## SUMMARY

## Synopsis of Bill

A one-time 2008 sales tax holiday would run 10 days, from the Friday after Thanksgiving (November 28, 2008) through the Sunday of the following weekend (December 7, 2008). Nontaxable items include:

- Clothing and footwear items costing less than \$125 each;
- School supplies such as pens and paper that are typically used by students in a classroom setting and that cost $\$ 25$ or less per item;
- Computers costing $\$ 1,000$ or less;
- Handheld calculators costing \$150 or less;
- Energy Star certified items:
- Refrigerators and freezers costing $\$ 2,000$ or less;
- Clothes washers costing $\$ 1,000$ or less;
- Dehumidifiers, dishwashers, room air conditioners, room air cleaners, ceiling fans, programmable thermostats, compact florescent lamps, battery charging systems, water coolers, and decorative string lights costing \$500 or less.


## FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The total estimated cost in FY2009 is $\$ 4.6$ million.

## SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

Several other states have decided to implement an Energy Star sales tax holiday. Georgia and Virginia are the two states that enacted this tax holiday in 2006. Although it is difficult to determine the impact of this holiday, we can assume that these two states continued use of this tax holiday as well as other states deciding to implement similar tax holidays implies it is a successful tax break.
