AN ACT

RELATING TO EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION; ESTABLISHING AN OFFICIAL STATE GOAL THAT ALL NEW MEXICO CHILDREN ATTAIN LITERACY BY THE END OF THE THIRD GRADE; CREATING A TASK FORCE TO DEVELOP A PLAN TO ACHIEVE THAT GOAL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

- FINDINGS--OFFICIAL STATE GOAL FOR LITERACY. --Section 1.
 - The legislature finds that:
- New Mexico has a higher percentage of its children living in poverty than any other state;
- it is absolutely critical that our children break this cycle of poverty;
- learning to read and write at an early age instills a love of knowledge and information that leads to a better education, a higher paying job and, ultimately, new

3	(4) with a concentrated effort from our			
4	dedicated teachers and loving parents, it is a realistic goal			
5	that all of our children attain literacy at an early age.			
6	B. The legislature declares the official state goal			
7	for literacy to be that, no later than July 1, 2005, all New			
8	Mexico children attain literacy by the end of the third grade.			
9	All state agencies, institutions and political subdivisions			
10	shall work toward the achievement of this goal.			
11	Section 2. TEMPORARY PROVISIONLITERACY TASK FORCE			
12	CREATI ON DUTI ES			
13	A. There is created the "literacy task force"			
14	composed of nineteen members appointed as follows:			
15	(1) the superintendent of public instruction;			
16	(2) two members of local school boards,			
17	appointed by the state board of education;			
18	(3) two local school district administrators,			
19	appointed by the governor;			
20	(4) three early childhood educators, appointed			
21	by the governor;			
22	(5) one early childhood development expert,			
23	appointed by the board of regents of the university of New			
24	Mexico;			
25	(6) one early childhood development expert,			
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1	appointed by the board of regents of New Mexico state
2	uni versi ty;
3	(7) the chairman of the house education
4	committee;
5	(8) the chairman of the senate education
6	committee;
7	(9) two members of the house of
8	representatives, one of whom shall be a member of the minority
9	party, appointed by the speaker of the house;
10	(10) two members of the senate, one of whom
11	shall be a member of the minority party, appointed by the
12	president pro tempore of the senate; and
13	(11) three representatives of the public,
14	appointed by the governor.
15	B. The literacy task force shall hold an
16	organizational meeting within thirty days of its appointment at
17	which it shall elect a chair and such other officers as it
18	deems necessary. Thereafter, the task force shall meet at the
19	call of the chair but no less frequently than once per month.
20	C. Public members of the literacy task force shall
21	be paid per diem and mileage pursuant to the Per Diem and
22	Mileage Act.
23	D. The task force shall be staffed jointly by the
24	state department of public education, the legislative council

service and the legislative education study committee.

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- E. The literacy task force shall develop a plan containing specific steps so that, by July 1, 2005, all of the children in New Mexico will have attained literacy before the end of the third grade. In developing the plan, the task force shall:
- (1) receive comments and recommendations from literacy experts and interested members of the public;
- (2) consider the role of expanded early childhood education programs, after-school programs and the even start family literacy program;
- (3) identify the costs associated with each step needed to implement the plan and the source of any additional needed money;
- (4) identify legislation or rule changes necessary to implement the plan; and
- (5) establish deadlines for completing each step so that the ultimate goal can be reached by July 1, 2005.
- F. No later than December 15, 2003, the literacy task force shall submit the plan to the legislature and the governor.

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
