11	REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION STUDY COMMITTEE TO DEVELOP
12	LEGISLATION TO REDUCE THE STATE'S HIGH SCHOOL DROPOUT RATE BY
13	CREATING A SCHOLARSHIP TAX CREDIT PROGRAM FOR LOW-INCOME
14	STUDENTS AND BY ESTABLISHING A COMPETITIVE GRANT PROGRAM FOR
15	INNOVATIVE EFFORTS BY EDUCATION PROVIDERS.

17	WHEREAS, the economic future of the state of New Mexico
18	will depend upon the educational attainment and knowledge base
19	of its work force; and
20	WHEREAS, the secretary of public education said that forty
21	thousand New Mexico students have dropped out of high school in
22	the last four years; and
23	WHEREAS, the governor said that a forty-six percent high
24	school dropout rate is unacceptable; and
25	WHEREAS, the house of representatives believes that
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aggressive work is needed to ensure that all children in New Mexico attend a school that will transform their lives by helping them to achieve their full potential; and

WHEREAS, the employment prospects for students without a high school diploma are bleak; and

WHEREAS, Hispanic students represent fifty-six percent of the total enrollment in New Mexico public schools, and there exists a persistent and substantial gap in academic achievement between Hispanic students and non-Hispanic Anglo students in the state; and

WHEREAS, states like Florida have sharply reduced this achievement gap through innovative education programs, including a scholarship tax credit program; and

WHEREAS, more than fifty percent of the students enrolled in public schools in New Mexico qualify for free or reducedprice lunches; and

WHEREAS, the educational options available to low-income students are narrower given their families' modest incomes; and

WHEREAS, a scholarship tax credit program would allow these families to send their children to the public or private school best suited to their educational needs; and

WHEREAS, the savings from a well-designed scholarship tax credit could be used to provide grants to public and private education providers to help minority students finish their studies and obtain a high school diploma;

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1	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
2	REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the legislative
3	education study committee be requested to develop, by November
4	2010, legislation for consideration in the 2011 legislative
5	session that will create a scholarship tax credit program and
6	establish a competitive grant program for innovative efforts by
7	public and private education providers to help minority
8	students finish their studies and obtain a high school diploma;
9	and
10	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be
11	transmitted to the governor, the secretary of public education
12	and the chair of the legislative education study committee.
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
