



#### History of Past Actions: U.S. 550 Animas River Bridge to CO







#### New Mexico Wildlife Corridors Act (SB228)

Sponsored by Senator Mimi Stewart and Representatives Joanne Ferrary and Georgene Louis; Signed by Governor Lujan-Grisham 28 March 2019



CHAPTER AN ACT

RELATING TO WILDLIFE; ENACTING THE WILDLIFE CORRIDORS ACT; IDENTIFYING AND PROTECTING WILDLIFE CORRIDORS; REQUIRING A WILDLIFE CORRIDORS ACTION PLAN TO BE CREATED THAT PROVIDES COMPREHENSIVE GUIDANCE TO STATE AGENCIES FOR IDENTIFYING, PRIORITIZING AND MAINTAINING IMPORTANT AREAS FOR WILDLIFE MOVEMENT; PROVIDING POWERS AND DUTIES; DIRECTING THE DEVELOPMENT OF A LIST OF PRIORITY PROJECTS BASED ON THE ACTION PLAN.

# The Wildlife Corridors Action Plan

- Identifies highway segments where we can promote motorists' safety and crash reduction
- Identifies wildlife linkages across the state for large mammals and species of concern
- Encourages NMDOT and NMDGF to use the best available science, and collaborate with Tribal governments, non-government organizations, federal land management agencies, private landowners, and the public to identify mitigation actions

# The Act Identifies Six Large Mammal Focal Species









Private Landowners: As stated in the Act, involvement with project implementation is on a voluntary basis.








#### US 180 & NM 90 Silver City WVC Hotspot














### US 70 Bent Sacramento Mtns WVC Hotspot







# US 64 & US 84 Chama Wildlife Corridor








### NM 38 Questa to Red River Wildlife Corridor\*




# New Mexico's Top 11 WVC Hotspots & Wildlife Corridors



# Final Steps...

#### Public Involvement 2022

- Draft Action Plan released January 12, 2022
  - Sent Notice Letters to stakeholders, including agencies, non-profits, Tribes
  - Public notices via press releases, social media, websites
- February 2022 2 virtual public meetings hosted
- Comment period ended on March 12, 2022
  - Comments submitted via email/written/phone



## Final Steps and What's Next

- March 2022 Reviewed and responded to comments
- June 2022 Update and released Final Action Plan
- Ongoing Secure funds and plan for top projects
  - \$2 million for FY 2023
  - New Mexico Wildlife Safe Passages Coalition
  - Coordination with USFS, BLM, and Jicarilla Apache Nation to design Cuba mitigation project (Phased)
- Ongoing Continue to update the Action Plan
