SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Joint Resolution to amend article 10, section 2 of the Constitution of New Mexico to allow county officials to serve three consecutive terms instead of two.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The Secretary of State, as the Chief Elections Officer is mandated to publish all constitutional amendments in both English and Spanish in a newspaper in every county statewide. The cost for the 2008 General Election was \$520,000 for five constitutional amendments. The cost breakdown is estimated at \$104,000 per constitutional amendment.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The NMAC states:

County governments in New Mexico have the oldest and most restrictive term limits in the United States according to the National Association of Counties. In 44 states, county elected officials have unlimited terms of office.

The proposed incremental increase from the existing two to three four-year consecutive

terms for county elected officials in New Mexico would increase the officials' ability to develop and implement long term projects and policy goals. It would also allow citizens to return to office those county officials who have earned the favorable regard of their constituents
