

1 A MEMORIAL

2 REQUESTING THE UNIVERSITY OF NEW MEXICO HEALTH SCIENCES  
3 CENTER TO RECONVENE THE J. PAUL TAYLOR EARLY CHILDHOOD TASK  
4 FORCE TO CONTINUE THE TASK FORCE'S WORK IN IMPROVING  
5 COLLABORATION AMONG STAKEHOLDERS AND DEVELOPING FURTHER AN  
6 EARLY CHILDHOOD BEHAVIORAL HEALTH ACTION PLAN.

8 WHEREAS, in the 2013 first session of the fifty-first  
9 legislature, and in the 2014 second session of the  
10 fifty-first legislature, House Memorial 75 and Senate  
11 Memorial 5 were passed respectively, requesting the  
12 university of New Mexico health sciences center to convene  
13 the J. Paul Taylor early childhood task force in honor of  
14 former legislator and tireless children's advocate  
15 J. Paul Taylor; and

16 WHEREAS, during 2014, the J. Paul Taylor early childhood  
17 task force has built solidly on its first year by expanding  
18 participation to include the human services department, the  
19 four medicaid managed-care organizations and the legislative  
20 finance committee; and

21 WHEREAS, the J. Paul Taylor early childhood task force  
22 has worked collaboratively with a broad-based coalition of  
23 state, managed-care, medical, community and legislative  
24 stakeholders to identify gaps in funding and develop a system  
25 to recognize and respond to risk factors in young children

1 and their families; and

2 WHEREAS, the J. Paul Taylor early childhood task force  
3 has developed recommendations to strengthen the state's early  
4 childhood behavioral health services system to respond to  
5 risk in children and families, including recommendations to  
6 modify medicaid funding and billing and develop needed  
7 linkages among primary and behavioral health and community  
8 systems; and

9 WHEREAS, the J. Paul Taylor early childhood task force  
10 has served for two years to successfully create a  
11 public-health-driven early childhood behavioral health action  
12 plan for infants and children to age eight and their  
13 families; and

14 WHEREAS, the J. Paul Taylor early childhood task force  
15 has worked to develop a system to identify unserved and  
16 underserved at-risk children and families; and

17 WHEREAS, the J. Paul Taylor early childhood task force  
18 has promoted evidence-based local community behavioral health  
19 programs in New Mexico; and

20 WHEREAS, the J. Paul Taylor early childhood task force  
21 has worked to identify how current service delivery systems  
22 could be used for the prevention of child abuse and neglect;  
23 and

24 WHEREAS, the work of the J. Paul Taylor early childhood  
25 task force has built upon New Mexico's existing structures by

1 creating linkages among health, behavioral health and  
2 community systems to establish a coherent, efficient and  
3 accessible infrastructure to recognize and respond to risk  
4 factors in families that place infants and young children at  
5 risk for their health development, health and safety; and

6 WHEREAS, the J. Paul Taylor early childhood task force  
7 has reviewed existing state data systems that could be used  
8 to collect critical data to support rigorous evaluation of  
9 programs and the promotion of evidence-based programming; and

10 WHEREAS, the J. Paul Taylor early childhood task force  
11 has developed a budget-neutral state policy for early  
12 childhood behavioral health and child abuse prevention by  
13 maximizing efficiencies through existing systems, connections  
14 and enhancements, including maximizing dollars that already  
15 exist in state and federal funding streams that are required  
16 for successful implementation; and

17 WHEREAS, the J. Paul Taylor early childhood task force  
18 has presented its preliminary recommendations to the  
19 legislative finance committee and to the legislative health  
20 and human services committee during the 2014 interim; and

21 WHEREAS, among the preliminary recommendations of the  
22 J. Paul Taylor early childhood task force was the  
23 recommendation that the task force's work be continued for  
24 another year to allow it to work collaboratively for the  
25 successful implementation of the infant and early childhood

1 behavioral health action plan and child abuse prevention  
2 plan;

3 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE  
4 STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the J. Paul Taylor early childhood  
5 task force be requested to continue improving collaboration  
6 among stakeholders to support the implementation and  
7 sustainability of the recommended early childhood behavioral  
8 health action plan and child abuse prevention plan, including  
9 the development of reimbursement and billing code  
10 modifications and data collection for program evaluation; and

11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the J. Paul Taylor early  
12 childhood task force recommend best practices for a  
13 trauma-informed community service and state delivery system,  
14 including recommendations for a work force development  
15 training plan to sustain the infant and early childhood  
16 behavioral health action plan; and

17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the J. Paul Taylor task  
18 force be requested to expand its membership to include  
19 experts from the university of New Mexico school of law and  
20 Pegasus legal services for children; and

21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the New Mexico legislative  
22 council be requested to charge the chair and vice chair of  
23 the legislative finance committee and the chair and vice  
24 chair of the legislative health and human services committee  
25 with a review of the feasibility of the J. Paul Taylor early

1 childhood task force's preliminary recommendations with  
2 respect to the budgeting, oversight, data collection and  
3 reporting requirements that those recommendations will  
4 entail; and

5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be  
6 transmitted to the governor, the chair of the legislative  
7 health and human services committee, the chair of the  
8 legislative finance committee, the secretary of children,  
9 youth and families and the chancellor for health sciences of  
10 the university of New Mexico. \_\_\_\_\_
