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1 purpose of treating psychopathology and promoting optimal mental health: 2

[F.] H. "consulting" means the application of scientific principles and procedures in psychotherapeutic counseling, guidance and human development to provide assistance in understanding and solving a problem that the consultee may have in relation to a third party;

[G.] I. "counseling" means the application of scientific principles and procedures in therapeutic counseling, guidance and human development to provide assistance in understanding and solving a mental, emotional, physical, social, moral, educational, spiritual or career development and adjustment problem that a client may have;

[H. "counselor and therapist practice"]

J. "counseling and therapy practice" means the practice of professional art therapy, professional clinical mental health counseling, professional mental health counseling, [and] marriage and family therapy, <u>alcohol abuse counseling</u>. drug abuse counseling and alcohol and drug abuse counseling;

"counselor and therapist practitioners" means professional art therapists, professional clinical mental health counselors, professional mental health counselors, [and] marriage and family therapists, registered mental health counselors, registered independent mental health counselors, alcohol abuse counselors, drug abuse counselors and alcohol and

[K.] N. "[marital] <u>marriage</u> and family therapy" means the diagnosis and treatment of nervous and mental disorders, whether cognitive, affective or behavioral, within the context of [marital] <u>marriage</u> and family systems;

[L.-] <u>O.</u> "marriage and family therapist" means an individual who engages in the practice of marriage and family therapy;

[M-] P. "mental disorder" means any of several conditions or disorders that meet the diagnostic criteria contained in the diagnostic and statistical manual of the American psychiatric association or the world health organization's international classification of diseases manual;

Q. "practice of alcohol and drug abuse counseling" means the rendering of counseling services, as defined by regulation of the board, to individuals, couples, families or groups. The services may include screening, assessment, consultation, development of treatment plans, case management, counseling, referral, appraisal, crisis intervention, education,

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<u>reporting and record keeping:</u>

[N-] <u>R.</u> "practice of art therapy" means the rendering to individuals, families or groups of services that use art media as a means of expression and communication to promote perceptive, intuitive, affective and expressive experiences that alleviate distress, reduce physical, emotional, behavioral and social impairment and lead to growth or reintegration of one's personality. Art therapy services include, but are not limited to, diagnostic evaluation, development of patient treatment plans, goals and objectives, case management services and therapeutic treatment <u>as defined by</u> regulation of the board;

[0.-] <u>S.</u> "practice of marriage and family therapy" means the rendering of [marital] marriage and family therapy services to individuals, family groups and marital couples, singly or in groups. The "practice of marriage and family therapy" involves the professional application of psychotherapeutic and family systems theories and techniques, <u>as</u> <u>defined by regulation of the board</u>, in the delivery of services to individuals, [marital] <u>married</u> couples and families and involves the presence of a diagnosed mental or physical disorder in at least one member of the couple or family being treated;

[P.] <u>T.</u> "practice of professional clinical mental health counseling" means the rendering of mental health counseling to individuals, couples, families or groups and the

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diagnosis and treatment of mental and emotional disorders, including psychopathology as defined by the American psychiatric association or the world health organization. "Practice of professional clinical mental health counseling" includes, but is not limited to, development of patient treatment plans, goals and objectives, case management services, therapeutic treatment, research and clinical mental health appraisal, consulting, counseling and referral as defined by regulation of the board;

[Q.-] U. "practice of professional mental health counseling" means the rendering of a therapeutic counseling service that integrates a wellness and multicultural model of human behavior involving certain methods and techniques of appraisal, including, but not limited to, consulting, counseling and referral as defined by regulation of the board;

[R.-] V. "practice of registered mental health counseling" means the rendering, under appropriate supervision, of a therapeutic counseling service that integrates a wellness and multicultural model of human behavior involving certain methods and techniques of appraisal, including, but not limited to, consulting, counseling and referral as defined by regulation of the board;

[S.] <u>W.</u> "professional art therapist" means an individual who engages in the practice of art therapy;

 $[\underline{T}.] \underline{X}.$ "professional clinical mental health counselor" means an individual who engages in the independent

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practice of professional clinical mental health counseling without supervision;

[U.] Y. "professional mental health counselor" means an individual who engages in the practice of professional mental health counseling without supervision;

[₩.-] Z. "referral" means the evaluation of information to identify needs of the person being counseled to determine the advisability of sending the person being counseled to other specialists, informing the person being counseled of such judgment and communicating the information to other counseling services as deemed appropriate; [and

₩-] <u>AA.</u> "registered mental health counselor" means an individual who is [certified by] registered with the board and is authorized by the board to engage in the practice of mental health counseling under appropriate supervision;

BB."substance abuse counselor" means an individualwho is licensed to practice alcohol and drug abuse counseling,alcohol abuse counseling or drug abuse counseling; and

CC. "substance abuse intern" means an individual who is registered to practice alcohol and drug abuse counseling. alcohol abuse counseling or drug abuse counseling under appropriate supervision."

Section 61-9A-7 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993, 16 Chapter 49, Section 7) is amended to read: "61-9A-7. BOARD CREATED- - MEMBERS- - APPOINTMENT- - TERMS- -17 18 COMPENSATION. - -19 A. There is created the "counseling and therapy practice board", which is administratively attached to the 20 21 department. 22 B. The board shall consist of [eight] nine 23 members who are United States citizens and have been New Mexico residents for at least five years prior to their appointment. 24 25 Of the [eight] <u>nine</u> members:

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(1) [four] five members shall be professional members, who shall be a professional mental health counselor, a professional clinical mental health counselor, a marriage and family therapist [and], a professional art therapist and an alcohol and drug abuse counselor, licensed under the Counseling and Therapy Practice Act and shall have engaged in a counselor and therapist practice for at least five years. These members shall not hold any elected or appointed office in any professional organization of counseling, psychology or closely related field during their tenure on the board, nor shall they be school owners. The initial [four] professional members shall meet requirements for licensure and be licensed within one year after the effective date of the [Counseling and Therapy Practice The professional mental health Act] licensure requirements. counselor shall also represent the registered mental health counselors; and

(2) four members shall represent the public. The public members shall not have been licensed or have practiced as counselor or therapist practitioners or in any other regulated mental health profession, nor have any significant financial interest, either direct or indirect, in the professions regulated.

C. All members of the board shall be appointed by the governor for staggered terms of four years, except that the initial board shall be appointed so that the terms of one

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professional and one public member expire June 30, 1994, <u>the</u> <u>terms of</u> one professional and one public member expire June 30, 1995, <u>the terms of</u> one professional and one public member expire on June 30, 1996 and <u>the terms of</u> one professional and one public member expire June 30, 1997. <u>The alcohol and drug abuse</u> <u>counselor shall be appointed to a four-year term beginning July</u> <u>1, 1996</u>. Each member shall hold office until his successor is appointed. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as original appointments. No appointee shall serve more than two terms.

D. The governor may appoint professional board members from a list of nominees submitted by qualified individuals and organizations, including the New Mexico counseling association, the New Mexico association for marriage and family therapy [and], the New Mexico art therapy association <u>and the alcohol and drug directors association</u>.

E. Members of the board shall be reimbursed as provided in the Per Diem and Mileage Act and shall receive no other compensation, perquisite or allowance.

F. The board shall elect annually from its membership a chairman and a secretary and other officers as necessary to carry out its duties.

G. The board shall meet at least twice a year and at other times deemed necessary. Other meetings may be called by the chairman upon the written request of three members of the
