2	MAKING GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS AND AUTHORIZING EXPENDITURES BY STATE AGENCIES REQUIRED BY LAW.
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
4	Section 1. SHORT TITLEThis act may be cited as the "General Appropriation Act of 2000".
5	Section 2. DEFINITIONS As used in the General Appropriation Act of 2000:
6	A. "agency" means an office, department, agency, institution, board, bureau, commission,
7	court, district attorney, council or committee of state government;
8	B. "expenditures" means costs, expenses, encumbrances and other financing uses, other than
9	refunds authorized by law, recognized in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for the
10	legally authorized budget amounts and budget period;
11	C. "federal funds" means any payments by the United States government to state government or
12	agencies except those payments made in accordance with the federal Mineral Lands Leasing Act;
13	D. "full-time equivalent" or "FTE" means one or more authorized positions that together
14	receive compensation for not more than two thousand eighty hours worked in fiscal year 2001. The
15	calculation of hours worked includes compensated absences but does not include overtime, compensatory time
16	or sick leave paid pursuant to Section 10-7-10 NMSA 1978;
17	E. "general fund" means that fund created by Section 6-4-2 NMSA 1978 and includes federal
18	Mineral Lands Leasing Act receipts and those payments made in accordance with the federal block grant and
19	the federal Workforce Investment Act, but excludes the general fund operating reserve, the appropriation
20	contingency fund and the risk reserve;
21	F. "interagency transfers" means revenue, other than internal service funds, legally
22	transferred from one agency to another;
23	G. "internal service funds" means:
24	(1) revenue transferred to an agency for the financing of goods or services to another
25	agency on a cost-reimbursement basis; and

1 (2) unencumbered balances in agency internal service fund accounts appropriated by the
2 General Appropriation Act of 2000;

H. "other state funds" means:

4 (1) unencumbered, nonreverting balances in agency accounts, other than in internal
5 service funds accounts, appropriated by the General Appropriation Act of 2000;

6 (2) all revenue available to agencies from sources other than the general fund, internal
 7 service funds, interagency transfers and federal funds; and

8

(3) all revenue, the use of which is restricted by statute or agreement;

9 I. "revenue" means all money received by an agency from sources external to that agency, net 10 of refunds and other correcting transactions, other than from issue of debt, liquidation of investments or 11 as agent or trustee for other governmental entities or private persons; and

J. "unforeseen federal funds" means a source of federal funds or an increased amount of federal funds that could not have been reasonably anticipated or known during the second session of the forty-fourth legislature and, therefore, could not have been requested by an agency or appropriated by the legislature.

16 Section 3. GENERAL PROVISIONS.--

17

A. Amounts set out under column headings are expressed in thousands of dollars.

B. Amounts set out under column headings are appropriated from the source indicated by the
 column heading. All amounts set out under the column heading "Internal Service Funds/Interagency
 Transfers" indicate an intergovernmental transfer and do not represent a portion of total state government
 appropriations. All information designated as "Totals" or "Subtotals" are provided for information and
 are not appropriations.

C. Amounts set out in Section 4 of the General Appropriation Act of 2000, or so much as may
 be necessary, are appropriated from the indicated source for expenditure in fiscal year 2001 for the
 objects expressed.

D. Unencumbered balances in agency accounts remaining at the end of fiscal year 2000 shall revert to the general fund by October 1, 2000, unless otherwise indicated in the General Appropriation Act of 2000 or otherwise provided by law.

E. Unencumbered balances in agency accounts remaining at the end of fiscal year 2001 shall
revert to the general fund by October 1, 2001, unless otherwise indicated in the General Appropriation Act
of 2000 or otherwise provided by law.

F. The state budget division shall monitor revenue received by agencies from sources other than the general fund and shall reduce the operating budget of any agency whose revenue from such sources is not meeting projections. The state budget division shall notify the legislative finance committee of any operating budget reduced pursuant to this subsection.

G. Except as otherwise specifically stated in the General Appropriation Act of 2000, appropriations are made in that act for the expenditures of agencies and for other purposes as required by existing law for fiscal year 2001. If any other act of the second session of the forty-fourth legislature changes existing law with regard to the name or responsibilities of an agency or the name or purpose of a fund or distribution, the appropriation made in the General Appropriation Act of 2000 shall be transferred from the agency, fund or distribution to which an appropriation has been made as required by existing law to the appropriate agency, fund or distribution provided by the new law.

18 H. In August, October, December and May of fiscal year 2001, the department of finance and 19 administration, in consultation with the staff of the legislative finance committee and other agencies, 20 shall prepare and present revenue estimates to the legislative finance committee. If these revenue 21 estimates indicate that revenues and transfers to the general fund, excluding transfers to the general 22 fund operating reserve, the risk reserve, the appropriation contingency fund or the state-support reserve 23 fund, as of the end of fiscal year 2001, are not expected to meet appropriations from the general fund, 24 then the department shall present a plan to the legislative finance committee that outlines the methods by 25 which the administration proposes to address the deficit.

1 I. Pursuant to Sections 6-3-23 through 6-3-25 NMSA 1978, agencies whose revenue from 2 unforeseen federal funds, from state board of finance loans, from revenue appropriated by other acts of 3 the legislature, or from gifts, donations, bequests, insurance settlements, refunds, or payments into 4 revolving funds exceed specifically appropriated amounts may request budget increases from the state 5 budget division. If approved by the state budget division, such money is appropriated. In approving a 6 budget increase from unforeseen federal funds, the director of the state budget division shall advise the 7 legislative finance committee as to the source of the federal funds and the source and amount of any 8 matching funds required.

9 J. For fiscal year 2001, the number of permanent and term full-time equivalent positions 10 specified for each agency shows the maximum number of employees intended by the legislature for that 11 agency, unless another provision of the General Appropriation Act of 2000 or another act of the second 12 session of the forty-fourth legislature provides for additional employees.

13 K. Except for gasoline credit cards used solely for operation of official vehicles and 14 telephone credit cards used solely for official business, none of the appropriations contained in the 15 General Appropriation Act of 2000 may be expended for payment of credit card invoices.

16 L. To prevent unnecessary spending, expenditures from the General Appropriation Act of 2000 17 for gasoline for state-owned vehicles at public gasoline service stations shall be made only for 18 self-service gasoline; provided that a state agency head may provide exceptions from the requirement to 19 accommodate disabled persons or for other reasons the public interest may require.

20 M. When approving operating budgets based on appropriations in the General Appropriation Act 21 of 2000, the state budget division is specifically authorized to approve only those budgets that are in 22 accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for the purpose of properly classifying other 23 financing sources and uses, including interfund, intrafund and interagency transfers.

N. Laws 1999, First Special Session, Chapter 3, Section 4 is repealed effective July 1, 2000.

15 Upon certification by the state board of finance pursuant to Section 6-1-2 NMSA 1978 that a critical 16 emergency exists that cannot be addressed by disaster declaration or other emergency or contingency 17 funds, and upon review by the legislative finance committee, the secretary of finance and administration 18 is authorized to transfer from the general fund operating reserve to the state board of finance emergency 19 fund the amount necessary to meet the emergency. 14 The rate of distribution of the state equalization guarantee distribution shall be based on a program 15 unit value determined by the superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent of public 16 instruction shall establish a preliminary unit value to establish budgets for the 2000-2001 school year; 17 and then upon verification of the number of units statewide for fiscal year 2001, but no later than 18 January 31, the superintendent of public instruction may adjust the program unit value.

It is the intent of the legislature to maximize and strengthen direct student instruction and learning. Continual, comprehensive and uninterrupted instruction by a certified school instructor shall be provided for a total of one hundred eighty teaching days in a school year. Local school boards shall schedule professional development and in-service activities at times that do not interfere or interrupt instructional time during the one hundred eighty teaching days in a school year. In approving the budget for a school district, the state department of public education shall ensure that each local school board increases the school year by at least two additional days for professional development.

In addition to minimum requirements provided in Section 22-8-9 NMSA 1978, no budget for a school district shall be approved by the state department of public education that does not provide for a minimum of a seven-hour teaching day, or the equivalent for those districts operating on a variable school calendar.

5 The legislature encourages local school districts to develop and implement school-based art programs. 6 The appropriation for the state equalization guarantee contains sufficient funds to provide a six and 7 one-fourth percent salary increase for teachers, a five and three-fourths percent increase for other 8 instructional staff and a five percent salary increase for other certified and noncertified staff, 9 including transportation employees. Included in the six and one-fourth percent salary increase for 10 teachers is one-fourth percent for teacher merit pay. The superintendent of public instruction shall 11 distribute the additional one-fourth percent salary increase for teachers upon approval of a plan 12 submitted by a local school board for teacher merit pay. The local school board shall demonstrate 13 evidence of teacher involvement in the development of the district's teacher merit pay plan and that the 14 plan includes components linking teacher merit pay to student performance and that it is based on 15 objective and measurable criteria.

For the 2000-2001 school year, the appropriation for the state equalization guarantee distribution includes sufficient funding for enrollment growth in districts from the 1999-2000 to the 2000-2001 school year. In addition to the additional program units provided by Section 22-8-23.1 NMSA 1978, for the 2000-2001 school year, a school district with an increase in MEM equal to or greater than one percent, when compared with the immediately preceding year, shall be entitled to supplemental additional program units computed by the following formula for enrollment growth: (MEM for current year - MEM for prior year) x 1.36 = Units.

For the 2000-2001 school year, the appropriation for the state equalization guarantee distribution includes sufficient funding for districts implementing a formula-based program for the first time. Those districts shall use current MEM in the calculation of program units for the new formula-based program.

1 Included in the state equalization guarantee are sufficient funds for the purpose of funding 2 additional program units for reading improvement initiatives, kindergarten to grade three, to ensure 3 that, by the end of grade three, all students are reading at grade level. The state department of public 4 education shall distribute funds, upon program approval, to school districts with schools that develop 5 reading improvement programs based on the most current research-based models in the teaching of reading. 6 The department shall distribute funds based on the number of program units determined by multiplying the 7 number of children in the reading improvement initiative by the cost differential factor .048. The 8 department shall monitor the programs and ensure that they serve the children most in need based upon 9 age-appropriate assessments. If the department determines that a program is not meeting the benchmarks 10 necessary to ensure the progress of students in the program, the department shall notify the school 11 district that failure to meet the benchmarks within sixty days will result in the cessation of funding 12 for the program. 15 Included in the state equalization guarantee distribution are sufficient funds for additional 16 program units in optional preschool/full-day kindergarten programs to: (1) implement or expand full-day 17 kindergarten; (2) implement or expand half-day programs for children ages three through five; and (3) 18 implement or expand summer programs or transition programs for children ages three through five. The 19 state department of public education shall distribute funds, upon program approval, to those schools with 20 the highest proportion of students most in need based upon indicators of the at-risk index and to schools 21 with available classroom space. The department shall distribute funds by calculating the early childhood 22 education MEM of 1.0, not including developmentally disabled three- and four-year-old students, multiplied 23 by 0.144. The department shall monitor the programs to measure the progress and effectiveness of the 24 programs. If the department determines that a program is not meeting the benchmarks necessary to ensure 25 the progress of students in the program, the department shall notify the school district that failure to

8 C. The state department of public education shall coordinate data collection, develop a 9 strategic plan and develop baseline data and performance standards for the following quality and 10 effectiveness indicators for public schools: (1) statewide assessment program; (2) promotion rates; (3) 11 dropout rates; (4) attendance rates; (5) quality of education survey questions for school districts; and 12 (6) safety of school environments. One-third of the school districts shall file their strategic plan with 13 the state department of public education, state budget division, the legislative finance committee, 14 legislative education study committee and other appropriate legislative interim committees by September 1, 15 2000.

D. The state budget division shall file a state strategic training plan with the legislative finance committee by May 1, 2000. The plan shall identify training needs of state agencies. All state agencies shall cooperate with the division in the development of the plan. The state budget division shall carry out the training plan by June 15, 2000.

E. The secretary of finance and administration shall report to the legislative finance committee by May 31, 2000 on how the strategic plans of the following agencies address the following duties and how the fiscal year 2001 operating budgets allocate resources to accomplish them:
