#### **SUMMARY**

### Synopsis of Bill

House Bill 314 amends Sections 8-1-1 and 8-3-3 NMSA 1978 to provide a ten percent compensation increase for elected officials for new terms beginning on or after January 1, 2015.

The bill applies to the following positions:

- Governor
- Lieutenant Governor
- Secretary of State
- State Auditor
- State Treasurer
- Attorney General
- Commissioner of Public Lands
- Public Regulation Commissioners

## FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The bill is companion legislation relating to House Bill 2 that includes \$63 thousand from the general fund and \$5.7 thousand from other state funds to cover the salary and benefit increases.

### **SIGNIFICANT ISSUES**

Compensation for these positions is statutorily established and any changes need to be made via an independent piece of legislation.

Article 4, Section 27 of the New Mexico Constitution, provides that elected officials cannot have their compensation increased during their term; any changes would have to occur after their next election.

At current salary levels, some of these positions are among the lower-paid key professional positions in state government; the average cabinet secretary, for instance, earns \$110,811.

### **OTHER SUBSTANTIVE ISSUES**

Largely because of fiscal circumstances facing the State since the recession, there have not been any modifications to these compensation levels since 2002.

According to the Council of State Governments, the average salary for an attorney general is \$119,850; for a state auditor \$119,644; and for a state treasurer \$106,402.

# WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF NOT ENACTING THIS BILL

Certain New Mexico elected officials will not receive a compensation adjustment.
