Short Title: Workforce Development & Dropout Prevention

Bill Summary:

SB 383 makes an appropriation to contract with a New Mexico company or organization that has demonstrated experience and success in implementing workforce development and dropout prevention programs in partnership with school districts to:

- enhance academic remediation services for at-risk students;
- implement dropout prevention strategies; and
- provide students with career exploration and employable skills training.

Strategies shall align with enrollment in postsecondary education programs or career pathway opportunities leading to entry-level positions with business partners.

Fiscal Impact:

\$500,000 is appropriated from the General Fund to the Workforce Solutions Department (WSD) for expenditure in FY 14. Unexpended or unencumbered funds revert to the General Fund.

Substantive Issues:

The Public Education Department (PED) notes in its analysis that SB 383 permits school district personnel to refer high-risk students for participation in the program and allow them to be served based on their determined at-risk status alone without regard to economic status.

According to WSD, the department currently provides these services through its administration of the *Workforce Investment Act* (WIA) programs. SB 383 specifies that a contractor would provide the services outlined.

Background:

According to PED:

- one high school student drops out of secondary schools every nine seconds; and
- the rate at which students drop out between grades 9 and 10 has tripled over the last 30 years; and
- the national dropout rate in school year 2010-2011 was 7.4 percent.
