BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

HB 200 raises the penalty for a second degree felony resulting in the death of a human being to 20 years from 15 years.

It is difficult to determine what the effect of passing HB 200 would be on the state’s prison population, but the penalties included in the bill could lead to people being incarcerated by the Corrections Department for longer periods. As of June 30 2023, there were 481 people incarcerated in the state where second degree murder was their highest offense. The average per day cost to incarcerate someone in the state’s prison system is \$156.45/day; this average includes private and public facilities.
