





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



#### 1993 to 2013 - Number of Applicants




#### 1993 to 2013 Number of Applicants



#### 1993 to 2013 Number of Admitted Applicants




#### 1993 to 2013 Number of Admitted Applicants



#### 1993 to 2013 Number of Matriculated Applicants




#### 1993 to 2013 Number of Matriculated Applicants




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**Percent of All Applicants Admitted**





**Percent of All Native Applicants Admitted**
















**Indian Law Certificate Graduates 1995 - 2013**





**SILC Appropriation Levels**








### Law School Instructional Costs – AY 2013 to 2014


### Law Library Costs compared with LIPP/SILC Library Book Budget





### Combined Number of LIPP/SILC Courses Offered per Year




### Student Credit Hours Generated - AY 2012 to 2013







**Percentage of Total Financial Aid Given by Navajo Nation - AY 2013 to 2014**



### Total Awards for Native Students




### Average Scholarship per Native Student



### Law and Indigenous Peoples Program - Program Leadership & Staff Support Timeline



**Date Established:** 1970

**Description:** Originally established as the American Indian Law Students Association (AILSAs), the National Native American Law Students Association (NNALSA) was founded to promote the study of Federal Indian Law, Tribal Law and traditional forms of governance, and to support Native Americans in law school. AILSA expanded to become National NALSA, which includes local NALSA chapters at various law schools throughout the country. NNALSA strives to reach out to Native communities and encourage Native peoples to pursue legal education. NNALSA also strives to educate the legal community about Native issues. NNALSA is comprised of Native and non-Native law students from around the country and is incorporated in New Mexico.

UNM NALSA is an active community of Native and non-Native UNM law students committed to promoting the study of law by Native Americans. UNM NALSA also promotes the study of and development of Indian Law, and is committed to the recruitment, retention, and success of Indian students. The UNM NALSA community offers academic support for members, and strives to have a positive impact in the local Native community.




