Public School Capital Outlay Council (PSCOC) manages the allocation of the Public School Capital Outlay Act Fund (PSCOF) to public school facilities in New Mexico's 89 school districts and 2 special schools (School for the Deaf and School for the Blind and Visually Impaired).

PSCOC Programs

New Programs:

- Teacher Housing Pilot Program (2022)
 - Teacher housing program will allow the PSCOC to provide funding to design and construct school district teacher housing.
- Pre-K facilities (2021)
 - Participation in facilities to house Pre-K
- Other Programs/Distributions:
 - Facilities Master Plan Assistance (2003)
 - Standards (2004) renovation, additions or new construction
 - Lease Assistance (2005)
 - Broadband (2014) fiber and network equipment
 - Systems (2017) HVAC, roofing, windows etc.
 - Demolition 100% state funded
 - Pre-K (2018) Pre-K classrooms
 - Teacher Housing -\$10M for existing teacher housing debt (2019)
 - Outside of Adequacy \$24M (2019)
 - Impact Aid \$ 18.8M facility maintenance/repairs and other infrastructure needs for school districts with federal impact aid for tribal lands (2019)
 - SB212 \$75M maintenance and repair of school facilities (2022)

PSFA Process Improvements

Based on input from school districts, design professionals and contractors and direction from the PSCOC, PSFA began working on process improvement. With the goal of simplification, and efficiency for districts and the PSCOC.

District and other Stakeholder recommendations for improvement:

- Simplicity
- Consistency
- Expedition of projects
- RFP processes
- PSFA staff training
- District training

Implemented improvements:

- Combined planning & design phases; reduction of 6 to 9 months
- Simplification of award process; initial application is a letter of intent
- Web based applications; standards, systems, FMP, lease assistance, pre-k, teacher housing
- Streamlining of internal processes; reduction of 3 to 6 months in various areas
- Enhanced training; creates consistency
- Partnering meetings with districts; allows action and improvement based on their concerns as well as understanding from each side

Adequacy Standards

- Developed in response to Zuni lawsuit (1999)
 - District Court ruled that public school capital outlay funding was violating the State
 Constitution that guarantees establishment and maintenance of a "uniform system of free public schools sufficient for the education of all children of school age"
 - Court ordered the State to "establish and implement a uniform funding system for capital improvements and for correcting past inequities"
- 1999 2001 PSCOC develops draft "New Mexico Public Schools Facility Adequacy Standards"
- 2002 PSCOC adopts first version of the Adequacy Standards
 - Establish the minimum acceptable level of physical condition and enrollment capacity of school buildings
 - o Provide a **measuring stick** to evaluate any existing or proposed public school building
 - Defined minimum sizes of select space types, based on PED Standards for Excellence
- 2002 2004 Statewide Assessments and Ranking of Schools
- 2004 First Standards-Based funding awards, based on the statewide ranking

Adequacy Standards Updates

"The New Mexico public school statewide adequacy standards are *dynamic* and the council plans to review them regularly and change them as time and circumstances require."



Year	Site Features	Building Spaces
2002	Parking, Play Area/Playground for ES, Hard Surface Play Area and Play Field for MS and HS, Fencing for K-6 only	Special Ed not included, 3000 and 5000 NSF minimum Career Ed at MS and HS, cafeteria minimum 10-15 NSF per student
2005	Minor technical changes	Special Ed classroom requirement added, Career Ed reduced to 3 and 4 NSF per student, Cafeteria minimum set at 15 NSF per student, Student health minimum and maximum size defined
2007	Added Hard Surface Play Area and Play Field for ES, MS and HS, Fencing for All Grade Levels	Classroom storage minimum NSF added to minimum classroom NSF, Art classroom minimum NSF increased from 2.5 to 4 NSF per student, Career Ed minimum size reduced to 650 NSF, Cafeteria sized for no more than 3 turns, Student health maximum size eliminated

Adequacy Planning Guide

The Adequacy Planning Guide is intended for NEW schools

- Best practices guide for the design of new schools
- Based on national and local school planning criteria
- Performance criteria, estimated project size and cost
- Defines the limit of state funding participation
- Maximum Allowable Gross Square Feet Calculator
- Adequacy Standards Minimum + 30% tare + 20-40% Unassigned GSF
