SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 379 proposes to amend Section 49-1-2 NMSA 1978 to require the town of Atrisco land grant-merced to be governed by the provisions of Sections 49-1-1 through 49-1-18 NMSA 1978.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Senate Bill 379 makes no appropriation.

CONFLICT, DUPLICATION, COMPANIONSHIP, RELATIONSHIP

House Bill 82 proposes to amend the same section of statute for the purpose of adding the town of Tecolote as a political subdivision of the state.

House Bill 278 is a duplicate of this bill.

Senate Bill 176 is related to Senate Bill 379 in that if Senate Bill 176 becomes law, the Land Grant Council would have the authority to determine if a land grant is a political subdivision of the state.

WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF NOT ENACTING THIS BILL

If this bill is not enacted the town of Atrisco might still become a political subdivision of the state if Senate Bill 176 becomes law.
