12	ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS WHO WORK AS SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS TO BE
13	SPECIFICALLY TRAINED FOR THOSE POSITIONS; ALLOWING SCHOOL
14	DISTRICT POLICE DEPARTMENTS THAT HAVE FULL-TIME SCHOOL RESOURCE
15	OFFICERS TO RECEIVE FUNDING FROM THE LAW ENFORCEMENT PROTECTION
16	FUND; CHANGING THE CURRENT AMOUNTS DISTRIBUTED FROM THE LAW
17	ENFORCEMENT PROTECTION FUND; PROVIDING DISTRIBUTIONS FROM THE
18	LAW ENFORCEMENT PROTECTION FUND TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC
19	SAFETY TO OFFSET COSTS INCURRED DUE TO CERTAIN SPECIAL
20	DEPLOYMENTS.
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22	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
23	SECTION 1. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS AS
24	SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERSTRAINING REQUIRED
25	A. As used in this section, "school resource
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 responsible for school safety and crime prevention and the
 appropriate response to crimes in public schools.

B. Before entering into the duties of a school resource officer, a municipal police officer, county sheriff's officer or a school district law enforcement officer shall receive specific training for the duty, including instruction on the following:

9 (1) the differences in successful law
10 enforcement when conducted inside a school environment,
11 including understanding the adolescent brain, crisis management
12 and de-escalation techniques;

(2) tools to be a positive role model foryouth, including mentoring and informal counseling techniques;

(3) the school resource officer's role and responsibilities to school personnel and students and their families and strategies for connecting students and families to appropriate resources that will assist students to succeed in school, including strategies for mitigating truancy;

(4) a variety of instructional techniques as
 well as classroom management tools to provide law-related
 education to students;

(5) an understanding of adolescent development and adolescent mental health disorders and treatment; and

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(6) identification and response to students

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who are suspected of having a mental health need, including 2 critical skills and capacity for appropriately responding to behavior issues that are typically observed among adolescents with mental health needs.

C. The school resource officer training shall be provided by or approved by the New Mexico law enforcement academy in consultation with the public education department.

Section 29-13-2 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1983, SECTION 2. Chapter 289, Section 2, as amended) is amended to read:

"29-13-2. PURPOSE OF ACT.--The purpose of the Law Enforcement Protection Fund Act is to provide for the equitable distribution of money to state police, municipal police, university police, tribal police, [and] county sheriff's departments and school district police departments for use in the maintenance and improvement of those departments in order to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of law enforcement services and to sustain at a reasonable level the payments available to the surviving eligible family members of a peace officer killed in the line of duty."

SECTION 3. Section 29-13-2.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993, Chapter 179, Section 4, as amended) is amended to read:

"29-13-2.1. DEFINITIONS.--As used in the Law Enforcement Protection Fund Act:

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Α. "academy" means the New Mexico law enforcement academy;

21	SECTION 4. Section 29-13-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993,		
22	Chapter 179, Section 6, as amended by Laws 2017, Chapter 1,		
23	Section 2 and by Laws 2017, Chapter 35, Section 3) is amended		
24	to read:		
25	"29-13-4. DETERMINATION OF NEEDS AND RATE OF		
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A. Annually on or before April 15, the division
shall consider and determine the relative needs as requested by
tribal, municipal, <u>school district</u> and university police,
county sheriff's departments, <u>the department of public safety</u>
and the academy for money in the fund in the succeeding fiscal
year pursuant to the provisions of [Subsection] <u>Subsections</u> C
<u>and E</u> of this section.

B. As necessary during the year, the division shall
transfer an amount from the fund to the peace officers', New
Mexico mounted patrol members' and reserve police officers'
survivors fund that enables the balance of the peace officers',
New Mexico mounted patrol members' and reserve police officers'
survivors fund to be maintained at a minimum balance of three
hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000).

C. The division shall determine the rate of distribution of money in the fund as follows:

(1) all municipal police and county sheriff's departments shall be [rated by class pursuant to this paragraph in accordance with populations established by the most recently completed decennial census; provided that the population of any county shall not include the population of any municipality within that county that has a municipal police department. The rate of distribution to which a municipal police or county sheriff's department is entitled is the following:

municipal, school district and university 4 (5) 5 police and county sheriff's departments shall be entitled, unless allocations are adjusted pursuant to the provisions of 6 7 Subsection D of this section, to [six hundred dollars (\$600)] one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each police officer or 8 9 sheriff's deputy employed full time by that department who has been certified by the academy, or by a regional law enforcement 10 training facility in the state certified by the director of the 11 12 academy, as a police officer or has been authorized to act as a New Mexico peace officer pursuant to the provisions of Section 13 29-1-11 NMSA 1978; and 14

(6) municipal police departments, sheriff's departments and school district police departments that assign officers as school resource officers shall be entitled to one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each assigned school resource officer's training pursuant to Section 1 of this 2020 act.

D. After distributions are determined in accordance with Subsection A, Subsection B and Paragraphs (1), (2), [and] (3) <u>and (6)</u> of Subsection C of this section, if the balance in the fund is insufficient to permit the total allocations provided by Paragraphs (4) and (5) of Subsection C of this section, the division shall reduce that allocation to the .216247.3GLG

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maximum amount permitted by available money.

E. After all distributions have been made in accordance with Subsections A through D of this section, and if the balance in the fund is sufficient, the department of public safety shall be entitled to a rate of distribution of not more than two million dollars (\$2,000,000)."

SECTION 5. Section 29-13-5 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1983, Chapter 289, Section 5, as amended) is amended to read:

"29-13-5. DETERMINATION OF NEEDS--REVIEW.--No later than May 1 of each year, the division shall notify in writing each affected municipal police, school district police, university police, tribal police and county sheriff's department, the department of public safety and the academy of its determination of money to be distributed pursuant to the provisions of Section 29-13-4 NMSA 1978. Any affected governmental entity may appeal that determination by filing a notice of appeal with the secretary of finance and administration no later than May 15. If an appeal is filed, the secretary of finance and administration shall review the determination of the division in an informal and summary proceeding and shall certify the result of the appeal to the division no later than June 30, and the division shall adjust its determination accordingly. If no appeal is filed, the original determination of the division shall be final and binding and not subject to further review."

6	related expenses incurred directly by the department of public

9	response to critical circumstances as authorized by the
10	governor; and
11	(b) not be expended to hire new
12	personnel; and
13	(2) may be expended for costs, including
14	travel, fuel, overtime, per diem and ammunition.

16	expended only pursuant to approved budgets and upon duly
17	executed vouchers approved as required by law."
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
