Empowering Communities. Reducing Energy Burdens. Improving Health.

CEED is an Equity Initiative,

relieving the hidden Energy Burden in lowincome communities.

Key facts:

- Most households spend 2–5% of income on home energy
- Low-income households spend 17% over \$4,000/year for families living on \$25,000
- This burden makes even basic home improvements nearly impossible without support



Key facts:

High energy costs directly affect health; energy burdens=health burdens.

- Increased respiratory and cardiovascular conditions
- Higher risk of arthritis, asthma, and allergies
- · Stress-related mental health impacts
- Cold climates: higher mortality
- Hot climates: dehydration & heat-related illnesses

These burdens stack, making it harder to stay healthy and safe.





CEED is a Sustainability Initiative

Key facts:

- The Building Sector makes up 56% of the greenhouse gas emissions in Albuquerque
- Maximizing energy efficiency in our homes can cut energy use & emissions in half by 2050

Benefits of Energy Efficiency Programs

- Saves 6 American lives every day
- Avoids up to \$20 billion in health harms each year
- Provides up to 75% health improvement ROI in low-income housing
- Saves households ~\$500/year in avoided energy costs

COMMUNITY ENERGY EFFICIENCY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (cont.)

Timeline & Progress of CEED Program

Early 2020s – City of Albuquerque Launches CEE Community Energy Efficiency Program

- Albuquerque City Council appropriated \$100,000 annually for 3 years (\$300,000 total)
- Addressed infrastructure gaps not covered by utility programs
- City contracted with Prosperity Works to expand community-based implementation
- Received state and national recognition for its community-centered approach

2023–2024: CEED Program Development

- CEE success informed the CEED program
- City of Albuquerque submitted application to CEED in late 2023
- City of Abg notified of award in mid-2024

State Funding Overview: \$10 Million Total, awarded to 8 applicants (ranging \$800k-\$2M):

- Aztec
- Las Cruces
- Town of Bernalillo
- County of Santa Fe
- City of Santa Fe
- Taos
- Housing NM





Challenges Getting CEED Started

- CEED was a brand-new program
- Required a full municipal ordinance, (enacted by City of Abg in April 2025)
- Required budget revisions
- Delays due to new structure, approvals, and administrative setup

July 2025: Official Launch

- City of Albuquerque officially launched
 CEED at the start of the Fiscal Year
- Prosperity Works began field work July 2025
- Despite delays, the City is pleased to bring this crucial program to residents
