13	LIFESAVING SKILLS TRAINING TO THE HEALTH EDUCATION CURRICULUM
14	FOR STUDENTS.
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16	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
17	SECTION 1. Section 22-13-1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003,
18	Chapter 153, Section 57, as amended) is amended to read:
19	"22-13-1. SUBJECT AREASMINIMUM INSTRUCTIONAL AREAS
20	REQUIREDACCREDITATION
21	A. The department shall require public schools to
22	address department-approved academic content and performance
23	standards when instructing in specific department-required
24	subject areas as provided in this section. A public school or
25	school district failing to meet these minimum requirements
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1 shall not be accredited by the department.

2 All kindergarten through third grade classes Β. 3 shall provide daily instruction in reading and language arts 4 skills, including phonemic awareness, phonics and 5 comprehension, and in mathematics. Students in kindergarten and first grades shall be screened and monitored for progress 6 7 in reading and language arts skills, and students in second 8 grade shall take diagnostic tests on reading and language arts 9 skills. C. All first, second and third grade classes shall 10 provide instruction in art, music and a language other than 11 12 English, and instruction that meets content and performance standards shall be provided in science, social studies, 13 physical education and health education. 14 D. In fourth through eighth grades, instruction 15 that meets academic content and performance standards shall be 16 provided in the following subject areas: 17 reading and language arts skills, with an (1) 18 emphasis on writing and editing for at least one year and an 19 emphasis on grammar and writing for at least one year; 20 (2) mathematics; 21 language other than English; (3) 22 communication skills; (4) 23 (5) science; 24 (6) art; 25 .203642.1 - 2 -

3	(9) New Mexico history;
4	(10) United States history;
5	(11) geography;
6	(12) physical education; and
7	(13) health education.
8	E. Beginning with the 2008-2009 school year, in
9	eighth grade, algebra l shall be offered in regular classroom
10	settings or through online courses or agreements with high
11	schools.
12	F. In fourth through eighth grades, school
13	districts shall offer electives that contribute to academic
14	growth and skill development and provide career and technical
15	education. In sixth through eighth grades, media literacy may
16	be offered as an elective.
17	G. In ninth through twelfth grades, instruction
18	that meets academic content and performance standards shall be
19	provided in health education.
20	H. All health education courses shall include:
21	(1) age-appropriate sexual abuse and assault
22	awareness and prevention training that meets department
23	standards developed in consultation with the federal centers
24	for disease control and prevention that are based on evidence-
25	based methods that have proven to be effective; and
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1	(2) lifesaving skills training that follows
2	nationally recognized guidelines for hands-on psychomotor
3	skills cardiopulmonary resuscitation training. Students shall
4	be trained to recognize the signs of a heart attack, use an
5	automated external defibrillator and perform the Heimlich
6	maneuver for choking victims. The secretary shall promulgate
7	rules to provide for the:
8	(a) use of the following instructors for
9	the training provided pursuant to this paragraph: 1) school
10	nurses, health teachers and athletic department personnel as
11	instructors; and 2) any qualified persons volunteering to
12	provide training at no cost to the school district that the
13	school district determines to be eligible to offer instruction
14	pursuant to this paragraph; and
15	(b) approval of training and
16	instructional materials related to the training established
17	pursuant to this paragraph in both English and Spanish."
18	SECTION 2. Section 22-13-1.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1986,
19	Chapter 33, Section 5, as amended) is amended to read:
20	"22-13-1.1. GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS
21	A. At the end of grades eight through eleven, each
22	student shall prepare an interim next-step plan that sets forth
23	the coursework for the grades remaining until high school
24	graduation. Each year's plan shall explain any differences
25	from previous interim next-step plans, shall be filed with the
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principal of the student's high school and shall be signed by the student, the student's parent and the student's guidance counselor or other school official charged with coursework planning for the student.

B. Each student must complete a final next-step plan during the senior year and prior to graduation. The plan shall be filed with the principal of the student's high school and shall be signed by the student, the student's parent and the student's guidance counselor or other school official charged with coursework planning for the student.

C. An individualized education program that meets the requirements of Subsections A and B of this section and that meets all applicable transition and procedural requirements of the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act for a student with a disability shall satisfy the next-step plan requirements of this section for that student.

D. A local school board shall ensure that each high school student has the opportunity to develop a next-step plan based on reports of college and workplace readiness assessments, as available, and other factors and is reasonably informed about:

(1) curricular and course options, including honors or advanced placement courses, dual-credit courses, distance learning courses, career clusters and career pathways, pre-apprenticeship programs or remediation programs that the .203642.1

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1 college and workplace readiness assessments indicate to be 2 appropriate; 3 (2) opportunities available that lead to 4 different post-high-school options; and 5 alternative opportunities available if the (3) student does not finish a planned curriculum. 6 7 Ε. The secretary shall: establish specific accountability 8 (1) 9 standards for administrators, counselors, teachers and school district staff to ensure that every student has the opportunity 10 to develop a next-step plan; 11 12 (2) promulgate rules for accredited private schools in order to ensure substantial compliance with the 13 provisions of this section; 14 monitor compliance with the requirements (3) 15 of this section; and 16 compile such information as is necessary (4) 17 to evaluate the success of next-step plans and report annually, 18 by December 15, to the legislative education study committee 19 and the governor. 20 F. Once a student has entered ninth grade, the 21 graduation requirements shall not be changed for that student 22 from the requirements specified in the law at the time the 23 student entered ninth grade. 24 Successful completion of a minimum of twenty-G. 25 .203642.1

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These

1 three units aligned to the state academic content and 2 performance standards shall be required for graduation. 3 units shall be as follows: 4 (1) four units in English, with major emphasis on grammar and literature; 5 three units in mathematics, at least one 6 (2) of which is equivalent to the algebra 1 level or higher; 7 two units in science, one of which shall 8 (3) 9 have a laboratory component; provided, however, that with students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2005-2006 10 school year, three units in science shall be required, one of 11 12 which shall have a laboratory component; three units in social science, which shall (4) 13 include United States history and geography, world history and 14 geography and government and economics; 15 one unit in physical education; (5) 16 bracketed material] = delete one unit in communication skills or (6) 17 underscored material = new business education, with a major emphasis on writing and 18 speaking and that may include a language other than English; 19 one-half unit in New Mexico history for (7) 20 students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2005-2006 21 school year; and 22 (8) nine elective units and seven and one-half 23 elective units for students entering the ninth grade in the 24 2005-2006 school year that meet department content and 25 .203642.1

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performance standards. Student service learning shall be offered as an elective. Financial literacy shall be offered as an elective. Pre-apprenticeship programs may be offered as electives. Media literacy may be offered as an elective.

H. For students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2009-2010 school year, at least one of the units required for graduation shall be earned as an advanced placement or honors course, a dual-credit course offered in cooperation with an institution of higher education or a distance learning course.

I. The department shall establish a procedure for students to be awarded credit through completion of specified career technical education courses for certain graduation requirements, and districts may choose to allow students who successfully complete an industry-recognized credential, certificate or degree to receive additional weight in the calculation of the student's grade point average.

J. Successful completion of the requirements of the New Mexico diploma of excellence shall be required for graduation for students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2009-2010 school year. Successful completion of a minimum of twenty-four units aligned to the state academic content and performance standards shall be required to earn a New Mexico diploma of excellence. These units shall be as follows:

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(1) four units in English, with major emphasis

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1	on grammar, nonfiction writing and literature;
2	(2) four units in mathematics, of which one
3	shall be the equivalent to or higher than the level of algebra
4	2, unless the parent submitted written, signed permission for
5	the student to complete a lesser mathematics unit; and provided
6	that a financial literacy course that meets state mathematics
7	academic content and performance standards shall qualify as one
8	of the four required mathematics units;
9	(3) three units in science, two of which shall
10	have a laboratory component;
11	(4) three and one-half units in social
12	science, which shall include United States history and
13	geography, world history and geography, government and
14	economics and one-half unit of New Mexico history;
15	(5) one unit in physical education, as
16	determined by each school district, which may include a
17	physical education program that meets state content and
18	performance standards or participation in marching band, junior
19	reserve officers' training corps or interscholastic sports
20	sanctioned by the New Mexico activities association or any
21	other co-curricular physical activity;
22	(6) one unit in one of the following: a
23	career cluster course, workplace readiness or a language other
24	than English; and
25	(7) seven and one-half elective units that

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meet department content and performance standards. Career and technical education courses shall be offered as an elective. Student service learning shall be offered as an elective. Financial literacy shall be offered as an elective. Preapprenticeship programs may be offered as electives. Media literacy may be offered as an elective.

K. For students entering the eighth grade in the 2012-2013 school year, a course in health education is required prior to graduation. Health education may be required in either middle school or high school, as determined by the school district. Each school district shall submit to the department by the beginning of the 2011-2012 school year a health education implementation plan for the 2012-2013 and subsequent school years, including in which grade health education will be required and how the course aligns with department content and performance standards. Health education shall include:

(1) age-appropriate sexual abuse and assault awareness and prevention training that meets department standards developed in consultation with the federal centers for disease control and prevention that are based on evidencebased methods that have proven to be effective; <u>and</u>

(2) lifesaving skills training that follows nationally recognized guidelines for hands-on psychomotor skills cardiopulmonary resuscitation training. Students shall .203642.1

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1	be trained to recognize the signs of a heart attack, use an
2	automated external defibrillator and perform the Heimlich
3	maneuver for choking victims. The secretary shall promulgate
4	rules to provide for the:
5	(a) use of the following instructors for
6	the training provided pursuant to this paragraph: 1) school

15	L. Final examinations shall be administered to all
16	students in all classes offered for credit.
17	M. Until July 1, 2010, a student who has not passed
18	a state graduation examination in the subject areas of reading,
19	English, mathematics, writing, science and social science shall
20	not receive a high school diploma. The state graduation
21	examination on social science shall include a section on the
22	constitution of the United States and the constitution of New
23	Mexico. If a student exits from the school system at the end
24	of grade twelve without having passed a state graduation
25	examination, the student shall receive an appropriate state
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certificate indicating the number of credits earned and the 2 grade completed. If within five years after a student exits 3 from the school system the student takes and passes the state 4 graduation examination, the student may receive a high school Any student passing the state graduation examination diploma. and completing all other requirements within five years of 7 entering ninth grade, including a final summer session if 8 completed by August 1, may be counted by the school system in 9 which the student is enrolled as a high school graduate for the year in which completion and examination occur. 10

Beginning with the 2010-2011 school year, a N. student shall not receive a New Mexico diploma of excellence if the student has not demonstrated competence in the subject areas of mathematics, reading and language arts, writing, social studies and science, including a section on the constitution of the United States and the constitution of New Mexico, based on a standards-based assessment or assessments or a portfolio of standards-based indicators established by the department by rule. The standards-based assessments required in Section 22-2C-4 NMSA 1978 may also serve as the assessment required for high school graduation. If a student exits from the school system at the end of grade twelve without having satisfied the requirements of this subsection, the student shall receive an appropriate state certificate indicating the number of credits earned and the grade completed. If within

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1 five years after a student exits from the school system the 2 student satisfies the [requirement] requirements of this subsection, the student may receive a New Mexico diploma of 3 4 excellence. Any student satisfying the requirements of this 5 subsection and completing all other requirements within five years of entering ninth grade, including a final summer session 6 7 if completed by August 1, may be counted by the school system in which the student is enrolled as a high school graduate for 8 the year in which all requirements are satisfied. 9

0. As used in this section:

(1) "career and technical education", sometimes referred to as "vocational education", means organized programs offering a sequence of courses, including technical education and applied technology education, that are directly related to the preparation of individuals for paid or unpaid employment in current or emerging occupations requiring an industry-recognized credential, certificate or degree;

(2) "career and technical education course" means a course with content that provides technical knowledge, skills and competency-based applied learning and that aligns with educational standards and expectations as defined in rule;

(3) "career cluster" means a grouping of occupations in industry sectors based on recognized commonalities that provide an organizing tool for developing instruction within the educational system;

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1	(4) "career pathways" means a sub-grouping
2	used as an organizing tool for curriculum design and
3	instruction of occupations and career specialities that share a
4	set of common knowledge and skills for career success;
5	(5) "final next-step plan" means a next-step
6	plan that shows that the student has committed or intends to
7	commit in the near future to a four-year college or university,
8	a two-year college, a trade or vocational program, an
9	internship or apprenticeship, military service or a job;
10	(6) "interim next-step plan" means an annual
11	next-step plan in which the student specifies post-high-school
12	goals and sets forth the coursework that will allow the student
13	to achieve those goals; and
14	(7) "next-step plan" means an annual personal
15	written plan of studies developed by a student in a public
16	school or other state-supported school or institution in
17	consultation with the student's parent and school counselor or
18	other school official charged with coursework planning for the
19	student that includes one or more of the following:
20	(a) advanced placement or honors
21	courses;
22	(b) dual-credit courses offered in
23	cooperation with an institution of higher education;
24	(c) distance learning courses;
25	(d) career-technical courses; and
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1	(e) pre-apprenticeship programs.
2	P. The secretary may establish a policy to provide
3	for administrative interpretations to clarify curricular and
4	testing provisions of the Public School Code."
5	SECTION 3. TEMPORARY PROVISIONPSYCHOMOTOR
6	CARDIOPULMONARY SKILLS TRAININGRULEMAKINGBy December 31,
7	2016, the secretary of public education shall adopt and
8	promulgate rules to implement the provisions of Sections 1 and
9	2 of this act.
10	SECTION 4. APPLICABILITYLifesaving skills training
11	pursuant to Paragraph (2) of Subsection H of Section 22-13-1
12	NMSA 1978 and Paragraph (2) of Subsection K of Section
13	22-13-1.1 NMSA 1978 shall not be required for students in
14	grades nine through twelve who are enrolled in a virtual
15	charter school.
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
