WHO WE ARE... Tied to communities in 26 Counties

- 35 parks statewide, including
 19 lakes and 191,586 acres of land and water
- Approximately \$100 million in fixed assets
- 4.75 million visitors annually
- 70% of New Mexicans live within 40 miles of a state park
- State Parks' visitation positively impacts rural economies throughout New Mexico.



The Value of Outdoor Recreation

- Outdoor recreation generates \$6.1 billion in direct consumer spending, resulting in:
 - 68,000 New Mexico jobs
 - \$1.7 billion in wages and salaries
 - \$458 million in state and local tax revenue
- On average, 3 million out-of-state visitors participate in outdoor recreation annually spend nearly \$1,000 per trip, or \$290 per day

Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP)

- Required to be updated every 5 years in order for the state to continue receiving LWCF funds.
- Highlights current and needed outdoor recreation resources in the state and creates outdoor recreation priorities.
- Provides guidance to the state for awarding LWCF local assistance grants.
- Completion date in Fall 2021.




State Parks Budget: General Fund vs. Other Sources




Visitation, Revenue, & Expenditures Fiscal Year 2021

LAND & WATER CONSERVATION FUND

The **LWCF State and Local Assistance Program** provides matching grants to support state, local and tribal governments and is administered through the State Parks Division. Grants fund the acquisition and/or development of outdoor recreation areas and facilities on public land.

Projects funded through the LWCF require a **50% match** and are legally bound to remain as outdoor recreation facilities **in perpetuity.**

Annual appropriations of LWCF funds to NM are anticipated to be around \$3M.

State Parks is currently soliciting proposals for \$1.5M in total grant funds. Solicitations will occur annually. An additional \$150M is currently available through the Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership **(ORLP)** for urban, underserved and economically challenged areas. Proposals are being solicited.



Park Capital Investments: Statewide

 - 15 Cibola, Eddy, Sierra, Union, Rio Arriba, Santa Fe, San Juan, Roosevelt, San Miguel, and Bernalillo Counties
 - □ \$4.273 million state and federal funds
- Capital Investment Projects [Completed 2021]
 - 11 Cibola, Chaves, Eddy, Sierra, Santa Fe, Dona Ana, San Juan, Mora, Colfax, and San Miguel Counties
 - □ \$6.272 million in state and federal funds
- Capital Investment Projects [Ongoing 2021]
 - 17 Cibola, Eddy, San Miguel, Rio Arriba, Santa Fe, San Juan, Bernalillo, Colfax, De Baca, Dona Ana
 - □ \$6.395 million state and federal funds
- Capital Investment Projects [Slated 2022-2024]
 - 16 Counties; \$41.412 million state and federal funds
