



FY23 OPERATING BUDGET




Park Visitation & Revenue Fiscal Years 19-22







PARK REVENUE TOP 5 PARKS FY22










ARPA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND EXPENDITURES FISCAL YEAR 2022






- The 2021-2026 SCORP was completed December 2021; and approved March 2022. SCORP complements and supports SLO outdoor recreation efforts.
- The SCORP provides recommendations to guide outdoor recreation providers in achieving a common vision for outdoor resources in New Mexico.
- Identifies the economic contributions of outdoor recreation to the state and the nation.
- The SCORP is updated every five years. These updates are a federal requirement for the state and allow New Mexico to continue to receive federal funding from the Land and Water Conservation Fund.

Economic Impact of Outdoor Recreation in New Mexico

- Contributed \$2.4B to New Mexico's GDP,
 2.2% of the state's total GDP. Of that number, 27% in direct spending on outdoor recreation activities and 63% supported construction and travel.
- Created 35,065 jobs in the state and \$1.2B in total compensation, along with 3.1% and 2.3% of total employment and compensation in the state, respectively.
- Our state ranks fifth in the country for value-added growth and second for employment growth in the outdoor recreation industry.
- Between 2015 and 2019, the number of total visitors to New Mexico grew 12% and visitor spending grew 18%.



LAND & WATER CONSERVATION FUND

- The LWCF State and Local Assistance Program provides matching grants to support state, local and tribal governments and is administered through the State Parks Division. Grants fund the acquisition and/or development of outdoor recreation areas and facilities on public land.
- Projects funded through the LWCF require a 50% match and are legally bound to remain as outdoor recreation facilities in perpetuity.
- Annual appropriations of LWCF funds to NM are anticipated to be around \$3M.
- State Parks is currently soliciting proposals, these solicitations will occur annually.
- An additional \$150M is currently available through the Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership (ORLP) for urban, underserved and economically challenged areas.
