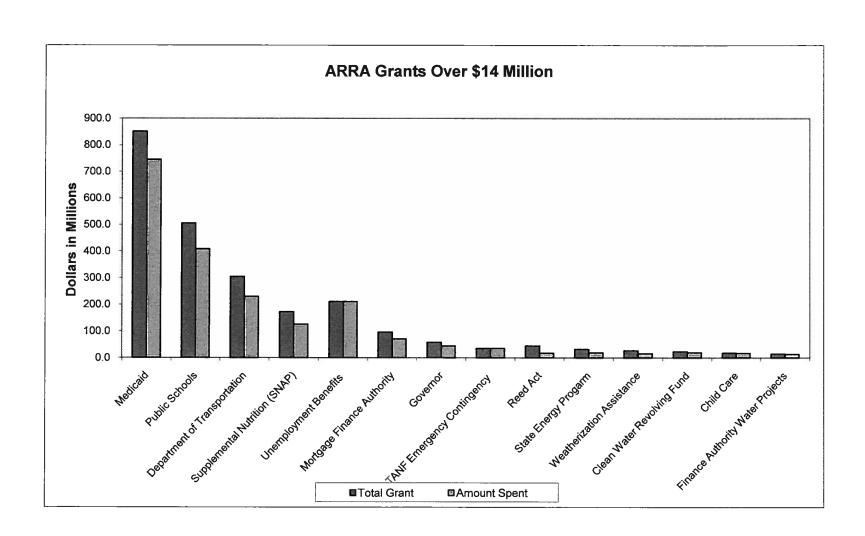

- Of the \$3.9 billion in stimulus and fiscal stabilization funding anticipated for New Mexico, state agencies and public schools have been made available about \$2.5 billion.
- Of the available amount, \$2 billion or 80.5 percent has been spent. From November 15, 2010, to April 30, 2010, \$390.6 million was spent.
- The graph on the next page shows percent funding for major grant categories receiving more than \$14 million.

- Spending highlights were the following:
 - Almost all agencies showed significant activity for the period, with percentage increase in expenditures ranging as high as 47 percent: (in thousands)

- Grants with awards expenditure dates of 9/30/2011 don't appear to be on track for full expenditure. Of particular concern are the Title I and IDEA-B ARRA grants.
- Districts and charter schools nationwide are having a difficult time expending these grants because of grant language that prohibits using these funds to supplant general fund support.

- 100% of GSF Award of \$57.9 million was allocated by the prior administration for 49 projects.
 - Expenditures totaled \$43.8 million, or 75.5%.
 - Encumbrances totaled \$6.8 million.
 - Unspent, unencumbered allocations totaled about \$6.8 million.
 - LFC chairs sent a letter to Governor Martinez suggesting that money could be de-authorized and redirected to offset potential dilution of the K-12 funding unit (Attachment A).
 - As of May 17, LFC had not received a response.

GSF Project De-authorizations

- Seven projects had full or partial de-authorizations in May, totaling almost \$2.7 million (Attachment B), which is now available to the new governor for reallocation.
- Fully de-authorized projects:
 - \$100,000 NMHU Spanish Language Materials
 - \$200,000 NMSU Native American Student Center
 - \$100,000 NM Livestock Board Equine Protection Jicarilla Apache

May 11, 2011 LFC GSF Report Update (Attachment C)

- Expenditures total \$44.7 million, or 81% of allocated amount.
- Encumbrances total \$7.9 million. LFC analysis shows agencies expect to spend 100% of allocations for projects showing activity.
- Four of eight projects that had no activity in the April report still appear inactive as of May 11, 2011:
 - ISC Acequia Project Fund \$823,500
 - City of Albuquerque (Breathing apparatus) \$685,000
 - VSD PTSD \$350,000
 - PED Gadsden STEM program \$100,000
- Of these projects, LFC analysis indicates that agencies expect funds for Albuquerque, Gadsden and PTSD to be fully expended. The agency notes no activity for the acequia project, although the agency has requested BAR authority to extend spending out to the September 30th deadline.
