#### **SECTION III: NARRATIVE**

#### **BILL SUMMARY**

#### Synopsis:

Senate Bill 96 appropriates \$250,000 to the New Mexico State Board of Regents over FY25 though FY27 for an oenologist (wine making professional who specializes in the process of making wine). Any funds remaining after FY27 would revert to the General Fund.

#### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The fiscal impact besides the \$250,000 expenditure described in the bill is unknown.

According to the latest Census of Agriculture (2017), New Mexico has 1,280 acres of grapes on 376 farms, assumed to be primarily wine grapes as the state does not have a table grape industry. The New Mexico Wine Association lists 56 wineries on their website, about three-quarters representing unique companies. According to a study commission by the National Association of American Wineries (in 2022) there were 57 wineries and 300 vineyard acres in New Mexico in 2022. The report indicated that total taxes generated by New Mexico's wine industry were \$80.8 million, including \$31.6 million in state and local taxes. The report estimated 7,918 jobs related to the industry (including wine-tourism-related jobs).

To the extent that the position funded by the bill would support the industry additional fiscal impacts may be observed, although again, unknown at this time.

#### **SIGNIFICANT ISSUES**

The bill does not provide recurring funding and as such the funded oenologist could only be employed temporarily or on a "consulting" basis, for a period of one or two years. It is unclear how much support such a "consulting oenologist" would be able to provide.

Many industry participants have, historically, indicated a need for an oenologist to complement the work of the New Mexico State University viticulturalist. An oenologist could provide valuable assistance to the states wineries in improving wine quality.

#### PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

Adding an oenologist to the University's Food Science program would allow the university to continue its land-grant mission of supporting the agricultural community, in this case specifically wine growers and wine makers. This individual can support the industry by providing expertise and education in producing better wine through sensory testing, chemical testing, tasting, etc.
