Budget Priorities

Irrigation Works Construction Fund – Interstate Stream Commission

The Irrigations Works Construction Fund is administered by the Interstate Stream Commission. It derives its income from the Permanent Reservoirs for Irrigation Purposes Income Fund, which is one of the beneficiaries of income generated from certain State Trust Lands. The New Mexico State Legislature appropriates funds from the Irrigation Works Construction Fund to the Interstate

Stream Commission for dams, irrigation works, water rights, and other purposes related to water conservation.

The New Mexico State Legislature appropriates \$1.9 million from the Irrigation Works Construction Fund for the Acequia Construction Program of the Interstate Stream Commission. This funding is used to support the 80-20 Cost Share Program in which the state matches a 20% contribution from acequias. Funds from the IWCF are also used for low interest loans to acequias for construction projects.

For several years, expenditures out of the IWCF have exceeded revenues and projections by the ISC suggest the fund could be depleted by 2015. The ISC will make recommendations to the New Mexico State Legislature to maintain the long term solvency of the Fund. These include replenishing the fund with a General Fund appropriation and limiting the use of the fund to water projects rather than agency operating costs.

Acequia and Community Ditch Fund – New Mexico Department of Agriculture

The Acequia and Community Ditch Fund (ACDF) was created by the New Mexico State Legislature to assist acequias with legal representation in the adjudication process. The New Mexico Department of Agriculture (NMDA) administers the fund as a competitive grants program for which regional associations of acequias are eligible. Funds are used for the common defense of acequia-based water rights including the cost of attorneys and expert witnesses. In recent years, the recurring appropriation to the ACDF was reduced with across-the-board budget cuts from about \$650k to about \$500k. NMAA is requesting that the original funding level be restored.

Acequia and Community Ditch Education Program

The Acequia and Community Ditch Education Program was created by the New Mexico State Legislature as a line item in the Local Government Division budget at the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA). The agency contracts the work through a competitive bidding process and, currently, the New Mexico Acequia Association provides services under a professional services contract. NMAA provides technical assistance and educational workshops on acequia governance in addition to serving as a policy liaison with local, state, and federal government. NMAA is requesting that this recurring budget item continue.

Policy Issues

Capital Outlay Reform

Acequias and community ditches, like other local governments, will be requesting Capital Outlay Funds from the New Mexico State Legislature. NMAA has encouraged acequias to prepare Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plans to identify priorities, phase projects if necessary, and leverage multiple sources of funding. NMAA recommends that Capital Outlay Reform include consideration of acequias including the need for technical assistance in the planning and design

process, a methodical system for evaluating projects for readiness to proceed, and a funding mechanism to complete projects (or functional phases of projects).

Water Transfers

Acequias are working to adapt increasing demands to transfer water rights out of agriculture to other uses by building their capacity to exercise their authority over water transfers granted to them in state statute by the New Mexico State Legislature since 2003. Acequias may approve or deny an application for a water transfer based on determination on whether the transfer is "detrimental to acequias or its members." NMAA will keep state policymakers informed about the implementation of this law and possible legal challenges. In 2009, NMAA also supported a change in the law to prevent the condemnation of agricultural water rights by municipalities. This has served as a measure of protection for agriculture in New Mexico.

Tri-State v. D'Antonio

The Supreme Court decision recognizes the importance of the ability of the state to administer by priority but it also raises questions about the method to be used by the State Engineer in making administrative determinations of water rights where there is no partial or final decree from a court.

72-2-9.1. Priority administration; expedited water marketing and leasing; state engineer


A. The legislature recognizes that the adjudication process is slow, the need for water administration is urgent, compliance with interstate compacts is imperative and the state engineer has authority to administer water allocations in accordance with the water right priorities recorded with or declared or otherwise available to the state engineer.

- B. The state engineer shall adopt rules for priority administration to ensure that authority is exercised:
- (1) so as not to interfere with a future or pending adjudication;
- (2) so as to create no impairment of water rights, other than what is required to enforce priorities; and
- (3) so as to create no increased depletions.
- C. The state engineer shall adopt rules based on the appropriate hydrologic models to promote expedited marketing and leasing of water in those areas affected by priority administration. The rules shall be consistent with the rights, remedies and criteria established by law for proceedings for water use leasing and for changes in point of diversion, place of use and purpose of use of water rights. The rules shall not apply to acequias or community ditches or to water rights served by an acequia or community ditch.

D. Nothing in this section shall affect the partial final decree and settlement agreement as may be entered in the Carlsbad irrigation district project offer phase of State of New Mexico ex rel. State Engineer v. Lewis, et al., Nos. 20294 and 22600 (N.M. 5th Jud. Dist.).

Congreso de las Acequias

Representation by Regions of the State



The Congreso de las Acequias, the governing body of the New Mexico Acequia Association, is a federation of regional delegates. The delegates to the Congreso can come from two types of regions:

Type 1 Region: This type of Region has an established regional acequia association. This type of region has automatic representation on the Congreso de las Acequias. The number of delegates depends on the number of acequias in that regional association. Each regional acequia association names its own delegates by completing a Type 1 Membership Form. Then those delegates are affirmed at the annual meeting of the Congreso de las Acequias and those delegates remain in place until the regional acequia association names new delegates.

Type 2 Region: This type of Region does not have an organized regional acequia association. However, these regions are recognized for purposes of representation. A Type 2 region can have only one delegate. A region can name a delegate by completing a Type 2 membership form. Then the delegate is affirmed at the annual meeting of the Congreso de las Acequias. The term for a Type 2 delegate is one year.

Type 2 Region


