A MEMORIAL

REQUESTING THE BUREAU OF THE CENSUS TO CONDUCT THE 2000
DECENNIAL CENSUS CONSISTENT WITH THE CONSTITUTIONAL MANDATE
AND THE UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT RULING WHICH REQUIRE A
PHYSICAL HEADCOUNT OF THE POPULATION.

WHEREAS, the United States constitution requires an
actual enumeration of the population every ten years and
entrusts congress with overseeing all aspects of each
decennial enumeration; and

WHEREAS, the sole constitutional purpose of the decennial
census is to apportion the seats in congress among the several
states; and

WHEREAS, Article 1, Section 2 of the United States
constitution, in order to ensure an accurate count and to
minimize the potential for political manipulation, mandates an

1 "actual enumeration" of the population, which requires a
2 physical headcount of the population and does not permit
3 statistical guessing or estimates of the population; and

4 WHEREAS, in reaching its findings, the United States
5 supreme court found that the use of statistical procedures to
6 adjust census numbers would create a dilution of voting rights
7 for citizens in legislative redistricting, thus violating
8 legal guarantees of "one person, one vote"; and

9 WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 4, Section 3 of the
10 constitution of New Mexico, reapportionment of the New Mexico
11 legislature is critically dependent upon the official report
12 of the federal decennial census; and

13 WHEREAS, an accurate census is necessary to properly
14 apportion and create congressional and legislative districts
15 within the state; and

16 WHEREAS, the United States supreme court on January 25,
17 1999, ruled that the United States bureau of the census is
18 prohibited from using statistical sampling in calculating the
19 population for purposes of apportionment; and

20 WHEREAS, the use of statistically adjusted census data to
21 redraw congressional and legislative districts in New Mexico
22 would raise serious and significant questions as to the
23 validity of those districts and expose the state to expensive
24 and protracted litigation; and

25 WHEREAS, every effort should be made to obtain the most

1 complete and accurate count of the population as possible,
2 including the making of appropriations for state and local
3 census outreach and education programs, and for post-census
4 local review;

5 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE
6 OF NEW MEXICO that it call upon the bureau of the census to
7 conduct the 2000 decennial census by conducting an actual
8 enumeration of the population and that it not use statistical
9 sampling methods to adjust such enumeration for the purpose of
10 redistricting; and

11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that congress be urged to take
12 whatever steps are necessary to ensure that the 2000 decennial
13 census is conducted fairly and legally for the purpose of
14 apportionment and without adjustment by statistical sampling
15 methods for the purpose of redistricting; and

16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the New Mexico senate oppose
17 the use of census data for legislative redistricting purposes
18 that has been adjusted in whole or in part by the use of
19 statistical inferences derived by means of random sampling
20 techniques or other methods; and

21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the New Mexico senate request
22 that it receive data for legislative redistricting that is
23 identical to the census tabulation data used to apportion
24 seats in the United States house of representatives; and

25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be
