Synopsis of SPAC Amendment

The Senate Public Affairs Committee amended Senate Bill 270 strike both instances of “February 14th” and replacing the date with “October 30th”.

Synopsis of Original Bill

Senate Bill 270 creates a new section of 12-5 NMSA 1978 making February 14th known as “Rudolfo Anaya I Love To Read Day”.
