#### SUMMARY

#### Synopsis of Bill

House Memorial 43 resolves ALTSD work with area agencies of aging (AAA) to develop a plan reflecting a business model of operation for the federal Older Americans Act of 1965 and related programs and services, use cost-sharing, streamlined, integrated programs and services and leverage all appropriate federal, state and local resources. Lastly, it resolves ALTSD and AAAs report progress to the Legislative Health and Human Services Committee no later than October 2010.

#### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

ALTSD reports there will be no additional impact as it is developing a four-year plan for such services and also produces an annual strategic plan.

#### SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

ALTSD states it "is charged with creating a seamless, comprehensive, efficient and costeffective array of programs and services, which emphasize home and community-based longterm care, healthily and productive aging, economic security, protection of rights and prevention of abuse neglect and exploitation."

It further reports by the year 2030, New Mexico will rank fourth in the nation in percentage of population age 65 and older resulting in increased demands in the areas of services, food security and well-being.

HPC points out the aging network provides senior centers, congregate meals, adult daycare, volunteer, employment, Senior Olympics and other services to older New Mexicans.
