#### **SUMMARY**

#### Synopsis of Bill

House Bill 354 proposes to amend Section 62-9-3 NMSA of the Public Utility Act to clarify that the PRC does not have to approve additions or modifications of an existing electrical plant or transmission line that is not a permanent relocation or expansion beyond one-half mile of their current location. The bill eliminates the provision that PRC jurisdiction only applies to transmission lines that are connected to a new generation plants.

#### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The PRC reports that the bill could eliminate the need for unnecessary Commission proceedings and possibly save a minimal amount of money.

# SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

According to the PRC, the bill resolves parts of the Statute that are confusing or obsolete. In the past, routine utility system upgrades or tempory relocations required a formal Commission approval.
