A MEMORIAL

REQUESTING THE EXECUTIVE TO CONTRACT WITH COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS TO PROVIDE JOB TRAINING, DEVELOPMENT AND PLACEMENT AND EDUCATION TO ELIGIBLE PERSONS PURSUANT TO THE NEW MEXICO WORKS ACT.

WHEREAS, New Mexico must expend state funds to satisfy the maintenance of effort requirement to receive the temporary assistance for needy families block grant; and

WHEREAS, state funds must be expended on qualified state expenditures as defined in the temporary assistance for needy families block grant; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act be placed in programs that will immediately address their needs so that they may engage in work and move toward self-sufficiency; and

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WHEREAS, New Mexico has an existing network of qualified community-based programs that deliver an array of support services specially tailored to address the needs of particular communities;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the executive, including the human services department, children, youth and families department, labor department, state department of public education and department of health consider contracting for services with the following qualified community-based programs in communities throughout New Mexico to address the following populations of participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act:

- A. programs that provide job training, skill assessment and job placement to participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act;
- B. programs that deliver supported employment services to participants with developmental disabilities as defined in the New Mexico Works Act;
- C. programs that train participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act for employment in developmental disability community-based programs;
- D. developmental disability early intervention programs that provide support to participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act;

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- E. training programs for persons providing educational services to participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act, including Project Lead, a program at the university of New Mexico that provides training in educational administration development;
- F. organizations that have the capability to provide job training to female participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act;
- G. organizations that have the capability to screen for domestic violence and provide supportive services to victims of domestic violence who are participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act;
- H. local governments to develop employment opportunities and to employ participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act;
- I. programs that have the capability to provide employment-related and supportive services, including training and assistance to find permanent housing for homeless participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act;
- J. outpatient alcohol and substance abuse programs that not only treat participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act but also provide supportive services for overcoming barriers to employment;
- K. outpatient mental and behavioral health programs that provide treatment and services to participants . 123267.1

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as defined in the New Mexico Works Act for overcoming barriers to employment;

- L. programs that will address the needs of non-English speaking participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act:
- M. programs geared toward assisting teen parents who are participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act to smoothly transition into post-secondary education, job training or employment;
 - N. programs directed at preventing teen pregnancy;
- 0. tribal organizations that operate job training, community service and other employment programs for participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act;
- P. programs that will provide affordable, accessible and adequate child care for participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act in rural areas;
- Q. programs that will provide affordable, accessible and adequate twenty-four-hour child care to participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act;
- R. programs that incorporate child care and job training for participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act;
- S. alternative high schools that develop specialized programs for self-sufficiency for teen parents who are participants as defined in the New Mexico Works Act; and . 123267.1
