**A MEMORIAL**

**REQUESTING THE AGING AND LONG-TERM SERVICES DEPARTMENT TO LEAD  
A STUDY ON THE FINANCIAL IMPACT OF FACILITY-BASED CARE ON THE  
MEDICAID BUDGET AND IDENTIFY ALTERNATIVE MODELS OF FINANCING  
SUCH CARE.**

**WHEREAS, the population of New Mexicans over the age of  
sixty-five is growing and will almost double by the year 2020;  
and**

**WHEREAS, due to medical advances, people are living  
longer, but not necessarily healthier, lives; and**

**WHEREAS, the population of people over the age of eighty-  
five is growing twice as fast as that of people over sixty-  
five, and these are the most frail of the elderly; and**

**WHEREAS, a large and growing number of aging people are  
suffering from the ravages of Alzheimer's disease and are**

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1 unable to care for themselves; and

2 WHEREAS, the medicaid program in New Mexico covers the  
3 cost of nursing home care and home- and community-based  
4 services for the elderly and disabled and provides in excess of  
5 two hundred twenty-one million dollars (\$221,000,000) in  
6 combined state and federal funding for these services; and

7 WHEREAS, the private cost of nursing home care is  
8 unaffordable for most people in need of nursing home care and  
9 therefore most families have come to rely on medicaid to fund  
10 this level of care for their elderly relatives; and

11 WHEREAS, people are finding it relatively easy to qualify  
12 for medicaid long-term care services, despite seemingly  
13 restrictive eligibility rules, and this relaxed access has  
14 resulted in an entitlement mentality regarding the financing of  
15 these services; and

16 WHEREAS, use of private, out-of-pocket and insurance  
17 financing of these long-term care services has languished while  
18 medicaid costs have skyrocketed; and

19 WHEREAS, long-term care insurance, home equity conversion  
20 and other alternative mechanisms for private financing of  
21 long-term care services have been little utilized;

22 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE  
23 OF NEW MEXICO that the aging and long-term services department  
24 be requested to lead a study with the cooperation of the human  
25 services department and appropriate statewide organizations

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1 representing aging and long-term care services to study the  
2 financial impact of facility-based and home- and community-  
3 based care on the medicaid budget and identify alternative  
4 models of financing such care; and

5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this study identify  
6 appropriate incentives to encourage self-care and the use of  
7 insurance, explore potential ways to limit asset identification  
8 and asset transfers and promote maximum medicaid estate  
9 recovery; and

10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the aging and long-term  
11 services department support the efforts of a statewide  
12 organization representing the needs of people with Alzheimer's  
13 disease, and others as appropriate, to hold a conference  
14 exploring alternative models of financing long-term care  
15 services; and

16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the aging and long-term  
17 services department develop recommendations on implementation  
18 of alternative mechanisms for financing long-term care services  
19 and report its findings and recommendations to the interim  
20 legislative health and human services committee at its October  
21 2005 meeting; and

22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the aging and long-term  
23 services department and the human services department provide  
24 copies of the report to appropriate statewide organizations  
25 representing aging and long-term care; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be transmitted to the aging and long-term services department and the human services department.

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
