Water Project Fund

In 2001 the New Mexico State Legislature, through the Water Project Finance Act, created the Water Project Fund and the diverse Water Trust Board.

Water project recommendations to the Legislature come from a consensus among this broad representation of interests on how best to address New Mexico's water needs into the future and how to best allocate precious resources.

The **Water Trust Board** is charged with:

- prioritizing projects for recommendation to the Legislature for financing from the Water Project Fund; and
- adopting rules and regulations governing the terms and conditions of grants or loans made from the Water Project Fund.





Financial Assistance

Funding from the Water Trust Board is supported through the financial framework of these three funds for statewide water projects.



Financial Assistance



Water Trust Fund

- Held in the State Treasury
- Invested by the State Investment Officer
- Endowed with \$40 million in Spring 2006
- Fall 2006: the Water Trust Fund became a Permanent Fund
- Annual distribution of \$4 million into the Water Project Fund

Financial Assistance

Water Project Fund

- Created in the New Mexico Finance Authority
- Receives an annual 10% distribution of the State's Severance Tax Bond Proceeds (\$33.2 million in 2013 estimated, \$31.3 million in 2014)
- Receives an annual distribution from the Water Trust Fund (\$4 million in 2013)
- Net 10% of funds for water rights adjudication
- Loans and grants awarded to authorized and qualified water projects (\$36,749,760 to be awarded in June 2013, \$34.9 million estimated available for water projects in 2014.)

	Acequia Project Fund

Acequia Project Fund

- Created in 2004, provides grant funding to legislatively authorized acequia projects
- Endowed with \$200,000 by private donation
- January 2009, rules and polices were adopted establishing a means to award acequia project funds
- Projects are reviewed by an inter agency team with staff from the New Mexico Finance Authority & the Interstate Stream Commission
- The Acequia Project Fund projects are prioritized by the Water Trust Board for recommendation to the Legislature and funding by the New Mexico Finance Authority

Adjudication Funding

The 2005 legislature created House Bill 1110 which transfers 10% of the WTB funding to the State Engineer for water rights adjudication:

- 10% of the funds in the Water Project Fund are appropriated to the Office of the State Engineer (and the Administrative Office of the Courts) for adjudication; and
- 20% of the funds for OSE water rights adjudication is allocated to the Administrative Office of the Courts for eligible costs associated with those adjudications.
- 2014 estimated amount for adjudication is \$3,530,000.


Application Process

- By statute, the Water Trust Board may fund **five** types of projects:
 1. Storage, Conveyance and Delivery of Water;
 2. Implementation of the Endangered Species Act Collaborative Programs;
 3. Restoration and Management of Watersheds;
 4. Flood prevention; and
 5. Conservation, Recycling, Treatment or Reuse.

Application Process

- **Phase 1-Funding Application (August 2013-September 2013):** The applications will be reviewed in the Fall to determine a qualified project and/or a qualified entity.
- A final list will be compiled and the applications will be reviewed and approved by the Water Trust Board for presentation to the Legislature.
- The Water Trust Board recommends a list for legislative authorization. After authorization, projects are then eligible for funding.
- **Phase 2-Readiness Application (November 2013-March 2014):** Applications will be reviewed for compliance with OSE and NMED regulations as well as the State Audit Rule.
- The applications from compliant entities will be reviewed and ranked by the seven agency technical team using the Water Trust Board's approved criteria.
- The Water Trust Board determines funding on terms and conditions established by the Water Trust Board and the New Mexico Finance Authority.
- New Mexico Finance Authority then makes loans and grants to qualified entities for projects prioritized by the Water Trust Board and authorized by the Legislature.



Application Review

- The seven-agency technical team is comprised of staff from:
 - New Mexico Environment Department
 - Department of Game & Fish
 - Department of Agriculture
 - New Mexico Finance Authority
 - Department of Finance & Administration
 - Office of the State Engineer
 - NM Energy Minerals & Natural Resources Department
- These agencies work in collaboration to ensure all applications submitted receive a comprehensive evaluation.


Application Review: Project Prioritization

- Prioritizes projects that are ready **to put the shovel in the ground** with all water rights, funding and design requirements in place at the time of award
- Prioritizes regional projects and projects that share services to achieve operating efficiencies
- Prioritizes projects that leverage state funding with local and federal funds
- Prioritizes urgent projects
- The Water Trust Board will lead the initiative in water infrastructure sustainability


Application Review: Local Contribution

- Policies require minimum contributions from all applicants in the form of matching funds.
- Mandatory loan component of between 10% - 40% for all entities supported by a rate-paying constituency.
- Projects undertaken by Tribal governments, watersheds and endangered species collaborative are able to substitute additional matching funds for the loan component.
- Annual “hardship waivers” available for systems not **yet** able to make loan payments.




Application Review: Eligibility and Prioritization Criteria

- NMAC 19.25.19.8 “the Board will develop and consider a variety of factors in reviewing and evaluating water project proposals to determine which projects to recommend as qualifying water projects for appropriation by the state legislature.”
- The minimum criteria includes:
 - Cost-Effectiveness of Water Project
 - Water Rights Scientific, Hydrologic & Biological Studies
 - Comprehensive Solution/Measurable Outcome
 - Immediate Threats to Public Health, Safety & Welfare
 - Regional Dispersion
 - Local Effort
 - Ability to Pay
 - Ability to Leverage Federal Funds
 - Priority
 - Readiness to Proceed
 - Life of Water Project
 - Urgent

Application Review: Criteria

- *Two sets of criteria:*
 - Water conveyance/delivery/storage, conservation/reuse and flood prevention projects; and
 - Watershed management and endangered species act.
- *Two tiers of criteria:*
 - Financial, managerial and technical capacity to develop and oversee project; and
 - Project readiness.
