SUMMARY

Synopsis of SFC Amendment

SFC amendment to SEC Committee Substitute for SB2 clarifies that the maximum building gross square footage limitations included on page 13 in Subsections (a) and (b) are per student.

Synopsis of Original Bill

Senate Education Committee Substitute for SB2 amends the Public School Capital Outlay Act to create a mandatory 10 percent increase in the state match of construction projects for small

schools, and a permissive 5 percent increase in the state match for schools that use “community educational facilities”. Section 2 of the bill includes new school closure and consolidation procedures, requiring final approval from the Secretary of PED. Section 3 of the bill allows students at small high schools to participate in extracurricular activities at another high school.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Senate Bill 2 offers a mandatory capital outlay incentive from the Public School Capital Outlay Fund of 10 percent of the required local match for qualifying construction and renovation projects. The bill does not mandate that districts build certain sized schools, but offers a 10 percent credit against the local share for qualifying schools. The 10 percent credit will have the effect of lowering the district’s facility construction/renovation cost on qualifying projects while raising the state’s cost by an equal amount.

In order to qualify for the 10 percent credit, new and replacement construction of elementary, middle and junior high schools must accommodate between 200 and 400 students and be no larger than 125 ft²/student for elementary schools and 130 ft²/student for middle and junior high schools. New and replacement construction of high schools must accommodate between 400 and 900 students and be no larger than 160 ft²/student for high schools. Also, renovation projects built between the 200-400 and 400-900 enrollment limits established in the bill will also receive the 10 credit. Currently, 58 percent of elementary schools and 46 percent of middle and junior high schools enroll fewer than 400 students, and 77 percent of high schools currently enroll fewer than 900 students.

The PSFA provided the following estimated annual cost assumptions used to estimate the fiscal impact to the PSCOF:

- Assumes an average useful life of school facilities of 40 years
- Within a 40 year time span on average, all public schools in New Mexico should thereby cycle through the standards-based process for renovation/replacement.
- *Accordingly, the full estimated facilities-related costs intrinsic in the SB2 substitute would be amortized over 40 years—the estimated annual cost would be 1/40th of the total cost.*
- The cost estimate is in 2011 dollars, and is an average. The actual cost would be a function of the number of qualifying larger schools that come up for funding in each annual funding cycle.
- The small school incentives would be *up to 15 percent*, and could be lower if projects qualifying for the small school capital outlay incentive do not include use of community educational facilities. *For purposes of our cost estimate, we assume that the incentive will be 15 percent for all qualifying projects, but also provide an estimated average annual cost if the capital outlay incentive were to be 10 percent (i.e., no use of community educational facilities).*
- There are a number of unknowns which are not specified/limited in the language of the SB2 substitute, and which could substantially raise or lower the annual cost estimate, including whether schools divided into smaller schools would be on the same campus (if not, and if two new schools on two new sites was an optimum solution, costs would be higher). A reasonable estimate for site development work on new campuses would be 10 percent (*impact on the PSCOF would accordingly be 5 percent since the state/local match share is designed to average 50 percent each.*)

- The most significant unknown may be what percentage of qualifying larger schools districts would choose to evolve into smaller facilities under the SB2 substitute. The language of the bill specifies that the PSCOC “shall” (not “may”) provide an SB2 related capital outlay credit for qualifying project applications. *For purposes here, PSFA has chosen to estimate that 40 percent of qualifying larger schools would, over the next 40 years, choose to evolve into multiple smaller schools.* 40 percent, in PSFA’s judgment, is a reasonable estimate that may err on the side of being conservative. However, we’ve also provided a table for the expected average annual cost at 10 percent increments on conversion of large schools to multiple smaller schools.

PSFA estimates that 40 percent of qualifying larger schools would choose to evolve into multiple smaller schools. If 40 percent of qualifying larger schools take advantage of this credit, the total cost to the state would be between \$14.3 million and \$21.4 million annually, depending on whether the credit provided included the 5 percent credit for the use of community educational facilities. The chart below shows the additional required state match based on a 5 percent, 10 percent and 15 percent credit.

The bill seeks to eliminate at least part of the additional capital costs imposed by smaller schools by making use of community facilities near to the school for educational purposes, lowering ft²/student requirements by outsourcing some of the facilities which would otherwise need to be part of the school’s footprint. The use of community facilities has the potential to reduce both capital and operating costs.

The bill further seeks to limit ft²/student in qualifying smaller schools by requiring that such schools meet the more restrictive ft²/student limits in the NM Adequacy Standards for larger schools. According to the director of the PSFA, there has been discussion that the maximum square footage standards established in the NM Adequacy Standards are too high and should be decreased. The director also reports that most school construction projects are currently being built below the maximum standards allowed in the NM Adequacy Standards. *See Attachment Maximum Building Gross Square Footage per Student.*

It is also important to note that a majority of construction projects in the state currently fall within the specified enrollment range included in this bill. Therefore, the bill may provide

substantial financial incentives to school districts for doing what they are already doing, or for modestly decreasing the total allowable square footage of their school (between 11 percent and 16 percent from the allowable gross square footage).

This bill will require the state to use more funding from the Public School Capital Outlay Fund for public school construction, making less funding available for standards-based awards that are needed to ensure safe public school facilities statewide.

Public school and physical plant improvements have stalled over the past 2 years due to limits on funding, and have begun to worsen in FY11. The average FCI for school buildings in New Mexico has been flat at approximately 36 percent over the past 2 years, and increased to 37 percent this year (if a building costs \$100 thousand and has an FCI of 37 percent, that building needs \$37 thousand in repairs – a lower FCI indicates less repairs needed). Average annual investments in facilities required by the state to keep facilities condition from further declining is approximately \$134 million. Currently, unfunded needs for public school facilities in New Mexico total about \$4.05 billion. Decreasing available fund for standards-based awards will have the effect of increasing the FCI. *See Attachment 2011-2012 Preliminary Rank Report by wNMCI for a listing of school rankings statewide.*

In addition to additional state match, small schools are generally more expensive to build and to operate than larger schools, per student, because the square footage allowed under the adequacy standards is generally higher. Renovation projects are not limited by the square footage maximums in order to qualify for the 10 percent credit and as such could cost more to operate if they are built at the maximum allowable square footage.

The bill also will also likely increase the number of teachers, administrators, maintenance workers, counselors and other staff districts are required to hire, though some of these increases might be offset by the use of community educational facilities that the district does not have to staff or maintain.

It will also increase operational costs, increasing the number of schools statewide, and increasing the costs of renewal and repair needs significantly.

The requirements related to school closure and consolidation will also place an increased financial burden on school districts. Costs of feasibility studies are unknown.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

This is not a Public School Capital Outlay Oversight Task Force supported bill, and the proposed changes presented in the bill were not presented to PSCOOTF or the Public School Capital Outlay Council during the interim.

The PSCOC will be required to provide a 10 percent credit of the total project cost against the required local match of new or replacement school construction if:

- The project is for an elementary school, middle or junior high school that is designed for between 200 and 400 students, and the maximum square footage is not larger than that established under the adequacy standards for a school of 800 students (125 ft²/student for elementary schools and 130 ft²/student for middle and junior high schools).

- The project is for a high school designed for between 400 and 900 students and the maximum square footage is not larger than that established under the adequacy standards for a school of 1000 students (160 ft²/student for high schools).

School renovation projects for the following will also receive a mandatory 10 percent credit of the total project cost against the required local match:

- Elementary schools, and middle and junior high schools that accommodate more than 400 students that are renovated into multiple smaller schools that accommodate between 200 and 400 students; and
- High schools that accommodate more than 900 students that are renovated into multiple smaller schools that accommodate between 400 and 900 students.
- The bill does not apply square footage constraints for renovation projects similar to those included for new and replacement schools.

Applications for new schools will be required to include an analysis of the number, type, location and capacity of community educational facilities reasonably accessible to the proposed school; a plan for using community educational facilities; and if not using community educational facilities, an explanation of why.

The bill allows the Public School Capital Outlay Council to increase the state share of a standards-based award by 5 percent for any new school that will use reasonably accessible “community educational facilities”. Community educational facilities are defined as non-classroom space designed to support educational programs, including physical education facilities, sports fields, gymnasiums, swimming pools, performing arts and fine arts facilities, libraries and media centers.

Currently, the PSCOC is only able to increase the state match 5 percent if the subject school district has been exemplary in implementing and maintaining a preventive maintenance program. An exemplary preventive maintenance program will decrease the frequency and level of capital outlay request in the long run, and furthers the purpose of the PSCOA and bringing all facilities up to adequacy. The proposed changes in SB 2 do not further the purpose or underlying urgency of the PSCOA.

Section 2 of the bill enacts a new section of the Public School Capital Outlay Act, establishing school closure and consolidation procedures. School boards will be required to prepare a feasibility study examining the effects of closure or consolidation after public hearing. The Secretary will be required to approve the closure or consolidation.

Section 3 enacts a new section of the Public School Code to allow students at high schools enrolling fewer than 900 students to participate in extracurricular activities at the public school closest to the student’s residence.

ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

The statewide adequacy standards may have to be amended to reflect changes in this bill. The NMCI database will also have to be updated by the Public Schools Facility Authority (PSFA).

Districts will face increased burden when applying for PSCOC funding by being required to include additional documentation to the PSCOC related to community educational facilities. Priorities outlined in district capital and facilities master plans could be affected by these proposed changes, and would need to be updated. There will also be increased burdens place on districts in preparing feasibility studies related to consolidation or school closure, including unknown financial burdens.

The bill also places a further burden on the Secretary of PED to approve school closure and consolidation, diluting local control.

CONFLICT, DUPLICATION, COMPANIONSHIP, RELATIONSHIP

Relates to HB120. HB120 places a moratorium on all new school construction.

TECHNICAL ISSUES

Section 2 and Section 3 of the bill arguably are far different topic than the bill's provisions related to funding credits for smaller schools in Section 1. Article IV, Section 16 of the New Mexico Constitution, which states, "The subject of every bill shall be clearly expressed in its title, and no bill embracing more than one subject shall be passed except general appropriation bills and bills for the codification or revision of the laws..."

Page 13, Subsections (a) and (b) require the gross square footage to be calculated based on the portion of the project receiving state share funds. This runs counter to the intent of the bill which is to encourage better use of community facilities and build smaller schools. An amendment removing the phrase "any portion of the project" would require the total project square footage be no larger than specified, rather than only that portion that is receiving state matching funds in order to qualify for an incentive to build smaller schools.

OTHER SUBSTANTIVE ISSUES

The process established by Laws 2001, Chapter 338 to fund public school capital projects based on statewide adequacy standards was found to comply with the Court's order in the Zuni lawsuit requiring the development and implementation of a uniform system for funding capital improvements for New Mexico school districts. The court found the funding of capital improvements for New Mexico's school districts violated the Constitution and that the disparity in bonding capacity, and differing taxable land values among the school districts created a lack of uniformity from funding capital improvements, and ordered the state to establish and implement a uniform system for capital improvements. To date, a final judgment has not been issued in the Zuni lawsuit, and it is possible that enactment of this legislation could be found to be contrary to the Court's order to establish a uniform system for funding capital improvements that addresses substantial and impermissible funding disparities among the districts.

The stated purpose of the Public School Capital Outlay Act is to ensure that the physical condition and capacity, educational suitability and technology infrastructure of all public school facilities meet an adequate level statewide, and that the design, construction and maintenance of school sites and facilities encourage, promote and maximize safe, functional and durable learning environments in order for the state to meet its educational responsibilities and for New Mexico's students to have the opportunity to achieve success. The bill aims at creating smaller schools

based on the argument that smaller schools produce better student outcomes. However, a majority of New Mexico schools already meet the enrollment caps provided in this bill and student achievement statewide is arguably low.

The PSFA notes the following:

- The Majority of New Mexico schools are currently small and there is limited data correlating school size to learning outcomes in New Mexico.
- Capital cost ranges are hard to estimate. However, the upper limit on capital costs if all non-complying schools were to be demolished and replaced by complying schools could be as high as \$13 billion.
- Current unfunded needs for public school facilities in New Mexico total about \$4.05 billion.
- Existing public school facilities are in marginal cost at best – the current Facilities Condition Index is about 38 percent (if a building is worth \$100,000 and has an FCI of 38 percent, the building needs \$38,000 in repairs).
- School physical plant improvements have stalled over the past two years due to limits on funding and this year the FCI has decreased.
- Additional operating costs would likely be incurred by smaller schools.
- Current adequacy standards do not limit school size.

ALTERNATIVES

- Change mandatory language to permissive language, allowing to PSCOC to determine the percentage of increased state match.
- Only allow schools with 85 percent of enrolled students eligible for free and reduced-fee lunch to be eligible for the 10 percent funding incentive.
- Establish a pilot project that funds a specified number of projects each year or allows a specified amount of PSCOF to be used for the 10 percent incentive.
- Lower the funding incentive from 10 percent to 5 percent.
- Place a 2 year sunset on the legislation. This would require the Legislature to readdress the issue and determine whether the incentives provided in this bill were effective.
