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REQUESTING THE ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE COURTS TO CONVENE THE FAMILY REPRESENTATION TASK FORCE MADE UP OF EXPERTS ON CHILDREN'S LAW AND THE NEW MEXICO LEGAL SYSTEM, TO RECOMMEND MODELS FOR LEGAL REPRESENTATION OF CHILDREN AND PARENTS IN CHILDREN'S COURT PROCEEDINGS ON ABUSE AND NEGLECT.

WHEREAS, New Mexico's children's courts receive over six hundred new child abuse and neglect petitions every year; and

WHEREAS, New Mexico's children's courts have about two thousand pending cases of child abuse and neglect annually; and

WHEREAS, New Mexico courts are statutorily required to provide legal representation to all children and parents, guardians or custodians involved in abuse and neglect cases; and

WHEREAS, child abuse and neglect cases involve one of the most basic and fundamental rights: the right to the companionship and care of one's family; and

WHEREAS, child abuse and neglect cases result in significant trauma and have the potential to permanently sever the parent-child relationship; and

WHEREAS, high-quality legal representation for children and families is important to protect due process rights and procedural fairness; and

WHEREAS, high-quality legal representation improves judicial decision making by providing the court with accurate, timely and complete information about the children and parties and provides a platform for the voices of children and parents; and

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WHEREAS, high-quality legal representation leads to better long-term outcomes for children and their families in child welfare matters; and

WHEREAS, timely placement permanency for children leads to reduced costs to the state in terms of foster care support payments, case worker time and court time, as well as resources and services for children and families; and

WHEREAS, child welfare law is a highly specialized and complex area of law; and

WHEREAS, the United States department of health and human services' administration for children and families released an information memorandum in 2017 focused solely on the importance of quality legal representation in abuse and neglect cases; and

20 WHEREAS, national research shows that improved 21 representation is associated with better child welfare 22 outcomes, both in urban and rural areas, including: an 23 increased rate and speed of placement permanency; fewer 24 foster care placements; more efficient case processing; 25 cost-effectiveness; and court and client satisfaction; and

1 WHEREAS, New Mexico struggles to provide adequate 2 compensation and infrastructure to ensure proper oversight, 3 recruitment, retention, auditing, training, evaluation and support to its abuse and neglect contract attorneys; and 4 WHEREAS, poor-quality legal representation can lead to 5 longer stays in foster care, longer case processing times, 6 infrequent and less meaningful client interaction and less 7 8 vigorously developed case resolutions; and WHEREAS, national research provides the following 9 components of a structure that promotes quality legal 10 representation for children and families: 11 clearly defined roles and expectations; Α. 12 B. reasonable caseloads; 13 C. fair compensation and benefits; 14 high standards of practice; D. 15 Ε. specialized child welfare law training; 16 F. effective supervision of legal personnel; 17 G. client feedback mechanisms; and 18 Η. access to an interdisciplinary model of 19 representation; and 20 WHEREAS, there is a need to study and provide 21 recommendations on effective abuse and neglect case 22 representation structures that are conducive to protecting 23 the rights of New Mexico children and parents; 24 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE 25 SJM 10

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STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the administrative office of the courts be requested to convene the "family representation task force", made up of experts on children's law and the New Mexico legal system, to recommend models for legal representation of children and parents in children's court proceedings on abuse and neglect and to improve outcomes for children and parents served by New Mexico's children's legal system; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the family representation 9 task force be requested to recommend strategies for ensuring 10 that parties in children's court cases are prepared to 11 proceed in child welfare matters and to enable courts to 12 resolve children's court proceedings as justly, efficiently 13 and quickly as possible; and 14

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the administrative office of the courts be requested to invite the following individuals to participate on the family representation task force:

a member of the senate, appointed by the Α. 18 president pro tempore of the senate; 19

B. a member of the house of representatives, 20 appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives; 21

C. the chief children's court attorney of the 22 children, youth and families department;

court personnel, appointed by the chief justice D. 24 of the supreme court as follows: 25

1 (1) two children's court judges; 2 three attorneys who practice, or (2) 3 formerly practiced, in the child welfare system in the following capacities: 4 5 (a) one respondent's attorney; (b) one guardian ad litem; and 6 one youth's attorney; (c) 7 8 Ε. one member of the children's court improvement commission, appointed by the co-chairs of the commission; 9 F. the chief public defender, or the chief public 10 defender's designee; 11 G. the director of the administrative office of 12 the courts, or the director's designee; 13 H. the executive director of New Mexico legal aid, 14 or the executive director's designee; 15 I. the director of the legislative finance 16 committee, or the director's designee; 17 the director of the American bar association's J. 18 center on children and the law; 19 К. a representative of the national council of 20 juvenile and family court judges; 21 L. a former foster youth; 22 М. a permanency planning worker from the children, 23 youth and families department; 24 the children, youth and families department's N. 25 SJM 10 Page 5 coordinator for the federal Family First Prevention Services Act; and

0. a parent who has previously been involved in the state's child welfare system; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the family representation task force be requested to consider the feasibility, costs and benefits of creating a system for providing legal representation to parties in child welfare matters, including:

A. financial considerations in establishing and
maintaining a child welfare legal representation agency;

B. proposed governance and administrativefunctions for a child welfare legal representation agency;

14 C. how a child welfare legal representation system 15 could ensure attorney accountability, oversight and 16 evaluation;

D. how to create a structure in a child welfare legal representation system for providing training and litigation support to parties and legal counsel;

20 E. the extent to which the child welfare legal21 representation system could provide legislative advocacy;

F. identification of potential conflicts of interest between parties and a child welfare legal representation system;

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G. the provision of legal representation and

1 litigation support for child welfare matters on appeal; and 2 н. identification of costs associated with moving 3 a child welfare legal representation system into an existing agency or creating a new entity or entities, considering the 4 legal, practical and philosophical considerations of such a 5 move; and 6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, if the family 7 8 representation task force recommends creation of a new child welfare legal representation agency, the task force be 9 requested to make recommendations on the establishment of: 10 Α. trial and appellate standards; 11 B. relevant, accessible and role-specific 12 training; 13 C. a mentoring and retention program and 14 opportunities for law students in that mentoring and 15 retention program; 16 D. a compensation structure that achieves parity 17 and adequate representation; 18 Ε. improvements in and establishment of 19 accessibility to experts, social workers, paralegals and 20 administrative supports; 21 F. a formal complaint process; and 22 G. strategies for personnel recruitment, 23 retention, support and resources in rural districts; and 24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in order to recommend 25

changes to the legislature, the family representation task force be requested to conduct surveys of other states to identify models of effective representation and funding that lead to improved outcomes for children and families; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the family representation task force be requested to produce a report to the legislature and any relevant interim committees prior to the 2021 legislative session; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the family representation 9 task force be requested to include the information requested 10 in this joint memorial in the report and also identify in the 11 report: 12

A. statutory changes needed to support proposed 13 models of legal representation; 14

Β. an identification of the obstacles in counties 15 statewide to providing children and parents with legal 16 representation in children's court proceedings; and 17

C. an identification of optimal attorney caseload 18 levels and other resources necessary to provide appropriate 19 legal representation in children's court proceedings 20 statewide; and 21

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the chief justice of the 22 New Mexico supreme court be requested to appoint a chair of the family representation task force; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the administrative office of SJM 10 the courts be requested to provide staff support to the family representation task force; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the family representation task force be requested to submit a report that includes the recommendations of the task force, including recommendations for legislation, to the appropriate interim committees of the legislature by July 15, 2020; and

8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be transmitted to the president pro tempore of the senate; the 9 speaker of the house of representatives; the secretary of 10 children, youth and families; the chief justice of the 11 New Mexico supreme court; the chief public defender; the 12 director of the administrative office of the courts; the 13 director of the legislative finance committee; the executive 14 director of New Mexico legal aid; and the president of the 15 American bar association. 16 SJM 10 Page 9 17
