AN ACT

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF CAPITAL PROJECTS GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR SENIOR CITIZEN FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS, FOR LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS, FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS AT INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS; PROVIDING FOR A TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL OF, INTEREST ON AND CERTAIN COSTS RELATED TO THE BONDS; REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS AT THE 2010 GENERAL ELECTION OF THE STATE; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the "2010 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act".

Section 2. PURPOSE.--For the purpose of providing funds

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1 for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2010 Capital
2 Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation
3 indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and in
4 the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act.

5 Section 3. BOND TERMS.--

6 A. The state board of finance, except as limited by
7 the 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, shall
8 determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds issued
9 pursuant to that act, including but not limited to:

10 (1) date or dates of issue, denominations and
11 maturities;

12 (2) principal amounts;

13 (3) rate or rates of interest; and

14 (4) provisions for redemption, including
15 premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds are
16 issued in one or more series and other covenants relating to
17 the bonds and the issuance thereof.

18 B. The bonds shall be in such form as the state
19 board of finance determines with an appropriate series
20 designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in the
21 resolution of the state board of finance.

22 C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall
23 begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance,
24 and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years after the
25 date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be

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1 payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of
2 the paying agent within or without the state as the state board
3 of finance may direct.

4 D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or
5 facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer, and
6 the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be
7 placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in
8 book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical
9 securities.

10 E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with the
11 provisions of the 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond
12 Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act and the Uniform
13 Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act and may be issued
14 in accordance with the Public Securities Short-Term Interest
15 Rate Act.

16 F. The full faith and credit of the state is
17 pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of and
18 interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the 2010
19 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

20 Section 4. EXPENDITURES.--The proceeds from the sale of
21 the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be
22 distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the
23 amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2010 Capital Projects
24 General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred under
25 Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of the bonds

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1 that are not required for the purposes set forth in Sections 6
2 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose of paying the
3 principal of and interest on the bonds.

4 Section 5. SALE.--The bonds authorized under the 2010
5 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by
6 the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and
7 amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at
8 private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less than
9 par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If sold at
10 public sale, the state board of finance shall publish a notice
11 of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general
12 circulation in the state and may also publish the notice in a
13 recognized financial journal outside the state. The required
14 publications shall be made once each week for two consecutive
15 weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the last
16 publication thereof to be at least five days prior to the date
17 of the sale. The notice shall specify the amount,
18 denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be
19 offered for sale and the place, date and hour at which the
20 sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place specified
21 in the notice, the state board of finance shall open the bids
22 in public and shall award the bonds to the bidder or bidders
23 offering the best price for the bonds. The state board of
24 finance may reject any or all bids and readvertise and may
25 waive any irregularity in a bid. All bids, except that of the

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1 state, shall be accompanied by a deposit of two percent of the
 2 principal amount of the bonds in a form acceptable to the state
 3 board of finance. The deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall
 4 be returned upon rejection of the bid. The state board of
 5 finance may also sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the
 6 state treasurer or state investment officer. The state
 7 treasurer or state investment officer is authorized to purchase
 8 any of the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal
 9 investments for any person or board charged with the investment
 10 of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any
 11 deposit of public money.

12 Section 6. EXPENSES.--The expenses incurred by the state
 13 board of finance in or relating to the preparation and sale of
 14 the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of
 15 the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and other
 16 obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond
 17 proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended,
 18 shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money of
 19 the state, legally available for such payments.

20 Section 7. TAX LEVY.--To provide for the payment of the
 21 principal of and interest on the bonds issued and sold pursuant
 22 to the provisions of the 2010 Capital Projects General
 23 Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and there is hereby imposed
 24 and levied during each year in which any of the bonds are
 25 outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property in the state

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1 subject to property taxation for state purposes sufficient to
2 pay the interest as it becomes due on the bonds, together with
3 an amount sufficient to provide a sinking fund to pay the
4 principal of the bonds as it becomes due and, if permitted by
5 law, ad valorem taxes may be collected to pay administrative
6 costs incident to the collection of such taxes. The taxes
7 shall be imposed, levied, assessed and collected at the times
8 and in the manner that other property taxes for state purposes
9 are imposed, levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of
10 all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be
11 imposed, levied, assessed and collected.

12 Section 8. TREASURER--DUTIES.--The state treasurer shall
13 keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant to the
14 taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of the 2010
15 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and shall use this
16 money only for the purposes of paying the principal of and
17 interest on the bonds as they become due and any expenses
18 relating thereto.

19 Section 9. IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR
20 ISSUANCE.--An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the provisions
21 of the 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act may,
22 either at law or in equity, by suit, action or mandamus,
23 enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by
24 that act of any officer or entity mentioned in that act. The
25 provisions of that act constitute an irrepealable contract with

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1 the owners of any of the bonds issued pursuant to that act for
 2 the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of
 3 the state is pledged. Without reference to any other act of
 4 the legislature, the 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation
 5 Bond Act is full authority for the issuance and sale of the
 6 bonds authorized in that act, and such bonds shall have all the
 7 qualities of investment securities under the Uniform Commercial
 8 Code, shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in
 9 the proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and
 10 shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or
 11 holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the
 12 provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt
 13 from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body
 14 thereof.

15 Section 10. PROJECTS.--The proceeds from the sale of
 16 bonds issued under the provisions of the 2010 Capital Projects
 17 General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as follows for
 18 the purposes and in the amounts specified:

19 A. for senior citizen facility improvements,
 20 construction and equipment acquisition projects, to the aging
 21 and long-term services department:

22 (1) three hundred seventy thousand dollars
 23 (\$370,000) to plan, design, renovate and equip the Bear Canyon
 24 senior center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

25 (2) five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000)

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1 to plan, design, construct, equip and furnish the Highland
2 senior center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

3 (3) five hundred thirty-four thousand dollars
4 (\$534,000) to plan, design, construct, equip and furnish the
5 North Valley senior center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

6 (4) one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to
7 make improvements for building code compliance, including
8 purchase and installation of equipment, to the Rio Bravo meal
9 site in Bernalillo county;

10 (5) fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000) to
11 make improvements for building code compliance, including
12 purchase and installation of equipment, to the Pueblo of Isleta
13 senior center in Bernalillo county;

14 (6) one million dollars (\$1,000,000) to plan,
15 design, construct, equip and furnish the Tijeras senior center
16 in Bernalillo county;

17 (7) fourteen thousand five hundred dollars
18 (\$14,500) to purchase and install meals equipment at Catron
19 countywide senior centers in Catron county;

20 (8) twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to
21 purchase and equip vehicles for the Quemado senior center in
22 Catron county;

23 (9) one hundred fifty thousand dollars
24 (\$150,000) to plan, design, construct, equip and furnish the
25 Hagerman senior center in Chaves county;

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1 (10) one hundred two thousand six hundred
2 dollars (\$102,600) to purchase and equip vehicles for the
3 Roswell-Hagerman senior centers in Chaves county;

4 (11) thirty-five thousand one hundred dollars
5 (\$35,100) to make improvements for building code compliance,
6 including purchase and installation of equipment, to the Grants
7 senior center in Cibola county;

8 (12) one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to purchase
9 and install meals equipment at the Grants senior center in
10 Cibola county;

11 (13) seven thousand five hundred dollars
12 (\$7,500) to plan, design, renovate and equip the Eagle Nest
13 senior center in Colfax county;

14 (14) twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to
15 make improvements for building code compliance, including
16 purchase and installation of equipment, to the Raton senior
17 center in Colfax county;

18 (15) five thousand two hundred dollars
19 (\$5,200) to purchase and install meals equipment at the Grady
20 senior center in Curry county;

21 (16) nine thousand two hundred dollars
22 (\$9,200) to purchase and install meals equipment at the Fort
23 Sumner senior center in De Baca county;

24 (17) one hundred seventy-eight thousand five
25 hundred dollars (\$178,500) to make improvements for building

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1 code compliance, including purchase and installation of
2 equipment, to the Munson senior center in Las Cruces in Dona
3 Ana county;

4 (18) seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000)
5 to make improvements for building code compliance, including
6 purchase and installation of equipment, to the Mesilla Park
7 senior center in Las Cruces in Dona Ana county;

8 (19) fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to
9 purchase and equip vehicles for the Artesia senior center in
10 Eddy county;

11 (20) seventy-eight thousand three hundred
12 dollars (\$78,300) to purchase and equip vehicles for the Eddy

14 (21) twelve thousand four hundred dollars

2 (25) one thousand one hundred dollars (\$1,100)
3 to purchase and install meals equipment at the Eunice senior
4 center in Lea county;

5 (26) one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to purchase
6 and install meals equipment at the Hobbs senior center in Lea
7 county;

8 (27) ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to
9 purchase and install meals equipment at the Jal senior center
10 in Lea county;

11 (28) fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to plan,
12 design, construct, equip and furnish the Carrizozo senior
13 center in Lincoln county;

14 (29) four thousand five hundred dollars
15 (\$4,500) to make improvements for building code compliance,
16 including purchase and installation of equipment, to the Hondo
17 Valley senior center in Lincoln county;

18 (30) eighteen thousand five hundred dollars
19 (\$18,500) to purchase and install meals equipment at Lincoln
20 countywide senior centers in Lincoln county;

21 (31) thirteen thousand five hundred dollars
22 (\$13,500) to plan, design, renovate and equip the Ruidoso

24 (32) eighty-nine thousand dollars (\$89,000) to

2 (33) six thousand five hundred dollars

7 (\$18,500) to purchase and install equipment at the Gallup

16 equipment and library resources for public libraries statewide;
17 and

18 (b) one million seven hundred fifty
19 thousand dollars (\$1,750,000) for supplemental library resource
20 acquisitions, including books and equipment and planning,
21 designing and constructing capital improvements, at library
22 facilities for tribal libraries statewide;

23 (2) to the higher education department, one

14 D. for capital improvements at institutions of
15 higher education and special schools statewide:

16 (1) to the board of regents of eastern New
17 Mexico university:

18 (a) four million dollars (\$4,000,000) to
19 construct and improve the physical plant complex, including
20 purchasing and installing a modular building, at the Roswell
21 branch campus of eastern New Mexico university in Chaves
22 county;

23 (b) five hundred thousand dollars
24 (\$500,000) for renovations and infrastructure improvements,
25 including improvements for energy efficiency and campus safety,

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1 at the Ruidoso branch campus of eastern New Mexico university
2 in Lincoln county;

3 (c) seven million dollars (\$7,000,000)
4 for infrastructure and electric utility upgrades, including
5 distribution; piping; water chillers; heating, ventilation and
6 air conditioning systems; and razing of closed facilities, at
7 eastern New Mexico university in Portales in Roosevelt county;
8 and

9 (d) one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for
10 renovating the Greyhound arena, including heating, ventilation
11 and air conditioning improvements, at eastern New Mexico
12 university in Portales in Roosevelt county;

13 (2) to the higher education department:

14 (a) sixteen million dollars (\$16,000,000) to
15 renovate Jeanette Stromberg hall at central New Mexico community
16 college in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

17 (b) one million dollars (\$1,000,000) to
18 renovate the former allied health facilities for use as computer
19 labs and classrooms at Clovis community college in Clovis in Curry
20 county;

21 (c) three million dollars (\$3,000,000) for
22 roof improvements and replacement at New Mexico junior college in
23 Hobbs in Lea county;

24 (d) two million dollars (\$2,000,000) to
25 plan, design and construct a facility for the renewable energy

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1 program and to purchase and install equipment for the school of
2 trades and technology at San Juan college in San Juan county;

3 (e) five million dollars (\$5,000,000) to
4 renovate the vocational education complex at Luna community
5 college in Las Vegas in San Miguel county; and

6 (f) one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for
7 infrastructure improvements at Santa Fe community college in Santa
8 Fe county;

9 (3) to the board of regents of New Mexico
10 highlands university, seven million one hundred thousand dollars
11 (\$7,100,000) to plan, design, renovate, construct, improve the
12 site, furnish and equip the historic Trolley building at New
13 Mexico highlands university in Las Vegas in San Miguel county;

14 (4) to the board of regents of the New Mexico
15 military institute, five million dollars (\$5,000,000) to renovate
16 Lusk hall to comply with the requirements of the Americans with
17 Disabilities Act of 1990, safety codes and energy and
18 environmental design at New Mexico military institute in Roswell
19 in Chaves county;

20 (5) to the board of regents of New Mexico
21 institute of mining and technology, twelve million dollars
22 (\$12,000,000) to plan, design, construct, equip and furnish phase
23 1 of the geology facility at New Mexico institute of mining and
24 technology in Socorro in Socorro county;

25 (6) to the board of regents of New Mexico state

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1 university:

2 (a) one million seven hundred fifty thousand
3 dollars (\$1,750,000) for infrastructure renovation and
4 improvements, including roof repairs, safety, classrooms, labs,
5 heating and drainage, at the Grants branch campus of New Mexico
6 state university in Cibola county;

7 (b) eighteen million dollars (\$18,000,000)
8 to plan, design, construct, conduct necessary demolition,
9 renovate, furnish, expand and equip the Hershel Zohn theater and
10 Branson library to house the institute for public policy at New
11 Mexico state university in Las Cruces in Dona Ana county;

12 (c) five million six hundred fifty thousand
13 dollars (\$5,650,000) to plan, design, construct, equip and furnish
14 an addition to the Gadsden center at the Dona Ana community
15 college branch of New Mexico state university in Dona Ana county;

16 (d) one million two hundred fifty thousand
17 dollars (\$1,250,000) for infrastructure renovation, including
18 improvements to the heating, ventilation and air conditioning
19 systems, classrooms, energy management systems, hot water systems
20 and transportation and parking, at the Carlsbad branch campus of
21 New Mexico state university in Eddy county; and

22 (e) one million seven hundred fifty thousand
23 dollars (\$1,750,000) for infrastructure renovation, including
24 improvements to energy management and lighting systems and
25 restroom upgrades to comply with the Americans with Disabilities

11 of New Mexico in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

12 (d) four million dollars (\$4,000,000) to
13 plan, design, construct and equip a collaborative teaching and
14 learning building, including demolition of the old facility, for
15 the college of education at the university of New Mexico in
16 Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

17 (e) ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) to
18 plan, design, construct, renovate, equip and furnish the health
19 science education interdisciplinary building at the university of
20 New Mexico in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

21 (f) seven hundred fifty thousand dollars
22 (\$750,000) to renovate and equip labs, classrooms and storage
23 space at the science labs at the Los Alamos branch campus of the
24 university of New Mexico in Los Alamos county;

25 (g) one million four hundred thousand

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1 dollars (\$1,400,000) to construct and make improvements to the
 2 Zollinger library, including completing the lower level shell
 3 space, at the Gallup branch campus of the university of New Mexico
 4 in McKinley county; and

5 (h) two million dollars (\$2,000,000) to
 6 plan, design, construct, equip and furnish phase 1 of the research
 7 center and learning library at the Taos branch campus of the
 8 university of New Mexico in Taos county;

9 (11) to the board of regents of western New
 10 Mexico university, five million five hundred thousand dollars
 11 (\$5,500,000) for infrastructure renovations and improvements,
 12 including renovating the McCray arts building, at western New
 13 Mexico university in Silver City in Grant county; and

14 (12) to the Indian affairs department, one
 15 million two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$1,250,000) for
 16 improvements and security enhancements at southwestern Indian
 17 polytechnic institute in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county.

18 Section 11. ELECTION.--

19 A. Bonds issued pursuant to the 2010 Capital Projects
 20 General Obligation Bond Act shall be submitted to the registered
 21 voters of the state at the general election to be held in November
 22 2010, and, if they receive a majority of all the votes cast
 23 thereon at such election, shall take effect upon certification of
 24 the state canvassing board announcing the results of such
 25 election. No bonds shall be issued or sold under that act until

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1 the registered voters of this state have voted upon and approved
2 the bonds and property tax as provided in this section. Any bonds
3 issued under that act shall be issued within thirty months from
4 the date of such election.

5 B. The ballots used at the 2010 general election shall
6 contain substantially the following language:

7 (1) "The 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation
8 Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of senior citizen
9 facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition
10 bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation
11 bonds in an amount not to exceed seven million seven hundred
12 ninety thousand three hundred twenty dollars (\$7,790,320) to make
13 capital expenditures for certain senior citizen facility
14 improvements, construction and equipment acquisition projects and
15 provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the
16 payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in
17 connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of
18 the tax as permitted by law?

20 (2) "The 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation
21 Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of library acquisition
22 and construction bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue
23 general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed seven million
24 eighty-two thousand one hundred ten dollars (\$7,082,110) to make
25 capital expenditures for academic, public school, tribal and

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1 public library acquisitions and provide for a general property tax
 2 imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on
 3 and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds
 4 and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

6 (3) "The 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation
 7 Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of public school
 8 facility improvement and public school bus acquisition bonds.
 9 Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in
 10 an amount not to exceed five million one hundred thousand dollars
 11 (\$5,100,000) to make capital expenditures for pre-kindergarten
 12 classrooms and facilities at public schools and provide for a
 13 general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of
 14 principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with
 15 the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as
 16 permitted by law?

18 (4) "The 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation
 19 Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of higher educational
 20 and special schools capital improvement and acquisition bonds.
 21 Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in
 22 an amount not to exceed one hundred fifty-five million five
 23 hundred sixty-seven thousand eight hundred twenty-four dollars
 24 (\$155,567,824) to make capital expenditures for certain higher
 25 educational and special schools capital improvements and

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1 acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and
2 levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses
3 incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the
4 collection of the tax as permitted by law?

5 For _____ Against _____".

6 C. Each question set forth in this section includes a
7 specific work or object to be financed by the bonds. If any such
8 question is not approved by a majority vote of the electorate at
9 the state's 2010 general election, the issuance of bonds for the
10 work or object specified by the question shall be excluded from
11 and shall not be part of the 2010 Capital Projects General
12 Obligation Bond Act. The failure of a question to be approved by
13 the electorate at the 2010 general election shall not affect those
14 questions that are approved at the election.

15 D. The secretary of state shall include the submission
16 of the capital projects general obligation bonds to the people at
17 the 2010 general election, and it shall be included in the general
18 election proclamation of each of the county clerks. The secretary
19 of state shall cause the 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation
20 Bond Act to be published in full in at least one newspaper in each
21 county of the state if one be published therein, once each week,
22 for four successive weeks next preceding the general election as
23 required by the constitution of New Mexico.

24 Section 12. ART IN PUBLIC PLACES.--Pursuant to Section
25 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the appropriations
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underscored material = new
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1 authorized in the 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond
2 Act include money for the art in public places fund.

3 Section 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.--

4 A. If an appropriation for a project authorized in the
5 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is not
6 sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the
7 appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes
8 specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be made
9 for purposes other than those specified in the appropriation.

10 B. The state agencies and state institutions to which
11 money has been appropriated in the 2010 Capital Projects General
12 Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for monitoring the
13 projects funded in that act to ensure compliance with the
14 constitution and laws of New Mexico and shall cause to be reverted
15 any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the earlier of
16 the third full fiscal year after issuance of the bonds or the
17 termination or completion of the specific project. Reverted funds
18 shall be deposited in the debt service fund established by the
19 state treasurer for the purpose of paying the principal of and
20 interest on the state's general obligation bonds.

21 Section 14. SEVERABILITY.--If any part or application of the
22 2010 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is held invalid,
23 the remainder or its application to other situations or persons
24 shall not be affected.

25 Section 15. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public

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1 peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.

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
