM HB 210 (Audiology Speech Language Pathology)
 - States can facilitate the ability of professionals, including military spouses, to work across state lines by enacting occupational licensure interstate compacts.

2022 Key Issues - Education

- ✓ Advance Enrollment 2021: NM SB 272 (Pope)
- States can help by waiving proof of residency requirements until the student arrives in the new state on military transfer orders.
- ✓ Purple Star School Program 2021: NM 271 (Pope)
 - By establishing statewide Purple Star Schools programs, states can encourage local education agencies to implement practices that assist military children with transitions/deployments.
- ✓ In-State Tuition Continuity 2005: NM SB 921 (Rawson)
 - Allows a military child to maintain in-state residence status for tuition determination based on time of acceptance to the university, even if the military parent has moved out of state.

Open Enrollment Flexibility (NEW for 2022)

 States can provide military families with increased flexibility through access to district open enrollment policies.

2022 Key Issues – Other Areas

- ✓ Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting 2019: Policy update by the NM CY&FD
 - States can assist the department by requiring local jurisdictions to identify military families and develop reporting and information-sharing procedures between civilian child protective services and military child advocacy.

☐ "Ask the Question" Campaign

 State agencies can connect service members, veterans and their families with local, state and federal resources by asking the question, "Have you or a family member ever served in the military?" on all intake forms.

Concurrent Jurisdiction (NEW in 2022)

 States' juvenile courts can adjudicate juvenile offenses when concurrent jurisdiction is established between state and federal authorities over military installations.
