SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

<u>Synopsis:</u> This bill enhances and expands enforcement provisions to reduce excessive absenteeism, making it a crime for a parent whose child continues to be excessively absent from school after documented intervention attempts. The bill establishes penalties to be imposed on the parent, and allows for the Children's Court to impose driving restrictions on a juvenile who is excessively absent from school.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There is no appropriation contained within this bill. There are no fiscal implications for CYFD.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

Although the bill references the Children's Court imposing a suspension of driving privileges for excessively absent students, Absenteeism Referrals do not fall under the Children's Court, as absenteeism is not a delinquent offense in the state of New Mexico. There is no existing avenue for these types of referrals to be referred to the Children's Court, and this bill does not outline how to or who makes those referrals to the Children's Court.

Regarding the criminal penalties outlined in the bill to be imposed on the parent or guardian, the bill does not identify who is responsible for enforcement. CYFD's authority is limited to a delinquent act committed by a youth or child and a referral for educational neglect.

Finally, this bill re-enacts portions of the Compulsory School Attendance Act, which was replaced by the Attendance for Success Act.
