What is it?

The Recovering America's
Wildlife Act is a bipartisan bill
(S 2372 and HR2773)
introduced this congress that
seeks to greatly expand
funding for wildlife
conservation. The Act was
introduced in the Senate by
Sen. Heinrich (D-NM) and Sen
Blunt (R-MO).





How does it work?

The bill would annually dedicate up to \$1.4 billion of existing federal funds to state and tribal wildlife management agencies. Each State's or Tribal allocation will be determined by a formula incorporating population, land and water area and percent of all federally threatened and endangered wildlife species present.



What does it do?

- Allocates \$27 million but would require \$9 million in matching funds from the state
- Funds could be used for wildlife research, monitoring, restoration and species recovery as well as new or expanded education programs
- Manage Species of Greatest
 Conservation Need and habitats
- Recover threatened and endangered species
- Conduct wildlife conservation education to foster natural resource stewardship
- Manage, control and prevent invasive species, disease and threats
