1 AN ACT 2 AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF CAPITAL PROJECTS GENERAL 3 OBLIGATION BONDS TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR SENIOR CITIZEN FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS, FOR LIBRARY 4 5 ACQUISITIONS AND FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS AT INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION, STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND 6 TRIBAL SCHOOLS; PROVIDING FOR A TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF 7 PRINCIPAL OF, INTEREST ON AND CERTAIN COSTS RELATED TO THE 8 BONDS; REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS AT THE 9 10 2014 GENERAL ELECTION OF THE STATE; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. 11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO: 12 13 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the "2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act". 14 15 SECTION 2. PURPOSE.--For the purpose of providing funds for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2014 Capital 16 Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation 17 indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and 18 in the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act. 19 20 SECTION 3. BOND TERMS.--The state board of finance, except as limited 21 Α. by the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, 22 shall determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds 23 issued pursuant to that act, including but not limited to: 24 (1) date or dates of issue, denominations 25

and maturities;

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2 principal amounts; (2) 3 (3) rate or rates of interest; and provisions for redemption, including (4) 4 5 premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds are issued in one or more series and other covenants relating 6 to the bonds and the issuance thereof. 7 Β. The bonds shall be in such form as the state 8 board of finance determines with an appropriate series 9 designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in 10 the resolution of the state board of finance. 11 C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall 12 begin not more than two years after the date of their 13 issuance, and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years 14 after the date of their issuance. Both principal and 15 interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United 16 States at the office of the paying agent within or without 17 the state as the state board of finance may direct. 18 D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or 19 facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer, 20 and the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be 21 placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in 22 book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical 23 securities. 24

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E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with

the provisions of the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act and the Uniform Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act and may be issued in accordance with the Public Securities Short-Term Interest Rate Act.

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F. The full faith and credit of the state is pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of and interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

SECTION 4. EXPENDITURES.--The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred under Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of the bonds that are not required for the purposes set forth in Sections 6 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds.

SECTION 5. SALE.--The bonds authorized under the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less than par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If sold at public sale, the state board of finance shall publish

1 a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of 2 general circulation in the state and may also publish the 3 notice in a recognized financial journal outside the state. The required publications shall be made once each week for 4 two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, 5 the last publication thereof to be at least five days prior 6 to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the 7 8 amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be offered for sale and the place, date and hour at which 9 the sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place 10 specified in the notice, the state board of finance shall 11 open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the 12 bidder or bidders offering the best price for the bonds. The 13 state board of finance may reject any or all bids and 14 readvertise and may waive any irregularity in a bid. All 15 bids, except that of the state, shall be accompanied by a 16 deposit of two percent of the principal amount of the bonds 17 in a form acceptable to the state board of finance. The 18 deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall be returned upon 19 rejection of the bid. The state board of finance may also 20 sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the state 21 treasurer or state investment officer. The state treasurer 22 or state investment officer is authorized to purchase any of 23 the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal investments 24 for any person or board charged with the investment of any 25

public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposit of public money.

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SECTION 6. EXPENSES.--The expenses incurred by the state board of finance in or relating to the preparation and sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and other obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money of the state, legally available for such payments.

SECTION 7. TAX LEVY .-- To provide for the payment of the 11 principal of and interest on the bonds issued and sold 12 pursuant to the provisions of the 2014 Capital Projects 13 General Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and there is 14 hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of 15 the bonds are outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property 16 in the state subject to property taxation for state purposes 17 sufficient to pay the interest as it becomes due on the 18 bonds, together with an amount sufficient to provide a 19 sinking fund to pay the principal of the bonds as it becomes 20 due, and, if permitted by law, ad valorem taxes may be 21 collected to pay administrative costs incident to the 22 collection of such taxes. The taxes shall be imposed, 23 levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner 24 that other property taxes for state purposes are imposed, 25

levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be imposed, levied, assessed and collected.

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SECTION 8. TREASURER--DUTIES.--The state treasurer shall keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant to the taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds as they become due and any expenses relating thereto.

SECTION 9. IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR 11 ISSUANCE.--An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the 12 provisions of the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation 13 Bond Act may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action or 14 mandamus, enforce and compel the performance of the duties 15 required by that act of any officer or entity mentioned in 16 that act. The provisions of that act constitute an 17 irrepealable contract with the owners of any of the bonds 18 issued pursuant to that act for the faithful performance of 19 which the full faith and credit of the state is pledged. 20 Without reference to any other act of the legislature, the 21 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is full 22 authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds authorized 23 in that act, and such bonds shall have all the qualities of 24 investment securities under the Uniform Commercial Code, 25

shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body thereof.

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SECTION 10. PROJECTS.--The proceeds from the sale of bonds issued under the provisions of the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as follows for the purposes and in the amounts specified:

A. for senior citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment acquisition projects, to the aging and long-term services department:

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SECTION 11. ELECTION.--

5 Α. Bonds issued pursuant to the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be submitted to 6 the registered voters of the state at the general election to 7 8 be held in November 2014, and, if they receive a majority of all the votes cast thereon at such election, shall take 9 effect upon certification of the state canvassing board 10 announcing the results of the election. No bonds shall be 11 issued or sold under that act until the registered voters of 12 this state have voted upon and approved the bonds and 13 property tax as provided in this section. Any bonds issued 14 under that act shall be issued within thirty months from the 15 date of such election. 16

B. The ballots used at the 2014 general election shall contain substantially the following language:

higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital
improvement and acquisition bonds. Shall the state be
authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not
to exceed one hundred forty-one million dollars

(\$141,000,000) to make capital expenditures for certain higher education, special schools and tribal schools capital improvements and acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

C. Each question set forth in this section 9 includes a specific work or object to be financed by the 10 bonds. If any such question is not approved by a majority 11 vote of the electorate at the state's 2014 general election, 12 the issuance of bonds for the work or object specified by the 13 question shall be excluded from and shall not be part of the 14 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act. The 15 failure of a question to be approved by the electorate at the 16 2014 general election shall not affect those questions that 17 are approved at the election. 18

D. The secretary of state shall include the submission of the capital projects general obligation bonds to the people at the 2014 general election, and it shall be included in the general election proclamation of each of the county clerks. The secretary of state shall cause the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act to be published in full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state

if one be published therein, once each week, for four successive weeks next preceding the general election as required by the constitution of New Mexico.

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SECTION 12. ART IN PUBLIC PLACES.--Pursuant to Section 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the appropriations authorized in the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act include money for the art in public places fund.

SECTION 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.--

A. If an appropriation for a project authorized
in the 2014 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is
not sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the
appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes
specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be
made for purposes other than those specified in the
appropriation.

Β. The state agencies and state institutions to 16 which money has been appropriated in the 2014 Capital 17 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for 18 monitoring the projects funded in that act to ensure 19 compliance with the constitution and laws of New Mexico and 20 shall cause to be reverted any unexpended or unencumbered 21 balance remaining at the earlier of the third full fiscal 22 year after issuance of the bonds or the termination or 23 completion of the specific project. Reverted funds shall be 24 deposited in the debt service fund established by the state 25
