### **SUMMARY**

# Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 616 allows a person who is addicted to or uses narcotic drugs or who has been convicted of a violation of any federal or state narcotics law to be licensed on a New Mexico racetrack if sufficient evidence of rehabilitation is presented to the State Racing Commission.

## Significant Issues

Current statute restricts the licensing of such individuals. According to the State Racing Commission, New Mexico is the only jurisdiction in the United States that does not have a means for rehabilitated narcotics users to apply for and receive a license to participate in New Mexico horse racing. Approximately 20 individuals on average per year are denied a license by the State Racing Commission because of narcotic convictions.
