BILL SUMMARY

This bill, if passed, would amend the child abuse and neglect criminal statute to include within the definition of child abuse the exposure of a child to a Schedule I or II controlled substance to the definition of abuse of a child and would not require a court order for a newborn child exhibiting substance abuse or withdrawal symptoms from prenatal exposure to a listed controlled substance to be taken into temporary protective custody.

Exposure to a controlled substance is defined by a positive test result at birth and excludes positive results when the mother is lawfully prescribed and taking the controlled substance in accordance with the prescription. The bill further defines exposure when a child is allowed to enter or remain in a building or vehicle which contains chemicals and equipment used to manufacture a controlled substance. Further, the bill disallows the "did not know the child was present" defense when a child has been exposed to methamphetamine.

The bill sets forth the strict requirements for certain licensed medical personnel to identify the exposure and symptoms as related to substance abuse prior to taking a newborn child less than 72 hours old or a child subject to exposure from a controlled substance manufacturing environment into temporary protective custody without a court order. The temporary taking of the exposed child is not considered to be an arrest or constitute a police record.
