1 SENATE JOINT MEMORIAL 2 50TH LEGISLATURE - STATE OF NEW MEXICO - SECOND SESSION, 2012 3 INTRODUCED BY 4 5 6 DISCUSSION DRAFT 7 8 FOR THE LEGISLATIVE HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE 9 10 A JOINT MEMORIAL 11 REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO CONDUCT A STUDY ON THE 12 IMPACT OF ALLOWING THE USE OF MEDICAL CANNABIS FOR TREATMENT OF 13 SYMPTOMS FOR CERTAIN DISEASE GROUPS, THE IMPACT OF MEDICAL 14 CANNABIS ON HARM REDUCTION AND THE POTENTIAL THAT MEDICAL 15 CANNABIS HAS FOR REDUCING HEALTH CARE COSTS. 16 17 WHEREAS, the Lynn and Erin Compassionate Use Act was 18 signed into law in July 2007, allowing the use of medical 19 cannabis for treatment of symptoms for certain disease groups 20 specified by the department of health; and WHEREAS, research studies conducted by Wendy Swift, Peter 21 Gates and Paul Dillon at the national drug and alcohol research 22 centre located at the university of New South Wales in Sydney, 23 24 Australia, which were published in the October 4, 2005 Harm Reduction Journal, indicate that the use of cannabis provides 25 .187862.1

WHEREAS, the Swift, Gates and Dillon studies found that medical cannabis users perceive cannabis to be superior to other medications in that they experienced fewer undesirable side effects and greater pain relief, with sixty-two percent of the patients in the study decreasing or discontinuing the use of other, more adverse medications; and

WHEREAS, research studies conducted by Dr. Amanda Reiman at the university of California Berkeley's school of social welfare, published in the December 3, 2009 *Harm Reduction Journal*, found that eighty-five percent of the patients in the study had significantly fewer adverse side effects from medical cannabis than from prescribed medications, and more than sixtyfive percent of the patients using cannabis as a prescriptiondrug substitute experienced reduced potential for withdrawal symptoms; and

WHEREAS, over fifty-seven percent of the patients in Dr. Reiman's study felt that cannabis helped them manage the symptoms related to their conditions more effectively than prescription drugs; and

WHEREAS, research studies out of the university of California San Francisco, published in the November 3, 2011 *Journal of Clinical Pharmacology and Therapeutics*, indicate that the subjects' pain was significantly decreased after the addition of cannabis-specific interventions in a hospital .187862.1

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WHEREAS, the university of California San Francisco studies find that cannabis-specific interventions may allow for opiate treatment at lower doses, with fewer side effects in patients;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the secretary of health be requested to undertake or commission a study on the potential benefits of using medical cannabis to reduce patients' use of narcotics and other pharmaceuticals in treating the symptoms of the disease groups for which the department of health authorizes the use of medical cannabis; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the secretary of health be requested to include in the medical cannabis study an investigation of the impact of the use of medical cannabis in avoiding the harm caused by the use of and addiction to other drugs, both prescription and illicit; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the secretary of health be requested to include in the medical cannabis study an investigation of the potential benefits of using medical cannabis to reduce health care expenditures; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the secretary of health be requested to present the findings of the study to the legislative health and human services committee and to the legislative finance committee by December 1, 2013; and .187862.1
